Important — clearing US Customs at Miami on the way home. Anguilla → Miami is your re-entry into the United States. At MIA everyone must **clear US Immigration & Customs, collect checked bags, re-check them, and pass security again** before the next flight.

- **Baltimore travelers:** you have ~3h40m in Miami — plenty of time, but expect the full customs process.
- **Portugal travelers:** you have ~1h55m between landing (5:20 PM) and AA68 (7:15 PM). That's tighter — clear customs promptly and go straight to your Madrid gate.

A time zone note worth reading twice

In August, Anguilla is on the same clock as the US East Coast — no time change at all for travellers flying from Baltimore. Your phone will not shift and your body will not either.

Portugal group: Madrid is 6 hours ahead of Anguilla, Lisbon 5 hours ahead. You lose most of a night in the air.

Your Countdown

FOUR WEEKS OUT	• Check your passport expiry — you want validity well beyond August 2026 • Buy travel insurance if you haven't. Most policies limit what they cover the closer you buy to departure • Book any spa treatments, dinner reservations, or golf you want locked in • Refill prescriptions so you have the full trip plus a few days
TWO WEEKS OUT	• Set up your eSIM, or call your carrier about a Caribbean plan • Tell your bank and credit card company you are travelling • Confirm your seat assignments and check baggage allowances with the airline • Download the American Airlines app, offline Google Maps for Anguilla, and save this handbook to your phone

ONE WEEK OUT

- Get US\$150–200 per person in small bills from your own bank — better rates than the airport
- Photograph your passport and cards, and email the photos to yourself
- Check the tropical weather outlook (see Section 7)
- Fill in the two blanks on your Section 1 contact card

THE NIGHT BEFORE

- Count out US\$25–28 cash per person for the departure tax and put it somewhere you won't unpack it
- Medication, swimwear, and one change of clothes into your carry-on
- Charge your phone and your power bank
- Set your alarm early — Sunday's departure is an early start

Please read this if you are continuing to Portugal

Everyone re-enters the United States at Miami, which means clearing immigration, collecting your checked bags, re-checking them, and going back through security — even though you are flying straight out again.

You have **1 hour 55 minutes** to do all of it. That is tight. Move quickly off the aircraft, have your passport out and ready, and don't stop for food before you have re-checked your bags — you can eat airside. If you are held up in the immigration queue, tell an American Airlines agent immediately that you are connecting to AA68 to Madrid.

Baltimore travellers have 3 hours 43 minutes at Miami and can take it at a normal pace.

3. Getting Around

Anguilla has no public buses, no Uber and no Lyft. You will move by pre-arranged private transfer, taxi, or rental car. This is worth knowing before you plan anything spontaneous.

Your transfers

Your group transfers are pre-arranged through Sunlinc. Before you travel you will receive your driver's name, mobile number, and confirmed pickup time.

- **Be at the pickup point 10–15 minutes early, every time.** Island timing is relaxed; your boat and your van are not.
- Your driver will be waiting in the arrivals hall or resort lobby with a name sign or the group name.
- **If no driver appears:** call the number on your confirmation first. Wait 15 minutes. Then call the resort front desk on 1-844-668-5759. If it is still unresolved, email Global Celebrations.

Taxis

Fares are government-set and posted at the airport — not metered, and charged per vehicle, not per person. AXA to Rendezvous Bay runs roughly US\$24–30.

A 25% surcharge applies after 6:00 PM and all day Sunday — worth knowing, since both your arrival and departure days are Sundays. Agree the fare before you set off. Drivers often make excellent informal guides.

