

THE SPIRIT OF CHEZ NOUS

The town of St. Agatha celebrated its 100th birthday this year. Through the efforts of the Centennial Committee members, many events, beginning with the official opening on March 17th (the date the town was actually incorporated 100 years ago), and on through the summer months, were enjoyed by many, many townsfolk and visitors from "away".

On March 17, 1999, Postmistress Florine Michaud began the day by applying the official Centennial cancellation stamp to envelopes and selling them throughout the day to interested patrons.

The "ouverture" of the Centennial celebration continued that day with a Mass officiated by Fr. Mike Gendreau. Music with French verses greeted people to the bilingual Mass. Immediately following, a reception was held in the parish hall. Members of the Centennial committee greeted approximately

150 people to share in a delicious meal of chicken stew and ployes. After the meal, Town Selectman Dave Dubois read the Proclamation document, officially "opening" the festivities and declaring the weekend of July 23, 24, and 25, 1999 as the St. Agatha Centennial Celebration.

With the Centennial Celebration weekend set, the Centennial Committee got busy mailing invitations to relatives, friends and former residents living away, urging them to come and partake in the upcoming festivities. And come they did! By the hundreds! Our little town of St. Agatha tripled in size during that fun-packed weekend in July. Agathians opened their hearts and homes to them all. There is a certain lady affiliated with the Credit Union (you know who you are) who moved into her RV so that she could accommodate her relatives and their families. Another offered her upstairs bedrooms, her plentiful garden, and a spot in her front yard to view the Sunday parade. There were many of these same scenarios repeated throughout the town. Almost every home had an out-ofstate car parked in the driveway. Similar to our forefathers, the people of St. Agatha know how to make visitors, strangers and guests feel welcome.

Activities during the Centennial weekend included hayrides, a bomber race, bingo, arts and crafts fair, historical photo exhibit, chicken BBQ, beer garden and social and a golf tournament. There was also an "Acadien Rendezvous" featuring local and regional musicians as well as fireworks.

Another enjoyable activity was the Talent Show that was co-chaired by Sharon Lizotte and Linda Bechard. The Master of Ceremonies, Marc Chasse, introduced each performer in true Arthur Godfrey style.

One very popular attraction was the "Tour des Concessions," a guided bus tour of old homesteads and happenings of St. Agatha's back settlements of "Montange Platte." The Thibeaults, Chasses, and Morneaults corroborated on a detailed map, illustrating

the location of homesteads, farms, roads, and landmarks. Markers were placed at various locations depicted on the maps, pinpointing where settlers had once lived. This project added an interesting and historical touch to the 100th birthday celebration.

Another exciting event was the much They say that Bob acclaimed parade. Chamberland, parade committee chairman, urged his committee to pray fervently to stop the threatening clouds from dampening the parade participants. The Lord must have heeded their pleas because the rain held off until the last float made its way past the enthralled onlookers. Among the long line of entries (approximately 115 of them!) were floats representing town families, a replica of St. Agatha Church complete with choir and an authentically clad Daughter of Wisdom, as well as farm machinery, the old and the new hi-tech. There was even a 1926 threshing machine.

On Sunday morning, hundreds attended the bilingual Celebration of the Eucharist again officiated by Fr. Mike Gendreau. They were greeted at the church entry by four Acadian lasses garbed in their finery. The celebrants listened to Fr. Mike as he eulogized the first settlers' ability to build a house of worship amid hardships and "today's communicants are just as devoted," he explained. He also spoke of the "Theology of Chez Nous" among the people of the lake. And the choir, under the able direction of Marcel Chartier, sang the oh so well-practiced repertoire of French songs and hymns.

After Mass, a procession to Centennial Park culminated in the blessing by Fr. Mike of our newly constructed gazebo. The gazebo, thanks in part to a generous patron, a former resident, is located behind the Town Office. Tourists and visitors come to have their picture taken alongside the new structure.

