

Scenes from the Daughters of Wisdom Centennial and The Long Lake Summerfest July 30, 31, and August 1, 2004


The church bells rang in 1904 when four Daughters of Wisdom arrived in St. Agatha to establish a school and hospital. The four Sisters, Mother Marie Therese, Sr. St. Anselme, Sr. Victorine de St. François, and Sr. Euphrone, arrived on October 1, 1904. One hundred years later the church bells rang to welcome the many Daughters of Wisdom and visitors who had come to St. Agatha to celebrate the centennial. In the following pages, the Ste-Agathe Historical Society would like to share with you some of the images from the Summerfest weekend.

Homily by Rev. Michael Gendreau

The Daughter of Wisdom Rule of Life Rule # 21 states: "With Mary and in Mary, we prolong the mystery of the Incarnation of Jesus. By her faith and her desire, one with her own people, Mary carried the messianic hope within herself and received the Word of God in order to give him to the world.

As Mary did, we contemplate the love of God, sign of salvation and hope. We welcome that love within us and give it expression in our lives. We wish to be women of faith, and desire, who in an attitude of poverty, we participate in the coming of the Kingdom."

100 years ago the first Daughters of Wisdom arrived. During those 100 years you have given expression to the love of God among us and have shaped the life and faith of generations of families who lived and continue to live in the St. John Valley.

When I look back into my own family history, I have to notice that the Daughters taught Mémère Michaud, my mother and her siblings, my father (his 6th grade teacher was also my 6th grade teacher). I was taught by Sr. Elizabeth in K, Sr. Jackie Ayotte in 4th, and Sr. Albertine in 6th.

The word that seems to best summarize the readings and your ministry among us is detachment, not only from material things but also, and more importantly, detachment from ego. Emptying self of self. Meister Eckhardt once wrote: "Every ego attachment of every kind of deed robs you of your freedom to be free and ready to serve God and others. You cannot be fruitful unless you renounce all ago attachments to these deeds. A woman who is chaste is free and liberated from ego is close to God and to herself. She bears much fruit and gives birth. She gives birth and becomes fruitful out of her own foundation... Our receptivity makes us chaste and in this we conceive... We give birth, we respond fruitfully and creatively... When we let go of our ego attachments to material and external things, we experience emptiness and in this void, God and the soul are united in fertility. Detachment produces a new birth."

If detachment is the word that best captures the scripture and your ministry among us, the image (for me anyway) that best gives flesh to the word detachment and your ministry is that of midwife. A midwife is free of ego, responding in the day or during the night to the needs of another. She is there in the midst of the painful contractions and mother's painful cries, she is able to listen intensely and to read the signs that birth is near, she is present in the messiness of the birth, she is there to clean the child off when he or she is born and then gives this new life fragile, yet full of potential to his/her mother and father.

- As teachers you were not only imparting book knowledge reading, writing, and arithmetic, but also taught a way of life. You nurtured in your students a love for the arts, drama, music, and literature. You helped to birth in us talents that were hidden beneath the surface and always affirmed our goodness as your students.
- 2. Rule # 8 says" "we explicitly proclaim Gospel values in fidelity to directives of the Church by: giving preserving attention to those who are neglected and rejected, being available to them wherever they are, sharing in their legitimate struggles, their sufferings and their hopes, supporting and cooperating with them in their efforts to improve the quality of their lives."

As pastoral care givers you would reach out to the sick and the poor of the community in so many unselfish ways. It may have been simple as helping someone read a letter from a loved one who lives away or helped them write a letter. It may have been driving someone to their doctor appointment or making sure they took their meds on time. Sr. Gabrielle is a good example of the care and compassion of the Daughters. She would often go to homes with the Eucharist in one hand and her blood pressure cuff in the other, tending to their spiritual and physical need: How often I would hear, "ton vicare a venu me voire" or would see her little grey Toyota driving to and from NMMC no matter what the weather was like.

Whether is was in Ste-Agathe or Madawaska, Appalachia or Lewiston working with the poor or the immigrant, In New York City or Malawi working with young new or young mothers who live with HIV/AIDS, you have revealed to us a compassionate God who hears the cry of His people.

3. As women of faith whose greatest teaching was by the way you lived your lives in in relationship to God and to the community, you nurtured in us a deep love for God and Mary and in particular the Rosary. We have had many good priests in the valley, you contributed to their vocation... but your steady, committed presence provided our faith with a stability that provided an environment in which it could grow.

You have shaped us and have birthed in us the gifts of faith and service to one another, you have shown us the importance of welcoming the stranger and caring for the sick, you have strengthened God's life in us and in our community.


