

Julie Tumamait-Stenslie has traced her family lineage from her father, Vincent Tumamait, to at least 11 known Chumash villages and as far back as the mid-18th century, Ms. Tumamait-Stenslie has worked as a cultural resource consultant from Malibu to Santa Barbara to the Channel Islands. providing guidance for private groups and state, county, and city regulatory agencies, including the Ventura and Santa Barbara County District Attorney's offices. She is well known throughout Ventura County and beyond for her Chumash cultural education programs and also performs ceremonies according to her native ways, such as weddings, burials, naming ceremonies, and blessings. Ms. Tumamait-Stenslie was a commissioner on the California Native American Heritage Commission and on the board of the Santa Clara River Conservancy. She serves on the accessions committee for the Museum of Ventura County and is on the Board of Directors for the Ojai Valley Museum.

# PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE



Women across the United States are losing their rights. Public schools, colleges, and libraries are having curricula restricted and books banned by boards of education and state legislatures. The Supreme Court of the United States overturned Roe vs. Wade and some justices have talked about overturning precedents like the right to birth control, interracial, and gay marriage. It's unsettling and makes me fear for the future of our country.



What can we as an organization or individuals do about this? We can donate to the National AAUW legal fund to battle for our rights in court. California AAUW is forming a committee to educate branches about finding and electing candidates for local school boards who don't believe in book bans or altering history.

At the local level, we can monitor school board and city council meeting and become knowledgeable about the candidates and their intentions and funding sources. We can work together with like minded organizations, write letters to the editor and work to educate the public. We can volunteer to register voters and staff voting sites. This sounds like a lot of work but maintaining our rights and our democratic republic is worth it.

# PUBLIC POLICY

Our Public Policy Committee has been very busy during recent months. Topics and actions have included decisions by the Thousand Oaks City Council, Conejo Valley School Board meetings, Ventura County Board of Supervisors, future elections, gun violence control, and branch programing.

There was a great deal of concern about a recent decision by the T.O City Council, relating to the district map that was chosen for equitable representation of marginalized populations in future elections of council members. After 2 meetings, where an overwhelming majority favored one of the maps, the council voted to support another We had many speakers at both meetings, including members of our Latino Youth Leadership Group. And there was a tremendous feeling by our Public Policy Committee members that democracy had not been served.

We have already acted with letters to the editor, conversations with council members, and the planning of future efforts related to elections of more representative candidates. And we will continue our work to address this issue, as well others that come before the council. For that purpose, we will have members of our group at each council meeting to both support and respond to the council, starting again on September 12, after their current break.

On a more positive note, we are happy to report that the City Council voted to include money to support inclusionary housing in all future building projects. They have also supported several plans to provide housing for members of the homeless and low-income population in Thousand Oaks.

In addition, we cover CVUSD School Board meetings to monitor public attempts to overturn board actions in the areas of book censorship, sexuality education, LGBTQ rights, antiracism, and other issues. The next board meeting is on August 16, and we will have representatives in attendance to anticipate increasing challenges as the new school year begins. We will also be collaborating with the CA AAUW for support of school board candidates in other districts.

For our August 14 th meeting, we will be reading Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus. Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute takes a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, brilliant, Nobel-prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with—of all things—her mind. True chemistry results.



Which is why a few years later Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show Supper at Six. Elizabeth's unusual approach to cooking ("combine one tablespoon acetic acid with a pinch of sodium chloride") proves revolutionary. But as her following grows, not everyone is happy.