Rental cars

If you are renting:

- Anguilla drives on the **LEFT**.
- You must buy a temporary Anguilla driving permit (about US\$25), issued on the spot against your valid home licence.
- Roads are narrow, unlit at night, and shared with the occasional goat. Drive slowly.
- Anyone in the group who wants to drive will need a temporary Anguilla driving permit. Your home licence alone is not enough. The permit costs around US\$25, is issued on the spot against your valid licence, and rental agencies will normally arrange it for you at the counter when you collect the car — so bring your physical licence, not a photo of it. One permit per driver, so if two of you plan to share the driving, both of you need one. Remember that Anguilla drives on the left, roads are narrow and unlit after dark, and the 25% Sunday and after-6:00 PM taxi surcharge is often still cheaper than the stress of an unfamiliar car on your first evening. If you are driving, taxi home from anything involving rum punch.

Clayton J. Lloyd International Airport (AXA)

AXA is small, which is mostly a gift — you will clear it faster than any airport you are used to. A few things follow from the size:

- **Arrive about two hours before departure on 9 August.** There is limited seating and very limited food once you are through, so eat before or bring something.
- **The departure tax is collected here, in cash.** Have it in hand before you join the queue.
- Flights to and from Anguilla are operated on small regional aircraft. Overhead space is tight and your carry-on may be gate-checked at the aircraft door — it is returned to you on the jet bridge on arrival. Keep medication, passports, phones and chargers in a small bag you can hold on your lap.
- The airport code AXA is what appears on your boarding pass. The airport is also called Wallblake locally, and drivers may use either name.

The St. Martin ferry — Tuesday 4 August

The crossing leaves from Blowing Point for St. Martin / St. Maarten. This is an **international border crossing: your passport must be on you, both directions**. Expect the ferry fare plus an Anguilla departure fee at the terminal — see Section 4.

Friday 7 August — parade day

The Grand Parade of Troupes runs through The Valley from 11:00 AM and streets close for it. Your driver may not be able to drop you at the parade route itself, so expect a short walk in and a longer one out.

Agree a clear pickup point and time with your driver before you get out of the vehicle, and note the landmark — phone signal in a crowd is unreliable.

4. Money & Payments

Currency

The local currency is the East Caribbean Dollar (EC\$), at roughly **US\$1 = EC\$2.68**. In practice you will not need it — **US dollars are accepted everywhere on the island**. If you are given change in EC\$, spend it before you leave; it is hard to exchange at home.

Cards and cash

Cards are widely accepted at the resort, restaurants and larger shops. Carry some cash anyway — smaller vendors, beach bars, festival stalls, taxi drivers and tips all go more smoothly with small US bills.

- **US\$150–200 per person in small notes** covers a comfortable week, plus your departure tax.
- **ATMs are in The Valley and at the airport, not at the resort**. Draw what you need before you leave town.
- **Call your bank before you fly** — both to flag the travel and to check your card’s foreign transaction fee.

Tipping

Porters	A dollar or two per bag

Sunday and public holiday closures

Both your arrival and departure days are Sundays. Anguilla is quiet on Sundays — many shops and some restaurants are closed or on limited hours, and taxi rates carry a 25% surcharge. This matters mostly on arrival day: if you want anything from a shop, plan it for Monday. The resort operates normally throughout.

Bringing things home — the Tuesday shopping day

St. Martin is duty-free, and is the reason Tuesday exists on this itinerary. Two things to know before you spend:

- Returning US residents generally have a personal exemption of around **US\$800 each**, with a limited allowance on alcohol for travellers 21 and over. Exceeding it is not a problem — you simply declare it and pay duty on the excess.
- Keep your receipts and declare honestly on your customs form at Miami. **The one thing that causes trouble is not declaring.**
- Anything liquid — rum, perfume — must go in checked baggage, and you re-check your bags at Miami anyway. Buy it in a bag you can hand over.

Allowances change; the office will confirm current figures with your final documents.

5. Staying Connected

- **Buy a data plan before you fly.** Check what your US carrier charges for Caribbean roaming, or set up an eSIM (Airalo, Holafly and similar) that activates when you land. An eSIM is usually the cheaper option.
- **Resort Wi-Fi is free** in the suites and public areas.
- **Why it matters:** your transfer driver, any QR-coded tickets, maps, and your group's messages all assume your phone has data. Don't rely on Wi-Fi once you leave the resort — and Friday and Saturday both keep you out late and off-property.
- **Before you go:** download offline Google Maps for Anguilla, and the American Airlines app (plus Iberia, for the Portugal group).