In Marc Chasse's book "Les Belles Histoires du Couvent de Ste-Agathe," Paul Marin wrote: "The religious community of the Daughters of Wisdom, through their humility and grace, have enriched the little village of Ste. Agathe and the St. John Valley for a century. We are the beneficiaries of their selfless devotion, their hard work and sacrifices. It is right and fitting that in this hundredth year anniversary we celebrate and acknowledge their dedication."












EDWINA DUMOND DUFOUR 2004 MOTHER OF THE YEAR

Mde. Edwina was born on December 29, 1925 at Cyr's Cove in St. Agatha, the daughter of Alcime and Leda Dumond. At the age of 17, she left home to work in Lewiston, until her mother passed away in 1946. She then returned home to St. Agatha to help her sister Alphena take care of her 3 youngest siblings.


On November 25, 1947, Edwina married Armand Dufour. Together they had 7 children: Arnold, Allen, Danny, Davis, Galen, Gary and Lisa. They also raised Edwina's youngest brother Gerald, who was only 2 years old at the time of his mother's death. As a homemaker, Edwina was kept busy tending to their garden, picking and canning vegetables, sewing clothes and knitting slippers and socks for her own family, as well as friends and neighbors.

Edwina eventually went to work at the convent as a cook for the Daughters of Wisdom, a post she kept until the age of 75. She now serves as a Eucharistic Minister and is an active member of the Ladies of St. Anne. She can always be counted on to volunteer her time or cooking talents for fundraising events.

Louis Labrie

Louis Labrie, born at Lac à Basil in Fort Kent on March 22, 1916, the son of Jean Baptiste & Marie Vaillancourt Labrie, died June 20, 2004. Louis was active in many organizations, including Director of Federal Land Bank, Selectman for the Town of St. Agatha, School Board member, Director of the St. Agatha Federal Credit Union, and Board Director for the Ste-Agathe Historical Society.

Louis was married to Lorette Boucher of St. Agatha on September 13, 1941. They raised six daughters, Louise, Diane, Judy, Carol, Therese, Elaine and one son, Danny. All family members were involved in the farm, whether it was from taking care of the animals to cutting seed, picking potatoes and of course, tending to a large garden. Danny left teaching in 1974 and took over the family farm. Although Louis retired in 1981, he still kept track of what went on in the day to day operation of the farm. The farm has now grown, with Danny and Roberta's two older sons, Keith and Duane, joining in the running of the farm in 1989.

Louis was devoted to his family and his wife, Lorette, who currently resides at the St. Joseph Nursing Home in Frenchville. Louis will be remembered as a man with a strong sense of work ethics, of family, and of Christian values. He is surely missed.

Cecile Martin Ouellette Marshall

How many people can say that William McKinley was President when they were born? Cecile Marshall can. She was born on July 2, 1901 and has just celebrated her 103rd birthday.

The daughter of Belone and Angelique Franck Martin, Cecile was born in St. Agatha, the only girl in a family of 6 children. She attended school and was a 1918 graduate of Notre Dame de la Sagesse High School.


Cecile married Guillaume "Willie" Ouellette on January 29, 1923. The couple moved to Old Town, Maine where Willie worked for the railroad. Cecile was busy raising their five children. In 1944, Willie was killed in an accident, and Cecile found herself needing to go to work. She began working for the telephone company, where she worked for many years. It was there that she met her second husband, Arthur Marshall. They were married in 1952 and were together for 30 years. He died in 1982.

Today, Cecile lives in her own apartment in Madison, Maine. Not only does she live on her own, she still knits and crochets and does the Jumble puzzle in the newspaper every day. Devoted family members stop by during the day to visit and her granddaughter, Nancy O'Connell, helps Cecile with supper and stays overnight with her. She is the holder of the town's Boston Post Cane, which recognizes Cecile as it's oldest resident.

Six-Burner Kitchen Stove Acquisition



Gerald and Rose Marie Dubois donated this unique kitchen stove made by the Wehrle Co., of Newark, Ohio. This stove was originally owned by the Pierre Cyr family of Lille, ME. The Dubois purchased that home in 1973 and when they moved to St. Agatha brought the stove with them. Rose Marie Dubois remembers making *ployes* on this stove when she was employed at the Cyr residence. In the spring of 2004, they decided to donate it along with an old washing machine and a butter churn to the Ste. Agathe Historical Society. It took four strong men to move this rare collector's item. 

Heritage Trail Guides & Volunteers



The convent was demolished in 1968 and Patrick Albert, on leave from the U.S. Army, helped his father, Arthur Albert, with the demolition project. Patrick gave the five posts to Nancy Lizotte. Unfortunately, upon his return to duty, Patrick was deployed to Viet Nam and was killed on August 20, 1969. Thirty-six years later, Nancy and Jessie Michaud decided to donate the posts to the Ste-Agathe Historical Society. What will the Society do with the posts? They're looking for suggestions.

The book includes historical photographs and documents, a historical overview of the order, and the Valley at the time of their arrival in 1904.
