


Srila Bhaktivedanta swami Prabhupada

Srila Prabhupada Departs October 25, 2025

Srila Prabhupada's Disappearance Day is observed annually to commemorate the departure of His Divine Grace A.C. Bhaktivedanta Swami Prabhupada, founder of ISKCON, from the world on November 14, 1977. Devotees worldwide remember him with personal recollections, readings from his biography, and devotional observances like chanting and distributing prasadam (sanctified food). His mission, teachings, and books are seen as his continued presence, reminding his followers that he "will live forever in my books".

Devotees celebrate this sacred day by:

- Recalling his life and teachings through personal tributes and readings from his biography.
- Participating in devotional activities such as chanting the holy name of Krishna.
- Offering abhisheka (ceremonial bathing) and vyasa-puja (offerings to the spiritual master) to his divine form.
- Distributing prasadam (sanctified food) to thousands of pilgrims.

Sharad Purnima - October 6, 2025

Sharad Purnima is one of the most famous Purnima(s) in <u>Hindu Calendar</u>.

On this day the Moon shines with all sixteen Kala(s) and its rays have certain healing properties which nourish the body and the soul. It is also believed that the moon rays on the day of Sharad Purnima drip nectar. Hence to take advantage of this divine phenomenon, traditionally on the day of Sharad Purnima, Rice-Kheer a famous Indian sweet dish made of cow milk, rice and sugar, is prepared and left in moonlight for the whole night. In the morning, Rice-Kheer which is believed to be invigorated and fortified with the moonlight is consumed and distributed as Prasad to family members.

Sharad Purnima is also known as Raas Purnima (रास पूर्णिमा). It is believed that on the day of Sharad Purnima Lord Krishna performed Maha-Raas, the dance of divine love. On the night of Sharad Purnima, upon hearing the divine music of Krishna's flute, Gopis of Vrindavan sneaked away from their homes and families to the forest to dance with Krishna throughout the night. It was the day when Lord Krishna created several of His forms to accompany each Gopi. It is believed that Lord Krishna supernaturally stretched the night to the length of one night of Lord Brahma, which was the equivalent of billions of human years.

Sharad Purnima will be celebrated at your temple in grand fashion, with new outfits, ornaments and fresh flowers for the Dieites. There will be kirtans, dancing (Garba, dandiya), Arathis and Puspanjalis all evening and a very delicious feast will be served at the end of the evening.

Experience the atmosphere of Vrindavan, relish the association of Sri Radha and Krishna and their devotees, and be transported to the spiritual world, Goloka Vrindavan, in this serene atmosphere. This is a lifetime experience to be cherished.

Krishna Lila at Goverdhan in Kartik

"Namaste Girirajaya sri govardhana namine;
Ashesha klesha nashaya parmananda dayine"
I offer my respectful obeisance to the King of all hills, Goverdhan (the source of enjoyment for the senses, land, and cows). He is a servant of Krishna and is Krishna himself. He puts an end to unlimited sufferings and bestows the supreme bliss.

When Krishna saw the residents of Vrindavana arranging for Indra-yajna (a traditional ceremony to please Indra, the chief-of-demigods, who is responsible for supplying water), He suggested that they forgo the worship of Indra and instead worship Govardhana Hill.

When Indra understood that the sacrifice which was to be offered by the cowherd men in Vrindavana had been stopped by Krishna, he became angry. He ordered Samvartaka (the cloud of devastation) to go over Vrindavana and inundate the whole area with an extensive flood. Riding on his elephant Airavata, he personally came to punish the inhabitants of Vrindavana. Ordered by King Indra, all the dangerous clouds appeared above Vrindavana and began to pour water incessantly, with all their strength and power. There was constant lightning and thunder, blowing of severe wind, and incessant falling of rain. The rain seemed to fall like piercing sharp arrows.

All the inhabitants of Vrindavana prayed to the Supreme Lord Krishna and took shelter at His lotus feet. Lord Krishna immediately picked up Govardhana Hill with one hand, and asked everyone to come under the umbrella of Govardhana Hill along with their properties and animals. For one week, they remained there without being affected by hunger, thirst or any other discomforts. Indra was astonished to see the little boy Krishna holding the Govardhana Hill on the little finger of His left hand and protecting Vrindavana from the devastating rainfall.