Calling and dialling

Anguilla is +1-264 and sits inside the North American numbering plan, so a number looks and dials exactly like a US one. **This is where people get caught out:** your phone dials it like a domestic call, but your carrier bills it as international roaming. Confirm your plan covers Anguilla specifically, not just “Caribbean,” before you rely on it.

- **From Anguilla to the US:** dial 1 + area code + number
- **Within Anguilla:** dial the seven digits, or the full +1-264 number
- WhatsApp, iMessage and FaceTime over Wi-Fi cost nothing — the simplest way to keep in touch with home
- **Set up a group chat for all 20 of you before you leave.** It is the single most useful thing you can do for a trip this size.

Time difference for calling home

Anguilla runs on the same clock as the US East Coast in August, so calls home need no arithmetic. Portugal group: once you land, Lisbon is 5 hours ahead of Anguilla and Madrid 6 — early afternoon there is breakfast time at home.

6. Dos & Don'ts

Tailored to this week, this island, and this itinerary.

DO	Carry your passport on your three border days Arrival (2 Aug), the St. Martin day trip (Tue 4 Aug), and departure (9 Aug). On every other day, leave it in the room safe and carry a photo or scan.
DO	Cover up off the beach Anguilla expects modest dress in town, in shops and in restaurants. Swimwear stays at the beach and pool. No topless or nude sunbathing anywhere.
DO	Dress for Wednesday evening The Private Beach Celebration at C Level is the night everyone will have photos of. Resort-elegant — sundresses, linen shirts, dressy sandals. Not beachwear, and skip stiletto heels on sand.
DO	Be ready early For every transfer, tee time and excursion pickup. Ten to fifteen minutes, every time.
DO	Embrace the festival Your week falls inside Anguilla's Summer Festival, and the Grand Parade of Troupes and the Calypso Monarch competition are the genuine article, not a tourist show. Enjoy the music and colour — and ask before photographing individual locals or performers close up.
DO	Use reef-safe sunscreen, and go easy on day one August sun here is stronger than it looks. See Section 7.
DON'T	Drink and drive If you have rented a car: left side of the road, temporary permit required. The drinking age is 18 and all of you are well past it — but taxi home.
DON'T	Leave your departure tax cash to the last minute on 9 August Count it out the night before.

7. Sun, Sea & Staying Well

Anguilla in August is beautiful and genuinely demanding on the body. Nearly everything that goes wrong on a trip like this comes down to three things: **sun, heat, and water**. None of them are dangerous if you plan for them. All three catch people out on day one.

This section is general guidance, not medical advice. If you have a condition affecting heat tolerance, sun sensitivity, or swimming, speak to your own doctor before you travel.

7.1 The Sun

Take this seriously even if you never burn at home. Anguilla's UV index in August reaches **extreme levels — regularly 11 and above**. At those readings, unprotected skin and eyes can burn in under 10 minutes. The worst of it falls roughly between noon and 3 PM, which is exactly when Wednesday's boat trip and Friday's parade take place.

How to use sunscreen properly

Most people use a quarter of what they need and reapply half as often as they should.

- Choose a **broad-spectrum sunscreen, SPF 30 or higher**, labelled for both UVA and UVB protection. (CDC Yellow Book)
- Apply at least **15 minutes before** going outside, and use enough — about one fluid ounce, roughly a shot glass, to cover exposed skin. (CDC Yellow Book; FDA)
- **Reapply every two hours**, and again after swimming, sweating, or towelling off. (CDC)
- No sunscreen is waterproof. A “water-resistant 40 minutes” or “80 minutes” label tells you how long you keep the stated protection *in the water* — not all afternoon. (FDA)
- Don't forget ears, tops of feet, back of the neck, your scalp parting, and lips.