Adding to one of the historical aspects of the 100-year commemoration, was the printing of the "Centenaire de St. Agatha, Maine 1899-1999" by the Ste. Agathe Historical Society. Helping with research, pertinent data and maps was Mr. Guy Dubay, a local historian. The book also includes many old photos collected throughout the years, a Census of 1900, and many other articles of interest. Its 376 pages have historical information, stories and anecdotes that are sure to attract all types of readers.

The success of the 100 Year Celebration was due to many, many volunteers, and their hard work and diligence..some unnoticed,

some perhaps more visible. Residents cooperated, decorating their homes and places of business with banners, red, white and blue bunting, planting flowers and erecting signs and markers, all of which contributed to the embellishment of the town.

For those of you who were able to attend, the following pages will bring back some great memories. For those who could not be here, we hope that these pictures will tell the story...

Tour des Concessions

Ste. Agathe Centennial

When I married Gaelen Saucier in 1972, I visited a new world every time we went back to the St. John Valley, a world with its own special language and culture.

It was our good fortune that he graduated from Wisdom High School in 1969, because that meant his 30th high school reunion in July 1999 would ensure that we were up north for the centennial of Ste. Agathe.

More than the town where my husband attended school, Ste. Agathe was the birthplace of my mother-in-law, Rosette Saucier, and the home of her Chamberland and Chasse ancestors, among others.

Riding along the roads of "les concessions," we were grateful for the signs that had been erected by the Centennial Committee to mark the locations of all the old homesteads. The markers along each road gave a good idea of the families in each neighborhood.

A sign marked "Washington School" across the road from the former homestead of Belone and Edith (Chasse) Chamberland - my husband's grandparents - let us know where Belone had a school built in 1903 to accommodate his growing family. It was named the Washington School in 1927.

These signs were a superb way for a town to mark its history - and to educate people about it.

We always enjoy visits to the Ste. Agathe Historical House, with its photos, old tools and other artifacts. The room with all the religious items - the altar, the statues, the tabernacles - remind me that my adopted faith has a rich history.

We joined my husband's classmates for the Saturday afternoon Mass at the church where so many of his ancestors celebrated their sacraments. We appreciated the warm welcome Father Mike Gendreau gave everyone attending the centennial not just because of his own family connection to the parish and to the land where Ste. Agathe Church stands, but because Father Mike was for a time assigned to St. John's in Bangor.

Later, attending the banquet for the Class of '69 at the Lakeview Restaurant, we all rushed outside at the sound of the fireworks. Watching the colors burst over beautiful Long Lake, I felt fortunate to be attending this landmark weekend.

How pleased I was to find that the Ste. Agathe





Historical Society had published a wonderful 372page "Centenaire de St. Agatha, Maine 1899-1999." Geneological gems such as the reprinted 1900 census - taken the year after the town incorporated were wonderful. I also appreciated the articles, the pictures, the history, the background on the parish and so many other items which constitute a picture of the town.

We weren't able to attend all the festivities, but were glad to visit the craft fair, and to see for ouselves the new park with its gazebo - a tangible reminder of this wonderful celebration, and of course an exemplary tribute to Felix and Azilda Albert by their son.


As one who has to go back a few hundred years to find her few French ancestors, I feel so blessed to have been introduced to this culture in the beautiful St. John Valley, which I always think of as "the top of the world."

I am proud that my sons share this heritage - so proud that we brought them back here for their baptisms some 20 years ago.

The centennial was a weekend of hugs and handshakes, of re-establishing those connections which are nowhere stronger than they are here in the Valley. So many of St. Agathe's people - whether they still live here or had to travel many hours to com home - share the same culture, the same agricultural background, the same faith and values of hard work and helping a neighbor in need.

For three days you saw each other. I only wish you could have seen yourselves - as I did - and been as overwhelmed as I was with how beautiful a town you have. Ste. Agathe is truly a place whose beauty is exceeded only by the warmth of its people - my beloved Franco-Americans.

Sit Down and Stay Awhile


Day after day -yesterday, today, tomorrow,
