

The Sacred Heart of Jesus

The Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus is celebrated on the Friday after the second Sunday after Pentecost. In 2025, the Solemnity was on June 27. June is traditionally dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus.



As Catholics, we have five ways to celebrate the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

1. Placing a picture or statue of the Sacred Heart in a prominent place, such as in a home or on a family altar, helps to remember and honor Jesus' love.
2. Begin the day with a prayer of consecration to the Sacred Heart, offering it up to Jesus for the day's activities.
3. Visiting Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, whether through Adoration or other forms of prayer, can foster a deeper love and reverence for the Eucharist, which is the Sacred Heart of Jesus.
4. Receiving the Eucharist is a direct encounter with the Sacred Heart of Jesus, who offers Himself to us in the Eucharist.
5. On the first Friday of each month, participate in Mass and Communion, offering these acts of worship and love to the Sacred Heart as a form of reparation for sins.

By incorporating these practices into our daily lives, we can deepen our devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus and more fully experience his love.

Happy Independence Day; God Bless America

Patriotism, Independence Day, and the Knights of Columbus:

What does patriotism mean? Where and when do Knights celebrate Independence Day?

Independence Day is typically celebrated with public displays of patriotism, including parades, picnics, fireworks displays and speeches at civic events. Members of the Patriotic Degree of the Knights of Columbus, our Fourth Degree, will often be found turning out in full regalia at these ceremonies. Patriotism has been one of the four principles of the Knights of Columbus since the Fourth Degree was established in 1900. Each of the major jurisdictions of the Order has its own version of the Fourth Degree Ceremony. We joyfully celebrate our Independence Day every July 4th.

In 2005, Saint Pope John Paul II published what was to be his last book, *Memory and Identity*. He discusses good and evil, church and state, freedom and democracy, and the Communist and Nazi totalitarianism which produced so much human tragedy during the 20th Century. The saint drew a careful distinction between nationalism and patriotism. “Whereas nationalism involves recognizing and pursuing the good of one’s own nation alone, without regard for the rights of others,” he wrote, “patriotism ... is a love for one’s native land that accords rights to all other nations equal to those claimed for one’s own. Patriotism, in other words, leads to a properly ordered social love.”

Saint Pope John Paul II notes that the word patriotism comes from the root word *patria*, meaning “home” or “native land.” It is related to the Latin word *pater*, meaning “father,” and so we sometimes speak of “fatherland” or “motherland” as well. “The concept of *patria* includes the values and the spiritual content that make up the culture of a great nation,” the pope wrote. “The very idea of ‘native land’ presupposes a deep bond between the spiritual and the material, between culture and territory”.

For members of the Knights of Columbus, for whom faith and patriotism go hand in hand, Saint Pope John Paul II’s is a concise description of the relationship between the two: the Fourth Commandment, which tells us to honor our father and mother, obliges us to honor our homeland as well. “The spiritual patrimony which we acquire from our native land comes to us through our mother and father,” he says.

“Patriotism is a love for everything to do with our native land: its history, its traditions, its language, its natural features. It is a love which extends also to the works of our compatriots and the fruits of their genius. Every danger that threatens the overall good of our native land becomes an occasion to demonstrate this love. The native land is the common good of all citizens and as such it imposes a serious duty.”



Knights of Columbus Supreme Council Update

Christ at the Center: Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly invites State Deputies to build the Order

Fraternal leaders representing more than 70 Knights of Columbus jurisdictions worldwide gathered in New Haven, Connecticut, for the annual Organizational Meeting of State Deputies, held from June 4 to 8, to unite in prayer and prepare for the upcoming fraternal year.

Throughout the week, state deputies from the United States, Canada, the Philippines, Mexico, Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic, Guam, Poland, Ukraine, France and the Republic of Korea participated in daily Masses, workshops, planning sessions and fraternal events.

On June 6, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly conferred medals of office on 37 newly elected state deputies at the conclusion of Mass at St. Mary’s Church — the birthplace of the Order. Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori of Baltimore was the principal celebrant, joined by more than 35 Knights of Columbus chaplains as concelebrants.

In his homily, Archbishop Lori reflected on the Gospel passage in which the risen Lord asks St. Peter, “Do you love me?” — a question he said is also directed to Knights of Columbus leaders. “Indeed, it is directed to us in a particular way, we who form the leadership of the Knights of Columbus,” he said. “For we are the leaders, the guardians, and in a sense, the shepherds of an Order that is founded on love — on the principle of charity.” Leadership in the Order, Archbishop Lori emphasized, is rooted in discipleship: “There will be days when you are asked to go where you would rather not go, to perform tasks and take on responsibilities you might prefer to avoid. Then hear the Lord say, ‘Follow me!’ Disciples are those who have learned to love as the Lord loves.”

Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly delivered keynote remarks that similarly emphasized the Order’s obligation to missionary discipleship. He pointed to Pope Leo XIV’s call for missionary outreach and to the rising number of adult converts in the United States and Europe. “We’re seeing the Holy Spirit taking action in our Church,” the supreme knight said. “What’s so interesting is many of the converts are young men, and they’re looking for a faith that challenges them — a robust faith. Our job as Knights is to give a place where they can not only grow in their faith, but where they can put their faith into action.”