Sunscreen alone is not enough

No single method fully protects you. Combine sunscreen with shade, clothing and sunglasses. (NEEF; FDA)

- Wear a hat with a brim right the way around, **at least three inches wide**, shading face, neck and ears. A standard baseball cap is not enough. (CDC Yellow Book)
- Wear sunglasses rated for both UVA and UVB. UV reflecting off water and sand adds to your total exposure — on the boat Wednesday you are being hit from above and below. (CDC Yellow Book)
- A **long-sleeve rash guard or UPF shirt** protects more skin, more reliably, than any amount of lotion — and it doesn't wash off.
- Use the shade between 11 AM and 3 PM wherever there is any.

Reef-safe sunscreen — what it actually means

Prickly Pear sits inside a protected marine park, so this matters here rather than being a slogan.

- Avoid **oxybenzone** and **octinoxate**, the two chemicals most strongly linked to reef harm. Choose a **non-nano mineral** formula based on zinc oxide or titanium dioxide — “non-nano” means the particles are too large for coral to ingest. (REI Expert Advice, citing National Park Service)

- “Reef-safe” on the front of a bottle is **not a regulated claim**. A product labelled “mineral” may still contain chemical filters, and mineral ingredients must be non-nano to count. Turn the bottle over and read the active ingredients. (Save the Reef; Treeline Review)
- **Buy it before you fly.** Choice is limited on the island and prices are not.

If you do burn

Get out of the sun, cool the skin, drink more than you want to, and use aloe or an after-sun gel. Take a pain reliever if you need one. Get medical help if you blister badly, feel feverish or chilled, or feel unwell — a serious burn is a medical problem, not just a bad look in the photos.

7.2 Heat

Heat stroke is a medical emergency and can cause death or permanent disability without emergency treatment. (CDC) The difference between the two conditions below is worth knowing before you are standing in a crowded street in The Valley on Friday.

Heat exhaustion — treat it now	Heat stroke — call 911 immediately
Signs Heavy sweating, cold or clammy skin, headache, dizziness, nausea, muscle cramps, weakness, a fast weak pulse, and feeling irritable or wrung out. What to do Move into shade or air conditioning, loosen tight clothing, sip cool — not ice-cold — water, and apply cool damp cloths. Rest properly; don’t get straight back up. Get medical help if the person is vomiting, if symptoms worsen, or if they last longer than an hour. (CDC; Cleveland Clinic)	Signs Confusion, slurred speech, agitation or odd behaviour, fainting, and skin that feels very hot to the touch. Sweating may stop altogether, and body temperature can climb dangerously within 10 to 15 minutes. The key difference is the change in thinking and behaviour. What to do Call 911 first, then move the person into shade or air conditioning, remove outer clothing, and cool them as fast as you can with cold water, wet cloths or ice packs. Stay with them. Do not give fluids to anyone confused, drowsy or unconscious. (CDC; Cleveland Clinic)

Staying ahead of it

- **Drink water steadily all day, not just when you are thirsty.** Electrolyte tablets or sachets are worth packing.
- Alcohol dehydrates you and raises your risk of heat illness. (NOAA) Rum punch in full midday sun is the classic Caribbean mistake. Alternate every drink with water.
- Light-coloured, loose, breathable clothing beats anything tight or synthetic.
- **Watch each other.** The person with heat stroke is often the last to realise it — that is what the confusion means. In a group of 20, look out for the quiet one who has gone strange.
- **Highest-risk windows on this trip:** Monday’s festival, 12–8 PM, and Friday’s parade in The Valley at 11 AM. Both outdoors, both with limited shade.

7.3 Water

The single most important thing on this page

There are no lifeguards on any beach in Anguilla. All beaches are public and none are guarded — including the beach in front of your resort. (Anguilla Beach Guide; Visit Anguilla)

Nobody is watching the water. You are each other's lifeguards.

