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



UNITY BOOK GROUP


For our meeting on March 10 at 2 PM (Zoom) we will be led in our discussion by Shoshana Brower about the novel called, <u>Home Front</u> by Kristin Hannah. This deals with an often overlooked group whom we have not really explored too much...military women. I'm looking forward greatly to this book, if for no better reason than I've enjoyed other books written by this author!

Here's a brief synopsis: Like many couples, Michael and Jolene Zarkades have to face the pressures of everyday life—children, careers, bills, chores—even as their twelve-year marriage is falling apart. Then a deployment sends Jolene deep into harm's way and leaves defense attorney Michael at home, unaccustomed to being a single parent to their two girls. As a mother, it agonizes Jolene to leave her family, but as a solider, she has always understood the true meaning of duty. In her letters home, she paints a rose-colored version of her life on the front lines, shielding her family from the truth. But war will change Jolene in ways that none of them could have foreseen. When tragedy strikes, Michael must face his darkest fear and fight a battle of his own—for everything that matters to his family.

At once a profoundly honest look at modern marriage and a dramatic exploration of the toll war takes on an ordinary American family, Home Front is a story of love, loss, heroism, honor, and ultimately, hope.

PUBLIC POLICY IN OUR BRANCH




Our Public Policy Committee has been very busy in the new year. At recent meetings we have taken responsibility for supporting our CVUSD Board, teachers, and students. Sally Hibbitts, one of our committee members, wrote a letter of support, with suggestions by other members and approval by our branch board. It was then presented by Peggy Buckles, a committee member and branch co-chair, during public comment at the CVUSD Board meeting on February 1st. And the letter then appeared in a later edition of the Acorn.

Responsibilities of members of the committee during the time between our January 27th meeting and our next meeting on March 3rd. will be to view CVUSD Board meetings online with a particular focus on presentations and comments on the topics of sex education, restriction of book titles, LGBTQ issues, and anti-racism. Committee members will cover meetings through March 1st., and we will include sign-up sheets in the eblasts for members to commit to covering meetings starting on March 15th. through the month of April.

The next subject that we will tackle will be voting rights with suggestions about writing postcards encouraging others to vote in upcoming elections. We will also attend online League of Women Voters programs on voting and possibly work at polling places, register voters at schools and other public locations, and/or monitor voting places or vote counting locations.



Some brought us almost to tears as they related personal experiences where they felt a lack of inclusion or even bullying. All had valid suggestions for improvement in equal justice for all. At the end, three winners were chosen, as follows:

<u>Keynote Speaker</u>
Prof. Sara Sadhwani
Assistant Professor of Politics, Pomona College

Commissioner California Citizens Redistricting Commission

Sara Sadhwani is an assistant professor of politics specializing in Asian American and Latino voting behavior, elections, interest groups and representation. Her research has been published in the peer reviewed journals *Political Behavior*, *PS: Political Science and Politics, California Journal of Politics and Policy,* and the *Journal of Race, Ethnicity, and Politics* and her analysis of elections has been featured in the *Washington Post, Vox*, the *LA Times*, and NPR affiliate *KCRW-Los Angeles*.

Her dissertation identified variations in voting behavior between Latinos and Asian Americans and was supported by a fellowship from the John Randolph and Dora Haynes Foundation. She is currently a faculty fellow at the USC Schwarzenegger Institute.

She recently served on the Citizens Redistricting Commission for the State of California, which was tasked with drawing the district boundary lines for Congress, the State Legislature, and the state Board of Equalization.
