we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, how much more, once
reconciled,

A Reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Romans:

If, by the transgression of one person,
death came to reign through that one,
how much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and of the gift of
justification

come to reign in life through the one person Jesus Christ.

In conclusion,

just as through one transgression condemnation came upon all, so through one
righteous act acquittal and life came to all.

For just as through the disobedience of one person the many were made sinners,
so through the obedience of one
the many will be made righteous.

The law entered in so that transgression might increase but, where sin increased,
grace overflowed all the more,
so that, as sin reigned in death,
grace also might reign through justification for eternal life through Jesus Christ our
Lord.

Romans 6:3-9 Short Form

A Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans:

Those who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, "Abba, Father!" The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ, if only we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him. I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing compared with the glory to be revealed for us. For creation awaits with eager expectation the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it, in hope that creation itself would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God. We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves as we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

A Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans:

If God is for us, who can be against us?
He who did not spare his own Son
but handed him over for us all,
how will he not also give us everything else along with him? Who will bring a
charge against God's chosen ones?
It is God who acquits us.
Who will condemn?
It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised, who also is at the right hand of God,
who indeed intercedes for us.
What will separate us from the love of Christ? Will anguish, or distress, or
persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or the sword?
No, in all these things we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us.
For I am convinced that neither death, nor life,
nor angels, nor principalities,
nor present things, nor future things,
nor powers, nor height, nor depth,
nor any other creature
will be able to separate us from the love of God
in Christ Jesus our Lord.

A Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans:

None of us lives for oneself, and no one dies for oneself.
For if we live, we live for the Lord,

that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living.
For we shall all stand before the judgment seat of God; for it is written:
"As I live, says the Lord,
every knee shall bend before me,
and every tongue shall give praise to God."
So then each of us shall give an account of himself to God.

A Reading from St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians: (Long Form)

Christ has been raised from the dead,
the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep.
For since death came through a human being,
the resurrection of the dead came also through a human being.
For just as in Adam all die,
so too in Christ shall all be brought to life,
but each one in proper order:
Christ the firstfruits;
then, at his coming,
those who belong to Christ;
then comes the end,
when he hands over the kingdom to his God and Father,
For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to
be destroyed is death,
for "he subjected everything under his feet."
But when it says that everything has been subjected,
it is clear that it excludes the one who subjected everything to him. When
everything is subjected to him,
then the Son himself will also be subjected
to the one who subjected everything to him,
so that God may be all in all.