The good news: Rendezvous Bay offers some of the calmest swimming on the island — sheltered, southwest-facing, with a soft sandy seabed and a gentle slope into the sea that suits swimmers of every level. (Anguilla Ferry Times) This is about as benign as Caribbean swimming gets. The rules below still apply.

Basic water sense

- **Never swim alone, and never swim at night.**
- Tell someone where you are going and roughly when you will be back.
- **Don't swim after drinking.** Alcohol affects judgement, coordination and breath control, and is a factor in a large share of drownings.
- Enter feet-first somewhere you can see the bottom. Never dive into unknown water.
- Watch the beach before you get in. If one patch looks churned up, sandy or choppy, stay out of that patch.
- Anguilla's south-facing beaches, including yours, are generally calm. The north and Atlantic side can be a different matter — be far more cautious at an unfamiliar beach on a free day.

Rip currents — how to get out of one

Rendezvous Bay is not known for them, but every ocean beach can produce one, and this is knowledge worth having before you need it.

A rip current pulls you away from shore, not under it. (NOAA)

- **Don't fight it.** Swimming straight back against the current will only exhaust you. (NOAA)
- **Float and stay calm.** If you can't swim out of it, float or calmly tread water. (NOAA)
- **Swim parallel to the beach** to get out of the channel — most rip currents are less than 80 feet wide. (NOAA)
- Once free, angle back to shore with the breaking waves rather than straight in.
- Wave and shout for help at any point.

If you see someone else caught in one: shout for help and throw them something that floats. **Don't swim out yourself** — even trained lifeguards make rescues with a flotation device, and would-be rescuers drown alarmingly often. (NOAA)

Wednesday's speedboat charter to Prickly Pear

- **Listen to the crew's safety briefing.** Note where the life jackets are before you leave the dock. If you are a weak swimmer, wear one — nobody will think anything of it.
- Stay seated while the boat is underway, and keep one hand on the boat whenever you move.
- Shade is limited on the Prickly Pear beaches, and there is little to none on the boat. Hat, sunglasses, rash guard, and sunscreen applied before you board.
- **Motion-sickness tablets work if taken before you sail, not after.**
- Secure phones and sunglasses. A dry bag is a good investment.
- There are restaurants and bars on Prickly Pear East — bring cash.

Snorkelling and the marine park

The waters around the Prickly Pear cays are a protected marine park, where damaging or removing any flora, fauna or artifact is prohibited. Endangered hawksbill and green turtles nest on the beaches of Prickly Pear East. (ProtectedSeas

Navigator; Caribbean Birding Trail)

- **Touch nothing.** Not coral, not turtles, not anything. Coral is a living animal, and even light contact kills it.
- Never stand on the reef. If you need to rest, roll onto your back and float.
- Snorkel with a buddy and keep each other in view.
- Check where the boat is every few minutes — currents move you further than you notice.
- Keep clear of nesting birds and turtles on the beach.
- If you see a turtle or a ray, enjoy it from a distance and let it pass.

Sargassum seaweed

Sargassum can periodically wash ashore in parts of Rendezvous Bay. (Anguilla Ferry Times) It is harmless — unattractive and slightly eggy as it decomposes, but not dangerous. The resort clears its stretch. If a patch bothers you, walk a little further; the beach is nearly two miles long.

7.4 Stings, Spines and Scrapes

Rare, but the reason to bring water shoes and to know these protocols. The rule underneath all of it: **look before you step, and don't touch anything you can't identify.**

Sea urchins

Black spiny urchins sit in rocky crevices and shallow ledges. Standing on one is the most common water injury in the Caribbean.