He immediately called for all the clouds and asked them to desist. The sky became completely cleared of all clouds and there was sunrise again, the strong wind stopped. All the inhabitants of Vrindavana came out and Krishna replaced the Govardhana Hill in its place. Indra, the King of heaven, became conscious of his offense before Krishna; therefore he stealthily appeared before Him and immediately fell down at the lotus feet of Krishna and offered his prayers.

A devotee who is engaged in the service of Krishna is free from all obligations. He has no other duty to perform. He need not perform any ritualistic functions enjoined in the Vedas; nor is he required to worship any devatas. Krishna wanted to firmly establish this principle during His presence in Vrindavana.

Goverdhan lila is celebrated at your temple with a makeshift goverdhan hill being held up by Gopal. The hill is decorated with sweets and savories, and various preparations, as an offering to this most auspicious hill. Aarti and puspanjali and circumambulating the hill three times marks this most glorious celebration.

The offerings are then shared with all participants, together with a very delicious dinner.

Anyone who participates in this wonderful celebration becomes the recipient of Lord Krishna's mercy and at the end of this life returns back to Goloka, the eternal abode of Krishna.

The Month of Damodar (Kartik)

Damodar Lila refers to the pastime (lila) of Lord Krishna when His foster mother, Yashoda, binds Him with a rope around His belly as punishment for His mischievous acts, such as stealing butter. He runs away in fear but eventually allows Himself to be bound, a divine act made possible by His mother's pure love. This story, found in the Srimad-Bhagavatam, highlights Krishna's accessibility and the power of devotion, celebrated by devotees during the month of Kartika with Damodarastakam. The month of Kartik is referred to as Damodar month due to this wonderful pasttime of Lord Krishna.

Divine Accessibility:

 The lila shows that the Supreme Lord, though powerful, can be controlled by the pure, selfless love of His devotees.

The Power of Love:

 Krishna is bound not by physical strength but by the love and devotion of His mother, demonstrating that sincere love can bring the divine closer.

Spiritual Connection:

 Devotees celebrate this lila by singing the Damodarastakam and lighting ghee lamps during the month of Kartika, honoring Krishna's sweetness and accessibility.

Utilize the month of Damodar in acquiring unlimited blessings by singing the damodarastakam with devotees and lighting a lamp at the temple every evening.

This is a very auspicious month for donations and devotional service at your temple.

Deepavali

Significance and Symbolism Light over Darkness:

The most prominent theme is the victory of light, representing spiritual enlightenment and inner truth, over darkness, symbolizing ignorance and evil.

Victory of Good:

The festival commemorates the victory of good over evil, notably the return of Lord Rama to his kingdom after defeating the demon king Ravana, a story central to Hindu tradition.

New Beginnings:

Diwali marks the beginning of the Hindu New Year, a time for new ventures and positive change.

Key Traditions

<u>Lighting Diyas:</u>

Families light numerous small clay lamps (diyas) and place them in and around their homes to welcome prosperity and good fortune.

Worship:

The main day involves puja (worship) of deities, especially Lakshmi, the goddess of wealth and prosperity, and Ganesha, the god of wisdom and good fortune.

Feasts and Sweets:

People gather for family feasts and exchange sweet dishes (mithai) with loved ones.

Rangoli Designs:

Intricate and colorful patterns are created on the floor using rice, flowers, or powders to decorate homes and welcome good fortune.

Fireworks:

Fireworks are a common part of the celebrations, adding to the festive atmosphere.

Gift Exchange:

Families and friends exchange gifts and blessings, reinforcing relationships and spreading joy.

Gopastami

The Significance of Gopastami Krishna's Transition:

Before Gopastami, Krishna was only allowed to tend to calves. On this day, he graduated to the role of a cowherd, which is a significant milestone in his life.

Cow Worship:

Cows are revered in Hinduism as sacred and are considered a source of nourishment, like a mother. Gopastami emphasizes the special status of cows in daily life and their importance in the spiritual context.

