

CO-PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE - DIANE TURCOTT-BIRCHMAN



All Voices Heard! "All Voices Heard "was the theme for our Fall Membership Breakfast Event. We are grateful for those of you that were able to attend. It was a reminder to all of us how much we have missed getting together in person and the importance of social connection. It also reminded us of the many wonderful programs our branch is involved in, programs that help further the mission of AAUW, which is to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy.

"All Voices Heard!" is also the theme and the focus for our branch in the months ahead. Or is it really All Voices Heard? It does become a question rather than a declaration as voter suppression laws become the norm.

Congress has been less than successful in its attempts to restore protections for voting rights -- rights which have continued to erode since the passage of the Voting Rights Act in 1965. Despite receiving majority support, the John Lewis Voting Rights Advancement Act recently fell nine short of the sixty votes required for it to advance. This is the fourth time this year efforts have failed to advance voting- rights legislation. As we head into the midterm elections, which are less than a year away, we need to ensure that all have the same opportunity to exercise their right to vote. During this midterm election year, all 435 seats in the House of Representatives and 34 of the 100 seats in the Senate will be contested.

I truly believe that when one of us is diminished, we are all diminished. It is important that we recognize and allow the participation of all voices. When all voices are heard, our democracy is heard.

Stay involved, write to your local representatives. AAUW TO will keep you posted of upcoming events and opportunities where you can voice your concerns at the local, state, and national level.

Please stay involved in the serious and the seriously fun programs and activities that AAUW TO has to offer. There are book groups, museum and garden outings, coffee and chat, and our Dec. 12th Holiday Party! Our collective energy and success as a branch is counting on your participation.

HAPPY 140TH BIRTHDAY AAUW



November 17th 2021 is the 140th anniversary of the founding of AAUW Marion Talbot, President of AAUW established AAUW as an organization where college women would feel accepted. In the late 1880's as the number of women graduating college increased it was important to have an organization that provided social and educational opportunities for these women.

AAUW offered its first scholarship of \$350 to Ida Street and raised the money by asking each AAUW member to donate \$1. Since then, AAUW's support of women's academic goals has expanded greatly. Today, AAUW's scholarships provide support to women all over the world (International Scholarships), women completing their academic studies (American Fellowships), women improving their career path (Career Development Grants). AAUW Thousand Oaks, 65 years young, is part of that support system started 140 years ago. Our branch has three on-going national scholarships, two local scholarships to Moorpark College women and support for local high school girls.

Our branch members support these local scholarships by purchasing Poinsettias, as well as participating in other branch activities. AAUW members in California raised \$518,000 for AAUW Funds which supported 154 research projects, 23 International Fellows, 68 American Fellows. 37 women have received fellowships in CA this year. 


I'm looking forward to reading it and I hope you are too! Here's a brief comment from Good Reads:

The year is 1994, and South Africa is in political turmoil as its first democratic election looms. Against a backdrop of apartheid and racial violence, traumatized artist Yolanda Petersen returns from the Appalachian foothills to the land of her youth at the behest of her mother. While there Yolanda longs to reconnect with her estranged daughter, Ingrid, the product of an illegal mixed-race affair with a white man.

But Ingrid is missing, and as Yolanda quickly discovers, she isn't the only woman in Cape Town desperate to protect her own. Ingrid's very existence is proof of a white man's crime, and that man's mother will do anything—even kill—to ensure the truth remains buried.

An evocative debut novel set during a defining period in history, A Conspiracy of Mothers tells a gripping story of love and betrayal from multiple perspectives while deftly balancing the painful legacy of apartheid with the trials of motherhood.


