FELIX ALBERT

A loving parent, caring gentleman, and dedicated postman "par excellence"

A recollection provided by Leo Albert, with contributions from his seven brothers and sisters.

Our Dad (to be) was attending Catholic University in Washington D.C., with the goal of becoming a Jesuit. In his last year, he became ill and hence, unable to continue his studies, he returned to Ste. Agathe.. While recuperating, he met a beautiful girl from Quebec named Azilda Michaud - a happenstance that "derailed" his original goal.

In his early twenties, Dad became the rural mail carrier for the Town of Ste. Agathe, a responsibility he carried out diligently for 40 Those of us who remember the twenties and thirties will also recall the severity of the long winters. In order to complete his daily 35 mile round, Dad would rise at 4:30 A.M. By 6:00 A.M., he would start the first half of his journey by touring the "Montagne Platte". He would return home around noontime, eat his lunch, harness a different horse, and start the second half of his journey "autour du lac", returning home as late as 6:00 P.M. Some nights, he would be so frozen, we had to help him out of his sleigh. Conversely, during the summer, he would cover the same 35 miles in three hours.

During the great depression of the late twenties and early thirties, when very few homes could afford a telephone, our Dad provided a daily and reliable communication conduit between the many homes on his route. During the same period, when farmers could not even sell their potato yields, and hence, had very little money, our Dad was probably the only person in Ste. Agathe (with the exception of the Postmaster) who received a bi-weekly salary from the Federal In order to assist families Government. requiring medicine, clothing and other necessities, but lacking the money to pay for them, Dad engaged in a "barter" system,

whereby he would purchase the desired items and deliver them to the families involved. In return, he would accept freshly caught fish, or chicken, pork or beef, which provided food for his brood of ten children. It was a system that benefited both parties involved.

Dad's desire to help other people was manifested in many ways during his lifetime to wit, the following five paragraphs:

Realizing that Dad had to maintain his car in "tip top" running condition in order to perform his daily duties, the Daughters of Wisdom never hesitated to ask him to drive them to Riviere du Loup, where they took a train to their Mother House in Ottawa. During one such occasion in 1936, Dad's two-day old car hit a pothole, resulting in a flat tire. The spare tire was encased in a shiny chrome cover mounted on the rear of the car. Unfortunately, the car dealer had neglected to give Dad the key that unlocked the casing, thus requiring ripping off the casing with a tire iron.

Every summer, Dad and those of his five sons old enough to hold a paintbrush, spent countless hours painting classrooms, hallways, and wooden fire escapes at Notre Dame de la Sagesse Convent. The remuneration was well worth the effort - a pat on the head by Mother Superior, a big thank you, and a promise from her not to tell anyone which one of us boys painted a room leaving unsightly streaks.

Circa 1936, Mr. Fred Dube, while cutting wood "dans l'anse" at the head of the lake, accidentally drove his ax right *through* his foot. He somehow managed to crawl to

our house. Dad immediately called Dr. Levesque, who rushed over to clean the wound, stop the bleeding, and give Mr. Fred a painkiller. He said Mr. Fred should be rushed to the nearest hospital to have stitches taken and a foot cast put on. Dad immediately undertook the 80-mile roundtrip.

During the wintertime, when the roads around the "Montagne Platte" and "autour du lac" were not driveable, and Dr. Levesque was called upon to deliver a baby in below zero weather, he would drive as far as Wilfred Dufour's General Store. Dad would meet him there with his horse and sleight and "taxi" the good doctor to his required destination. His remuneration was a handshake from the proud father.

In the early forties, Dad and my brother Jean converted the Ste. Agathe Cemetery from an unsightly area infested with all kinds of weeds and littered with branches, stones, etc., into a beautifully manicured cemetery with grass, shrubs and flowers.

All of the undertakings mentioned in the foregoing five paragraphs were performed "pro bono". Indeed Dad had a "heart of gold".

In the early twenties, Dad assumed the position of Financial Secretary for the Ste. Agathe council of the Knights of Columbus. He held that position until it merged with the Madawaska Council in the forties. Dad remained a 4th Degree member, always very proud of wearing his tuxedo, cape, sword and plumed hat, which all us kids very much enjoyed.

During those same years, Dad contributed a beautiful bass voice to the Church choir. Additionally, he acted and sang in many plays staged at the Ste. Agathe theater, which attracted people from all the surrounding communities.

When Dad was forced to retire after he suffered a severe heart attack at the age of 62, he had accumulated so much unused sick leave during his 40 years of service, that he received his full salary for a period of two years. Upon his retirement, the Postmaster General of the United States sent Dad a letter of commendation for epitomizing the Postal Service slogan:

"Neither rain, nor hail, nor sleet, nor snow, nor the gloom of night, shall deter the Postman from his appointed round"

The adage "behind every good man is a better woman" was certainly exemplified in our home. Our dear mother, while raising her ten children, found time to walk every morning (winter and summer) 1/4 mile up a relatively steep his to play the Church organ.

Our parents loving, affectionate, ethical and religious compartment encouraged us to emulate them, thereby forming a solid base for our adult lives. Unfortunately for us, God must have missed them so much that he called them home at a relatively early age - Mom at 64 and Dad at 67.


FATHER DAVID RAYMOND

On June 7, 2003, a person near and dear to our hearts here at the Ste. Agathe Historical Society, realized a lifelong calling, when he was ordained as Reverend David Raymond. Father Dave, a past board member and president of our Society, was ordained in his home parish of Ste. Luce in Frenchville.

Prior to entering the seminary at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C., Father Dave was involved in SAD 33 education for 22 years as a teacher in elementary school and then became assistant principal and director of curriculum at Wisdom High School in St. Agatha. He had a very involved educational career in both Frenchville and St. Agatha. He also served some time in the Peace Corps in Chad, Central Africa.

In 1993, Father Dave wrote the religious history of St. Luce Parish for its 150th anniversary. He also wrote the "History of Ste. Agathe Parish". As a member of the Ste. Agathe Historical Society, he was instrumental in spearheading several important projects. Father Dave secured a grant to research and honor the WW I and WW II Veterans from Frenchville and St. Agatha. He also instituted the "Golden Cane Award", which recognizes and honors the oldest St. Agatha citizen.

Father Dave's first assignment in Maine is as the parochial vicar of the parishes of Holy Rosary in Caribou, St. Denis in Fort Fairfield and St. Louis is Limestone. This allows him to be close to his parents, Maurice and Marie Louise Raymond of Frenchville, and his beloved St. John Valley. His most recent accomplishment is receiving the University of Maine at Fort Kent's Outstanding Alumni Award.

They raised nine children: Joan Chamberland of Virginia Beach, VA, Aurele (now deceased), Carmen Aldrete of Lincoln, Louis of St. Agatha, Norman of Nashua, NH, Noella Elliot of Madawaska, Monique Botting Williamsburg, VA, Gisele Marquis of Lawrenceville, GA, and Nicole Lynch of Nashua, NH. Lucille always looked to instill in her children, strong values of hard work, education and faith.

Rosaire and Lucille owned a farm until 1969, which meant many years of hard work. After the farm was sold, Lucille found work as a cafeteria cook at Wisdom High, a position she held for 20 years. Despite raising nine children and working, Lucille still found the time to be a member of the Ladies of St. Anne, as well as the Ladies Auxiliary. She and Rosaire were also active members of the Ste. Agathe Historical Society.

Since her retirement, Lucille continues to stay very active in the community, volunteering her time at an area nursing home. She also enjoys knitting and sewing, playing cards and visiting with her friends and family. She now has 22 grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.