- Get out of the water and sit down.
- **Soak the area in hot water** — as hot as you can stand without scalding, around 110–113°F. This usually gives real pain relief. Soak for 30 to 90 minutes, topping up the heat as it cools. (Divers Alert Network)
- Only remove spines standing clearly proud of the skin, with sterilised tweezers, pulling straight out.
- **Do not dig.** Digging around in the skin risks crushing the spines and making them harder to remove. (Divers Alert Network)
- Purple or black marks right after an encounter are often just dye leached from the spine, and fade over 24 to 48 hours. If marks remain after 48 to 72 hours, a fragment is probably still in there. (Divers Alert Network)

- **See a doctor** if spines are retained in a hand or foot or near a joint — or at any sign of infection: spreading redness, warmth, swelling, pus, or fever. (Divers Alert Network)

Prevention: water shoes, and shuffle rather than stride where you can't see the bottom.

Jellyfish and fire coral

Fire coral looks like mustard-coloured coral and stings on contact. Stings burn immediately and can raise welts and blisters.

- Get out of the water.
- **Rinse with seawater — never fresh water.** Fresh water makes the remaining stinging cells fire.
- Don't rub the area, and don't rinse with sand. Both make it worse.
- Remove tentacle fragments with tweezers or the edge of a card — not bare fingers.
- Rinse the area with **household vinegar** — for ordinary jellyfish stings and fire coral. If you don't have vinegar, use seawater or a baking soda paste. A travel-size bottle of white vinegar in your beach bag is one of the best-value things you can pack. (Divers Alert Network)

The exception: Portuguese man-of-war

If the sting came from a floating blue or purple balloon-like creature with long trailing tentacles, **do not use vinegar** — it can release more venom and make the sting worse. (Cleveland Clinic) Rinse with seawater only, remove tentacles carefully, and use hot water or a cold pack for the pain. If you are not sure what stung you, rinse with seawater and ask the crew or the resort before reaching for vinegar.

- Hot water, heat packs, cold packs or ice can then help with pain — but never put ice or unheated fresh water directly onto the skin. (Divers Alert Network)
- Hydrocortisone cream or an oral antihistamine helps with the itching afterwards.
- **Do not use urine.** It doesn't work and isn't recommended.

Get medical help immediately for difficulty breathing, chest tightness, swelling of the face or throat, a very widespread sting, or if the person feels faint or unwell.

Coral cuts

Even a light scrape from coral or rock traps bacteria and infects readily in warm water. Scrub it out properly with clean water and soap, apply antiseptic, and watch it for a couple of days. If it reddens, swells or throbs, see a doctor rather than waiting it out.

7.5 Hurricane Season — the honest version

Your trip falls inside the Atlantic hurricane season, which runs June through November and reaches its peak from mid-August onward. Most August weeks in Anguilla pass with nothing more than passing showers, and the island is well practised at this. But it is the reason we keep saying travel insurance.

What we would ask you to do:

- Buy insurance that covers trip interruption and weather-related delay, and note the 24-hour assistance number on your Section 1 card.
- From about a week out, glance at the National Hurricane Center outlook at nhc.noaa.gov.
- If anything is developing, we and the resort will be in touch before you fly. **Do not make your own changes** — call Phyllis first, since airlines usually issue free change waivers in these situations and cancelling on your own forfeits that.

If a storm is forecast while you are on the island, the resort will brief you directly. **Follow their instructions rather than anything you read online.**

7.6 Everyday Health

Tap water	Treated and generally safe. The resort supplies drinking water, and bottled is widely available if you prefer it. Bring a refillable bottle.
Mosquitoes	They come out at dusk. Repellent before dinner, every evening.
Medications	Bring enough for the whole trip plus a few days, in original labelled packaging, in your carry-on — not your checked bag.
Motion sickness	The ferry crossing and the Prickly Pear speedboat can both get choppy. Take something before you board, not after.
Pharmacies & clinics	Pharmacies and clinics are in The Valley, alongside Princess Alexandra Hospital. The resort front desk can help you reach care.

7.7 Your Water & Sun Kit

Serious cases are sometimes transferred to St. Maarten. This is the concrete reason travel insurance matters here. Make sure yours covers **medical care and evacuation**, and write the 24-hour assistance number on your Section 1 card before you fly.

