International Seafarer's Center / Lutheran Maritime Ministry

Did you know.....The International Seafarer's Center started in 1982 in a bus reaching out to Merchant Seafarers, much in the same way as the USO did to the military during the world wars.

Now, they are a non-profit organization with a 13 member board of directors, located on South Pico Ave. in the center of the Port of Long Beach. The center has a large common room complete with a ping pong table, pool table, separate T.V. and reading room, computer and telephone room, chapel and small store.

This center serves seafarers from Noon-10 p.m. six days a week and is run by two women and many volunteers. They have four vans that pick the merchant seamen up from the ships and bring them to the center (at no charge to them) and take them shopping at Wal-Mart if they desire. At the center they can enjoy complimentary refreshments and browse through the "back room" where they can take a jacket, pants, shoes and anything else they need, also at no charge.

Now I want you to close your eyes and think of yourself back home. Practically everything you picture in your mind's eye (furniture, knickknacks on shelves, food, and clothing) came to us by these huge ships. At any given time there are 60-80 ships in port. Long Beach is the largest port in the U.S, the third largest in the world. A crew of only 21-24 men and sometimes women runs these ships. They are paid below poverty level salary. The top pay is around \$800.00 a month for a 12 hour, often dangerous, day.

The seafarers come from all countries around the world; places you have heard of like Russia, Bulgaria, China, and Indonesia and places you haven't heard of like Tuvalu and Kiribati located in the South Seas. These people are away from their families for up to ten months at a time. But to them it is a way to support their family (which may include parents, grandparents as well as their wives and children). Often there is no work available in their homeland and they are forced to work long hard hours on these freighters.

So where does the Lutheran Maritime Ministry come in, you ask? Well at the 2000 Pacifica W.E.L.C.A Convention, Chaplain Virginia Sharma spoke to the women about the International Seafarer's Center and explained that the Lutheran Ministry reaches out to seafarers of all nations and cultures with Christian Witness and Word, meeting personal needs and encouraging spiritual growth. This is where your donations come in. At Christmas time over 2,000 gift bags are assembled and distributed to the seafarers.

The Lutherans are the main providers of the items that make up these "gift bags.

Susan Schneider and I spent an evening last year putting the bags together and had the opportunity to meet some of these amazing people. These are the only gifts they will receive at Christmas. Let me know if you want to help, at the center, this December.

Imagine yourself in a strange country where no one speaks your language, you are away from your loved ones and you can't even communicate that you need toothpaste. In a small but important way the International Seafarer's Center in conjunction with the Lutheran Maritime Ministry (of which we are all a part) can bring some joy to these deserving men and women.

ELCA Malaria Campaign Kicks Off

ometimes, in the midst of work, holiday preparations and news reports about the latest natural disaster or scandal, we can all use a reminder that there are wonderful, amazing things in this world. The ELCA and Pacifica Synod are involved in one. It's called the ELCA Malaria Campaign.

Malaria is rare in the United States, but in other parts of the world, including places where our companion churches are located, it kills about 800,000 people a year. According to the Centers for Disease Control, it is the leading cause of death for children under five in Africa. It kills people in some of the poorest parts of the world, people already fighting malnutrition and AIDS. And malaria is treatable and preventable; we know what causes it, how to prevent it, and how to treat people infected with it.

Jesus told us that whatever we do for the least of our brothers and sisters, we do for him. The time has come for us to do something about malaria, and the ELCA is doing just that. Through the ELCA Malaria Campaign, and in coordination with our companion churches in Africa, the ELCA is working to control malaria deaths by 2015, and the Pacifica Synod is one of the pilot synods leading the way.

Here is how the Campaign works. Because each of our companion churches has its own unique set of circumstances, each church will submit a long term plan for how they will use the money to fight Malaria. We have already received some of the plans.

Part of the money will go to spraying and to distributing insecticide-treated nets and teach people how to use them. You see, a parasite causes malaria. Mosquitoes carry the parasite. When the infected mosquitoes bite someone, usually while they are sleeping, the parasite infects them, giving them malaria. Bed nets stop the mosquitoes, protecting people, especially children, from malaria. A bed net to protect a child costs just \$10, but many families in Africa live on less than that per month, so distributing bed nets will be an important first step.

Part of the money is likely to go to education, to teach people what causes malaria and how to avoid it. For example, because mosquitoes carry the disease, and mosquitoes breed in standing water, getting rid of standing water reduces the number of mosquitoes, which reduces the amount of malaria.

Long-term goals including things like creating a medical infrastructure where one does not already exist. Where our companion churches need them, money will go to building clinics and training first responders. This is where the project starts to get very interesting, because building a medical infrastructure has ripple effect: clinics and first responders can treat other conditions besides malaria, increasing project's benefits.

Another long term goal with ripple effects is to help our companion churches build the capacity to access other funds. Organizations exist that have funds available, but to get access to those funds our companion churches need to know how to write a grant request, put together and run a program, and monitor finances and program goals, and be able to show they can do all these things. As our companion churches build this capacity, they will gain access to additional sources of funding that they can use to improve their communities.

Evangelism works on the other end, too. When you reflect Christ's love, it reaches more than just the people on the receiving end; it changes attitudes all around you. The image of Christianity in this country has suffered in the media in the last several years. Projects like the ELCA Malaria Campaign do more than just tell people what we believe, they demonstrate it through our actions. And people here will respond. Some of them will want to know what kind of people would do such things, and why, and some of them will want to be apart of it.

All of which brings us back to the Pacifica Synod. The campaign is starting, and we are among the first synods to participate. The work we do will save lives, reduce suffering, control a disease that has been with us since before recorded history, build medical infrastructures and the capacity to reach additional funds, and reflect Christ's love in the world. And when we have done our part, we will pass the lessons we learn along to other synods.

The ELCA Malaria Campaign is starting now. Come, join us! God's work. Our hands.

12 Days of Christmas

Actually the 12 Days of Christmas was developed as a teaching song. From 1558 to 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not able to practice their faith openly so they had to find other ways to pass on their beliefs. The song "The Twelve Days of Christmas" is one example of how they did it. "The 12 Days of Christmas" is in a sense an allegory. Each of the items in the song represents something of religious significance. The hidden meaning of each gift was designed to help young Christians learn their faith.

The song goes, "On the first day of Christmas my true love gave to me..." The "true love" represents God and the "me" represents the Christians.

The "partridge in a pear tree" is Jesus Christ who died on a tree or cross as a gift from God for the whole world.

The "two turtle doves" are the Old and New Testaments.

The "three French hens" are faith, hope and love - the three gifts of the Spirit that abide (1 Corinthians 13).

The "four calling birds" are the four Gospels which sing the song of salvation through Jesus Christ.

The "five golden rings" are the first five books of the Bible also called the "Books of Moses" or the Pentateuch.

The "six geese a-laying" are the six days of creation.

The "seven swans a swimming" are the "seven gifts of the Holy Spirit." (1Corinthians 12:8-11, Romans 12 and Ephesians 4)

The "eight maids of milking" are the eight beatitudes.

The "nine ladies dancing" are nine fruits of the Holy Spirit. (Galatians 5:22-23)

The "ten lords a-leaping" are the Ten Commandments.

The "eleven pipers piping" are the eleven faithful Disciples.

And the "twelve drummers drumming" are the twelve points of the Apostles' Creed.

Thank you, God, for the gift of this day and for the opportunity to do your will today and every day. Grant that we may joyfully respond to your call and offer you thanks and praise, through Jesus Christ our Lord.
