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# CO-PRESIDENT'S PERSPECTIVE - PEGGY BUCKLES



As we head into fall, my co-president, Diane Birchman and I would like our focus for the coming year to be voting rights and social justice for those people whose voting rights are being curtailed or eliminated across our country. We feel this reflects the AAUW mission of equity for all. Last year we celebrated the centennial of women's right to vote. But history teaches us that not all women were allowed to vote after the 19th Amendment became law in 1920. In fact, black men and women were effectively barred from voting until 1965 when the Voting Rights Act passed. Jim Crow laws and intimidation kept most people of color away from the polls before that.

After the Voting Rights Act, many more people of all races registered and voted. However, in 2013, the Supreme Court ruled in Shelby vs. Holder that it was unconstitutional to require states with a history of voter discrimination to seek federal approval before changing their election laws. After the highly contested 2020 election, states have written over 400 new laws regarding voting which makes it harder for people of color to vote. We cannot let that happen to our fellow citizens. As Americans, we need to work for the right of all citizens to vote in free and fair elections.

We are planning to invite speakers on current topics and to have a panel discussion to help us understand what is happening here and abroad and what we can do about these issues. We will be asking you to team up with the League of Women Voters to register local high school students to vote and to work at the polls. Our hope is that we can meet in person and that you will join us for these presentations as well as our outings, book groups, breakfast and lunch get-togethers, and the annual holiday party. We enjoy seeing and talking to each of you and would like to hear what is going on in your lives.

The next book forthright Unity Book Group will be The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek by Kim Richardson. Shoshana Brower recently wrote an excellent review of this work for the newsletter of the Friends of the Thousand Oaks Library. She highly recommended the book. Here is a brief synopsis:

The hardscrabble folks of Troublesome Creek have to scrap for everything—everything except books, that is. Thanks to Roosevelt's Kentucky Pack Horse Library Project, Troublesome's got its very own traveling librarian, Cussy Mary Carter.

Cussy's not only a book woman, however, she's also the last of her kind, her skin a shade of blue unlike most anyone else.

Not everyone is keen on Cussy's family or the Library Project, and a Blue is often blamed for any whiff of trouble. If Cussy wants to bring the joy of books to the hill folks, she's going to have to confront prejudice as old as the Appalachias and suspicion as deep as the holler.

Inspired by the true blue-skinned people of Kentucky and the brave and dedicated Kentucky Pack Horse library service of the 1930s, The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek is a story of raw courage, fierce strength, and one woman's belief that books can carry us anywhere—even back home

#### RECENT BOOKS BY AAUW FELLOWS & GRANTEES

#### Four Hundreed Souls: A Community History of African America, 1619-2019

Editors Ibram X. Kendi and 2016-17 AAUW American Fellow Keisha N. Blain have assembled 90 brilliant writers, each of whom takes on a five-year period within the 400-year span from 1619 to the present. The Washington Post calls Four Hundred Souls, "a vital addition to [the] curriculum on race in America."

#### **Unbound: How Inequality Constricts Our Economy and What We Can Do about It.**

In this book, 1997-98 AAUW American Fellow Heather Boushey provides meticulous evidence that inequality hurts economic growth and lays out a path forward for our country based on equity. Boushey is co-founder of the Washington Center for Equitable Growth and currently serves as a member of the Council of Economic Advisers in the Biden administration.

#### All We Can Save: Truth, Courage, and Solutionss for the Climate Crisis.

This volume of illuminating essays was co-edited by Ayana Johnson, a 2010–11 American Fellow and marine biologist and policy expert. It harnesses the voices of women at the forefront of the climate change movement. The New York Times calls it "a powerful read that fills one with, dare I say . . . hope?"

# From Slave Cabins to the White House: Homemade Citizenship in African American Culture

Named a "Best Book of 2020" by Ms. Magazine, this tome by 2009-10 AAUW American Fellow Koritha Mitchell lays bare the hostility African American women faced as they invested in traditional domesticity throughout history. While white homemakers were conferred respectability and safety, Black women endured pejorative labels, racist government policies, and attacks on their citizenship.
