## Gender Equity \& Economic Security

We've led the fight for fair pay and economic opportunity for women - and the battle continues: Women still get just 83 cents for every dollar paid to a man, and men continue to dominate the top roles and highestpaying professions.

OUR VALUES

## Intersectional. Inclusive. Intergenerational. Empowering.

Though we are nonpartisan, we are not values-neutral: We fight to remove the barriers and biases that stand in the way of gender equity. We train women to negotiate for pay and benefits and to pursue leadership roles. And we advocate for federal, state, and local laws and policies to ensure equity and end discrimination.

The AAUW National Board of Directors and the Governance Committee are bringing an amendment forward to eliminate the degree requirement for membership in AAUW. An amendment to the bylaws requires $5 \%$ of eligible members $(1,970)$ to vote and a two-thirds majority of voters to pass.

## Key Dates for the 2024 Vote

AAUW is utilizing SimplyVoting.com, an independent, third-party voting system for this year's vote.
April 3 | Voting opens. Look for your encrypted ballot email from Simply Voting, Check your spam folder.

May 15 | Online voting ends at 12 noon ET and results will be announced online.
All members without an email address on file or who have unsubscribed from AAUW National emails will receive a paper ballot by mail.

x it is in the best interests of AAUW and its future relevance and sustainability as an inclusive and forward-thinking organization committed to advancing equity for women and girls, and x we will finally align our membership requirements with our mission and values.

## Haven't we done this before?

Xes! 23\% of AAUW members voted in 2021 ( $5 \%$ of eligible members are required) x 63\% approved of Open Membership (66.67 approval is required)

## Does this devalue our support for higher education?

AN ONGOING EFFORT BY OUR COMMITTEE HAS BEEN TO ASK THE CITY COUNCIL TO DECLARE JUNE AS PRIDE MONTH IN THOUSAND OAKS AND PRESENT A RESOLUTION TO THAT EFFECT TO REPRESENTATIVES OF THE DIVERSITY COLLECTIVE AT A CITY COUNCIL MEETING. THAT REQUEST HAS BEEN ACCEPTED, AND THE RESOLUTION WILL BE PRESENTED ON JUNE 4TH, WHERE A NUMBER OF OUR COMMITTEE MEMBERS WILL BE IN ATTENDANCE AND SPEAK DURING THE PUBLIC COMMENT PORTION OF THE AGENDA IN SUPPORT OF THE RESOLUTION AND THE DIVERSITY COLLECTIVE.
AND A FUTURE PROGRAM OF OUR PUBLIC POLICY COMMITTEE WILL BE ZOOM INTERVIEWS OF CVUSD SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES TO SEE WHERE THEY STAND ON ISSUES FACING THE SCHOOL BOARD AND THE VALUES OF AAUW. # AAOW TO Outing to the Autry Museum 



ON MARCH 16, 2024 NARDA FARGOTSTEIN AND ELODA LINEHAN MET IN FRONT OF BARNES AND NOBLE TO CARPOOL TO THE AUTRY MUSEUM (EVEN THOUGH THIS HAD BEEN POSTED IN OUR EBLASTS, EVIDENTLY EVERYONE ELSE WAS BUSY OR NOT INTERESTED.).CORRESPONDING TO OUR FOCUS ON THE INDIGENOUS PEOPLE, THE EXHIBITS WE THOROUGHLY VIEWED WERE THE "SHERMAN INDIAN SCHOOL: $100+$ YEARS OF EDUCATION AND
RESILIENCE"AND "RECLAIMING EL
CAMINO: NATIVE RESISTANCE IN THE MISSIONS AND BEYOND". THE SHERMAN INDIAN SCHOOL ORIGINALLY OPENED IN 1892 IN PERRIS, CALIFORNIA. IT IS NOW LOCATED IN RIVERSIDE AND IS A BOARDING SCHOOL FOR NATIVE AMERICANS OF HIGH-SCHOOL AGE. IT IS STATED THAT TWENTY-FIVE FEDERAL OFF-RESERVATION BOARDING SCHOOL FOR NATIVE AMERICAN CHILDREN WERE ESTABLISHED IN THE LATE NINETEENTH CENTURY TO FORMALLY EDUCATE AND "CIVILIZE" STUDENTS "THROUGH A STRICT PROGRAM OF ACADEMICS, VOCATIONAL TRAINING, AND CHRISTIAN TEACHING, FAR AWAY FROM THEIR FAMILIES AND TRIBAL COMMUNITIES." THE "RECLAIMING EL CAMINO: NATIVE RESISTANCE IN THE MISSIONS AND BEYOND" CENTERED ON THE LIFE THE NATIVE AMERICANS HAD IN THE MISSIONS WHERE THEY WORKED. THIS EXHIBITION "REPOSITIONS (AND RECLAIMS) THE EL CAMINO REAL AS THE ANCIENT AND WELL-WORN TRADE ROUTE FOR NATIVE PEOPLE LONG BEFORE THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE FRANCISCAN MISSIONS IN BAJA AND ALTA CALIFORNIA.

SIX MONTHS PREGNANT, JEN IS IN FREEFALL AS HER FUTURE, HER HUSBAND'S FREEDOM, AND HER FRIENDSHIP WITH RILEY ARE THROWN INTO UNCERTAINTY. COVERING THIS CAREER-MAKING STORY, RILEY WRESTLES WITH THE IMPLICATIONS OF THIS TRAGIC INCIDENT FOR HER BLACK COMMUNITY, HER AMBITIONS, AND HER RELATIONSHIP WITH HER LIFELONG FRIEND.

WE ARE NOT LIKE THEM IS BOTH A POWERFUL CONVERSATION STARTER AND A CELEBRATION OF THE ENDURING POWER OF FRIENDSHIP.

FOUNDED OVER 7 YEARS AGO BY OUR AAUW BRANCH AND CLUE VC AS CONEJO CONEXIONES, THE PROGRAM HAS PROVIDED FIRST GENERATION LATINO YOUNG WOMEN AND MEN WITH SUPPORT, EDUCATION, OPPORTUNITIES FOR SERVICE, TEAMBUILDING AND FUN ACTIVITIES.
THE PICTURES ARE FROM THIS YEAR'S MIDDLE SCHOOL CONFERENCE WHERE 8TH. GRADE STUDENTS FROM REDWOOD AND CERRITOS GOT AN ORIENTATION TO WHAT THEY WOULD EXPERIENCE AS FRESHMEN NEXT YEAR. AND OUR STUDENT MEMBERS WERE ABLE TO PRACTICE THEIR LEADERSHIP SKILLS IN ORGANIZING AND STAFFING THE DAY'S EVENTS. ALL WERE TREATED TO PERFORMANCES BY SOME OF THE MANY TALENTED THOUSAND OAKS STUDENTS AND TOOK TOURS OF THE LARGE CAMPUS. THEY WERE TREATED TO BREAKFAST AND LUNCH SERVED BY OUR AAUW AND STUDENT VOLUNTEERS, PRESENTATIONS BY SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION AND STAFF, AND WERE ENCOURAGED TO SOCIALIZE AND ASK QUESTIONS.
