Key Tips: Develop Effective Lector Habits

VENERATE BOTH THE WORD AND THE EUCHARIST.

The workshop is about the practical and physical preparation for the ministry but we should not neglect the spiritual preparation.



PREPARATION

Read all the readings, not just your own. Use a study Bible to ensure you understand them. Pray the word regularly.



POINTS TO REMEMBER

Check the microphone before Mass. Don't rush!
Sit at the front ready.



BOW TOGETHER

Meet at the middle of the altar and make a profound bow together.

Don't draw attention to yourself as you go up.





CHECK...

Check the lectionary, make sure you are on the right page (make sure you know to find the right page).



WAIT...

Before you start to read, wait for silence and for people to settle down.



MOVE & LISTEN...

Make your movements purposeful.
Listen to the word with the congregation.



REVIEW AND ADJUST

Check the lectionary, make sure you are on the right page (make sure you know to find the right page).





POSTURE

Relax your muscles. If you are tall enough, put your hands on the lectionary. Have your feet slightly apart with your weight evenly balanced.



STAND TALL

Stand tall but don't hold head rigidly (you're not in the army). Avoid tension in neck or shoulders (don't push head forward or hold it back).

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DON'T SAY!

Don't say "First Reading" etc...
just "A reading from..."
For the psalm, don't say "The response is..." just say the words.



DON'T TELL!

Don't tell people to stand for the Alleluia just say "Alleluia Alleluia" and they should automatically stand.



BREATHE...

Breathe by expanding the rib cage - fill your lungs.
Don't hold your stomach in.
Practise by lying on the floor.



EYE CONTACT

Don't stare - allow eyes to wander over the congregation. Read ahead so you don't lose your place.





LOOK UP!

At least look up at the start and the end i.e "A reading from..." and "The word of the Lord".



PAUSE...

Leave a reasonable pause before saying "The word of the Lord" - how long depends on you and gets easier to judge with experience.



PITCH

Used to accentuate or emphasise words or phrases: can indicate a change of mood for lighter mood, or for solemn moods.



PACE

Accentuate by dwelling on vowels especially for long sentences. Make sure you can articulate each word.





POWER

The 'loudness' of each syllable and can also be used to accentuate.



PRAY

Pray for strength and guidance

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READING PAUSES

Pause as appropriate at punctuation. Use dramatic pauses before words that ask mental questions.



EMOTIONAL NOT DRAMATIC

Use emotional pauses to indicate a particular state of mind



VERSE PAUSES

Use verse pauses e.g. for the psalm, hold the final word of each verse or use upward inflection.



INFLECTION: (INTONATION)

Inflection involves the variation in pitch and tone during speech. It's used to add emphasis, convey emotion, or indicate a question.



TONE

Good vocal quality. Tone is adjusted to convey emotion. It usually happens mentally as you tell the story. It may help to practise sounds or tongue twisters to improve articulation.




THE WORD OF THE LORD

Leave a reasonable pause before saying "The word of the Lord" - how long depends on you and gets easier to judge with experience.



PRACTISE

By practising these variations in inflection and tone, lectors can enhance reading effectiveness.



READING & SPEAKING SKILLS

This practice can also aid in better storytelling, whether in a religious context, public speaking, or performance.





REGULAR PRACTISE

Regularly participating in training sessions or workshops can help lectors refine their skills and stay effective in their roles.



EFFECTIVE LECTOR READING

To enrich worship and clearly transmit sacred texts, lector reading demands skill, technique, and emotion.