8. Packing & Practical

What August in Anguilla is actually like

Daytime high	Around 88°F / 31°C
Overnight low	Around 79°F / 26°C
Humidity	High. It will feel hotter than the number
Sea temperature	Around 84°F / 29°C — warmer than most swimming pools
UV index	Extreme at midday. You can burn in under 20 minutes
Rain	Short heavy showers that pass in minutes. Rarely a washed-out day
Daylight	Sunrise around 6:00 AM, sunset around 6:50 PM

Practically, this means: the sun does the damage between 10 AM and 3 PM, which is exactly when Wednesday's boat trip and Friday's parade fall. An umbrella is useless in the wind — a light rain layer is better. And Wednesday's 6:00 PM beach celebration begins right as the light turns golden, which is worth knowing if you care about photographs.

Do not skip: reef-safe sunscreen, a hat with a real brim, and sunglasses. Everything else on the packing list is optional by comparison.

Power, plugs and charging

No adapter needed. Anguilla uses Type A and Type B sockets at 110 volts, 60Hz — exactly the same as at home. Your US chargers, hair tools and devices all work as they do in your kitchen. No adapter, no voltage converter, nothing to buy.

- The resort provides a hair dryer, so leave yours at home.
- **Bring a multi-port USB charger or a small power strip** — hotel rooms never have enough outlets for four devices and a group.
- **Bring a power bank.** Friday's parade and Saturday's calypso night both run long and off-property, and there is nowhere to plug in.
- **There is no charging on the speedboat on Wednesday.** Leave with a full battery.
- Brief power flickers happen on the island. Nothing to worry about, but don't leave your only charged device on the charger when you go out.

Portugal travellers — Sonja, Jason, Benjamin and Christian

Spain and Portugal use **Type C and Type F sockets at 230 volts, 50Hz**. You need a European adapter, and you need to buy it **before you leave home** — you will not find one in Anguilla, and you will land in Madrid at 9:55 AM with a dead phone if you don't. Modern phone and laptop chargers handle 230V automatically, but check anything with a heating element before you plug it in.

What to pack

Clothing

- Lightweight, breathable clothing for a hot week
- Swimwear for most days, plus cover-ups
- One light layer for evenings and air conditioning
- A light rain jacket or packable poncho
- One smart-casual outfit for Wednesday's beach celebration
- Long pants or leggings and closed-toe shoes if you are riding on Friday — the stables require them
- Water shoes for the Prickly Pear boat day
- Golfers: collared shirt and resort golf attire
- Sturdy sandals, plus one pair of comfortable walking shoes

Sun, sea & health

- Reef-safe sunscreen SPF 30+, hat, sunglasses
- Insect repellent for evenings
- Refillable water bottle
- Prescriptions in original packaging, in your carry-on
- A small kit: pain reliever, antihistamine, motion-sickness tablets, plasters
- See the full Water & Sun Kit in Section 7.7

Documents

- Passport, valid well beyond August 2026
- Your airline confirmation code — ATYGTO · CTJXML · JDHOWB · QDAHCO
- A card that works abroad
- Your home driver's licence, only if you are renting a car
- A photo or scan of your passport, saved on your phone and emailed to yourself
- In the room safe: passport on non-border days, spare cash, valuables

Cash to set aside

- Small US bills for tips, vendors and taxis
- US\$25–28 per person for the departure tax at AXA on 9 August, in cash

Chargers, and what to leave behind

Chargers and a portable battery. 2 August and 9 August are long travel days, and Friday and Saturday both run late away from the resort. Your phone is your ticket, your map and your way to reach your driver.

Leave at home: plug adapters (except the Portugal group), hair dryer and beach towels — provided at Aurora — and jewellery you would be upset to lose.

9. Frequently Asked Questions

The questions that generate calls, answered before you need to make one.

