Mahmoud Mostofian, Mohammad Kaazem Jahansouzi, and Habib-allah Khalaj carried Sayyed Hasan Modares's body to this cemetery after they poisoned and suffocated him. They demanded the gravedigger (name: ?) to quickly finish the ceremonial prayer, bury the body, and never discuss it with anyone. The gravedigger realized that the body belonged to an important person. He marked the place, a few days later added some bricks around the grave, and later showed the site to a couple of trusted people from Kaashmar.

According to Abdol Baghi, Sayyed Hasan Modares told his son to go to France, study medicine, and go back to Iran to serve people as a physician. This trip occurred right after Abdol Baghi's graduation from *Dar al-Fonoun Polytechnic School* in Tehran. Modares asked Mirza Sayyed Hasan Zaeem (one of the representatives of Shoushtar and a member of the minority group in the Parliament) to help Abdol Baghi with removing the clergies' outfit (*Abaa* and *Ammameh*) and purchase several western style business suits from Bazaar before leaving for France. This decision was condemned by a few clergies who personally knew Modares and his family. They felt that this act was an insult toward the community. Sayyed Hasan Modares ignored those comments and sent his son to France with his own income. Nice?, Photographer:?, Date:?

16-Left to Right, Standing: Mr. Keshaavarz, Mr. Kiyan, Mr. ? Sitting from Left to Right: ? and Abdol Baghi Modares. Abdol Baghi traveled to France with Mirza Sayyed Hasan Zaeem, a friend of Sayyed Hasan Modares, one of the representatives of Shoushtar, and a member of the minority group in the Parliament. In France, Abdol Baghi met the other four medicine students who were sent to France by the government to study and return to Iran. Modares sent his son with his own income.
