





C. Breaking new ground.

Yes, the SDG emoji represents a unique and new concept because there is no concept that distinctly represents sustainability or social impact let alone the goals it represents such as no poverty, reduced inequalities, and climate action. The SDGs are for everyone, even though they come from the United Nations, so they are not exclusive to only being used by the United Nations.

D. Distinctiveness

The SDG wheel is a visually iconic entity for the United Nations Sustainable Development Agenda, which is a general framework adopted by all 193 member states (countries from all over the world) of the United Nations General Assembly to improve the quality of life for people and the planet. The "SDG" in the SDG wheel represents the acronym for the Sustainable Development Goals as well as each of the 17 goals the color wheel represents. The color wheel is applied as a paradigm for what all the goals represent (please refer to the link here for each of the specific goals: https://sdgs.un.org/goals), sustainability, sustainable development, sustainability advocacy, sustainable development policy, and even more broadly for social impact, United Nations-related work, corporate social responsibility, and ESG, or Environment, Social, Governance. Millions of businesses, nonprofits, governments, and networks use the SDGs to represent their commitment to the icon's message.