Q1 **My flight is delayed, or I have missed a connection. What now?**

Contact the airline first — American **1-800-433-7300**, Iberia **1-800-772-4642** — since only they can rebook you. Then message Phyllis and Sunlinc so your transfer can be adjusted. Don't buy a replacement ticket without speaking to the airline.

Q2 **There is no driver at my pickup. What do I do?**

Call the number on your confirmation. Wait 15 minutes. Then call the resort on **1-844-668-5759**, and email Global Celebrations if it is still unresolved. Don't leave the pickup point in the meantime.

Q3 **How much cash should I carry, and do I tip?**

US\$150–200 per person in small bills for the week, plus US\$25–28 for the departure tax. Tip 10–15% at restaurants (check for an existing service charge), a few dollars a day for housekeeping, and 10–15% for drivers and guides.

Q4 **Do I need local currency?**

No. US dollars are accepted everywhere.

Q5 **Is the tap water safe?**

Yes, it is treated and generally safe. Bottled is easy to find if you would rather.

Q6 **Can I use Uber?**

No — there is no Uber, Lyft or public bus on Anguilla. Private transfer, taxi, or rental car only.

Q7 **What do I need at check-in?**

Photo ID or passport, and a credit card for incidentals. Check-in is 3:00 PM on Sunday 2 August; check-out is 11:00 AM on Sunday 9 August. All travellers in this group are adults, so there are no age restrictions on rooms, bars or venues.

Q8 **Which days do I need my passport?**

2 August, Tuesday 4 August for St. Martin, and 9 August. Safe on all other days.

Q9 **What is not included that I will pay locally?**

Departure tax at AXA, the St. Martin ferry fare and departure fee, meals described as “at leisure,” festival food and craft vendors, tips, spa and incidentals, and rental cars plus the temporary driving permit if you choose to rent.

Q10 **How do I reach you after hours?**

Your day's transfer driver first, then the resort front desk on **1-844-668-5759**, then email Global Celebrations. Phyllis is the point of contact for anything affecting the whole group.

Q11 Can I change or cancel something?

Speak to Phyllis before you change anything. All air tickets on this trip are non-refundable, and changes carry airline fees. See Section 10.

Q12 Do I need an adapter?

No. Anguilla uses the same plugs and voltage as the US. The Portugal group needs a European adapter for that leg only.

Q13 What is the time difference?

None, for August. Anguilla is on the same clock as the US East Coast.

Q14 What if there is a hurricane?

Most August weeks pass without incident, but see Section 7.5. The short version: buy trip-interruption insurance, watch the outlook the week before, and if anything develops, **call Phyllis before you change or cancel anything yourself.**

Q15 Will my phone work?

Yes, but it is international roaming even though the numbers look American. Sort out an eSIM or a Caribbean add-on before you fly.

Q16 What do people wear at dinner?

Resort casual almost everywhere — a linen shirt or a sundress. Wednesday's celebration is the one dressier night. Nowhere on this trip requires a jacket.

Q17 Is there much nightlife?

Anguilla is deliberately quiet and there are no casinos — the island's pleasures are beaches, food and music. Your week is the exception: the Summer Festival brings the whole island out, and Friday's parade and Saturday's calypso final are the biggest nights of the year.

Q18 How much walking should I expect?

More than a normal beach holiday. Monday's festival runs eight hours, and Friday's parade involves a walk in and out through closed streets. Comfortable shoes matter more than you would think.

10. Change & Cancellation Quick Reference

Item	Where you stand
Air tickets	All air tickets are non-refundable. Any change is subject to airline change fees plus any fare difference, and must go through the airline.
Resort accommodation	Subject to Aurora’s cancellation terms as set out in your booking confirmation. Check the dates on it.
Excursions & activities	The St. Martin trip, speedboat charter, golf and horseback riding each carry individual operator terms. Several have short cancellation windows and some are non-refundable once confirmed.
The package	The total package of US\$12,475.20 was accepted and signed on 20 July 2026.
