#### BANNER YEAR FOR PIONEER DRAMA

This play was so spectacular that it was featured at the Rotary's Annual Mother's Day Dinner on May 10th in Madawaska and again on May 29 along with last years regional award winning entry "Boom Box" at UMFK as a special fund raiser supporting the construction of a Memorial for the Vietnam Veterans.

Finally, as their last major production of the year, the drama club and director Clapp put on a musical called "Six Nights - Six Cities" on May 18, 19 and 20. They play was extremely well received as they drew above average crowds on all three nights.

What can we say except, the drama group has had one heck of a full and successful year! Thanks for your gifts, your talents, and your energy.