Environmental Protection:

By honoring Krishna's love for cows and nature, the festival encourages devotees to follow in his footsteps and promote cow welfare and protection.

How Gopastami is Celebrated Cow Decoration:

Cows are bathed, cleaned, and adorned with clothes, jewels, and sindoor (red powder). Their horns are often painted, and they are decorated with colorful sindoor and bills (garlands).

Puja and Prayers:

Devotees worship Krishna and perform cow puja (worship), often in a <u>Goshala</u> (cow shelter).

Feeding and Feasting:

Devotees feed cows with fresh grass and other foods as a gesture of reverence.

They also organize feasts to celebrate the occasion.

Discussions and Teachings:

Senior devotees share stories and teachings about the glories of cows and the importance of cow protection.

Radharani's Role:

It's also a special occasion where Srimati Radharani and Her close friends are dressed as cowherd boys, resembling a cowherder, to join in the festivities.

Translation:

- (1) To the Supreme Lord, whose form is the embodiment of eternal existence, knowledge, and bliss, whose shark-shaped earrings are swinging to and fro, who is beautifully shining in the divine realm of Gokula, who [due to the offense of breaking the pot of yogurt that His mother was churning into butter and then stealing the butter that was kept hanging from a swing] is quickly running from the wooden grinding mortar in fear of mother Yasoda, but who has been caught from behind by her who ran after Him with greater speed—to that Supreme Lord, Sri Damodara, I offer my humble obeisances.
- (2) Seeing the whipping stick in His mother's hand,] He is crying and rubbing His eyes again and again with His two lotus hands. His eyes are filled with fear, and the necklace of pearls around His neck, which is marked with three lines like a conchshell, is shaking because of His quick breathing due to crying. To this Supreme Lord, Sri Damodara, whose belly is bound not with ropes but with His mother's pure love, I offer my humble obeisances.
- (3) By such childhood pastimes as this He is drowning the inhabitants of Gokula in pools of ecstasy, and is revealing to those devotees who are absorbed in knowledge of His supreme majesty and opulence that He is only conquered by devotees whose pure love is imbued with intimacy and is free from all conceptions of awe and reverence. With great love I again offer my obeisances to Lord Damodara hundreds and hundreds of times.
 - (4) O Lord, although You are able to give all kinds of benedictions, I do not pray to You for the boon of impersonal liberation, nor the highest liberation of eternal life in Vaikuntha, nor any other boon [which may be obtained by executing the nine processes of bhakti]. O Lord, I simply wish that this form of Yours as Bala Gopala in Vrindavana may ever be manifest in my heart, for what is the use to me of any other boon besides this?
- (5) O Lord, Your lotus face, which is encircled by locks of soft black hair tinged with red, is kissed again and again by mother Yasoda, and Your lips are reddish like the bimba fruit. May this beautiful vision of Your lotus face be ever manifest in my heart. Thousands and thousands of other benedictions are of no use to me.
- (6) O Supreme Godhead, I offer my obeisances unto You. O Damodara! O Ananta! O Vishnu! O master! O my Lord, be pleased upon me. By showering Your glance of mercy upon me, deliver this poor ignorant fool who is immersed in an ocean of worldly sorrows, and become visible to my eyes.
- (7) O Lord Damodara, just as the two sons of Kuvera—Manigriva and Nalakuvara—were delivered from the curse of Narada and made into great devotees by You in Your form as a baby tied with rope to a wooden grinding mortar, in the same way, please give to me Your own prema-bhakti. I only long for this and have no desire for any kind of liberation.
- (8) O Lord Damodara, I first of all offer my obeisances to the brilliantly effulgent rope which binds Your belly. I then offer my obeisances to Your belly, which is the abode of the entire universe. I humbly bow down to Your most beloved Srimati Radharani, and I offer all obeisances to You, the Supreme Lord, who displays unlimited pastimes.



ISKCON was established by our Founder Acarya HDG Srila

The 7 purposes clearly lay down the foundation on which ISKCON was built and continues to thrive. These seven purposes are:

- 6. To bring the members closer together for the purpose of teaching a simpler, more natural way of life.
- 7. With a view towards achieving the aforementioned purposes, to publish and distribute periodicals, magazines, books and other writings.