Reflecting on the first month of Pope Leo XIV’s papacy, the supreme knight noted that Pope Leo XIII — pontiff from 1878 to 1903 — led the Church through the Industrial Age and laid the foundations of modern Catholic social teaching. That same era saw Blessed Michael McGivney, whose priestly ministry largely overlapped Leo XIII’s pontificate, championing the dignity of workers and being a voice for widows and orphans in his own parish. “Now fast forward — Pope Leo XIV is calling us to do the same thing in different circumstances,” Supreme Knight Kelly said. “The challenges are different now than they were then, but the need to protect human dignity is the same.”

The Supreme Knight also underscored the Order’s achievements over the past year — including 48 million volunteer hours and a record \$197 million donated to charity. The Order’s RSVP (Refund Support for Vocations Program) reached a new milestone, surpassing \$100 million in total support for seminarians and postulants since its inception. In 2024, Knights also donated over \$5 million to pregnancy care centers and maternity homes through the ASAP (Aid and Support After Pregnancy) program. “It’s a great achievement, and I want to say thank you from the bottom of my heart to all of you for the work that you’ve done,” Supreme Knight Kelly told the assembled leaders.



With more than 2 million members, the Order continues to attract men seeking meaning and purpose, the supreme knight said. One of the most effective ways to foster Christian discipleship, he added, is through *Cor*, the Order-wide initiative that launched in 2023 to help men grow in prayer, formation and fraternity. In the past year alone, *Cor* has expanded from about 600 councils participating to more than 5,000, and the importance of advancing its growth was a central theme throughout the meeting of state deputies. “Let’s keep moving forward with *Cor*,” the supreme knight urged. “It’s an extraordinary opportunity for us to help the Church and to help men — to help families.”

He added, “Pope Leo has spoken about isolation and loneliness in our time — themes that we have talked about in our meetings. He says that what we must do is respond with missionary outreach. We must say to the world, with humility and joy: ‘*Look to Christ. Come closer to Christ.*’ ... We have to keep Christ at the center of everything that we’re doing. And if we can do that, God will do the rest.”

During the meeting, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly also recognized Archbishop Lori with a resolution from the Knights of Columbus Board of Directors honoring him on the occasion of two recent milestones — the 30th anniversary of his episcopal ordination and his 20th anniversary as Supreme Chaplain. “My ministry as a priest and as a bishop — being closely associated with the work of the Knights of Columbus — is one of the great, great graces in my life,” Archbishop Lori said. “I am humbled and honored to do it, and I appreciate all of the support and all of the encouragement I receive in being part of this great mission.”

On June 5, Archbishop Lori led State Chaplains on a pilgrimage to several sites associated with Blessed Michael McGivney’s life and ministry, including a concelebrated Mass at Immaculate Conception Church in Terryville. In his homily, the supreme chaplain urged his brother bishops and priests to follow Father McGivney’s pastoral example. “It was his union with Christ, his devotion to the Sacred Heart, his zeal as a confessor, his tender devotion to the Blessed Mother — all this and more got him up in the morning and propelled his ministry,” he said. “If you and I would be worthy successors to Blessed Michael McGivney, we must first and foremost be priests who love the ministry we’ve been called to — and love the people whom we are privileged to serve.”

During Mass on Saturday morning, June 7, the assembled leaders also prayed for the repose of the soul of Pope Francis. “Pope Francis was really a great friend to the Knights of Columbus,” Supreme Knight Kelly said in his keynote remarks the previous day. “He was also a great supporter of Father McGivney. He approved the beatification of Father McGivney, and he loved how Father McGivney was connected to the people of his parish and the real needs that those people were struggling with.”

Reflecting on the theme of the current Jubilee Year, as declared by Pope Francis, the Supreme Knight also encouraged all Knights to live as “Pilgrims of Hope.” “Hope is more than optimism. It’s based on our belief in Christ and in his sacrificial love for us, and that is our anchor, that hope is our anchor amid the storms of life,” the supreme knight said. “Everything that you do to serve and sacrifice for the Order, is much more than mere volunteerism. We are followers of Christ, and we love as he taught us.”

U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Update

Pope Leo XIV addresses the young people of Chicago and the whole world

The following is the full text of Pope Leo XIV's address to those gathered to celebrate the Chicago-born pope's election:

My dear friends,

It's a pleasure for me to greet all of you gathered together at White Sox Park on this great celebration as a community of faith in the Archdiocese of Chicago. A special greeting to Cardinal Cupich, to the auxiliary bishops, to all my friends who are gathered today on this: the feast of

the Most Holy Trinity. And I begin with that because the Trinity is a model of God's love for us. God: Father, Son and Spirit. Three persons in one God live united in the depth of love, in community, sharing that communion with all of us. So, as you gather today in this great celebration, I want to both express my gratitude to you and also an encouragement to continue to build up community, friendship, as brothers and sisters in your daily lives, in your families, in your parishes, in the Archdiocese and throughout our world.

I'd like to send a special word of greeting to all the young people - those of you gathered together today, and many of you who are perhaps watching this greeting through technological means, on the internet. As you grow up together, you may realize, especially having lived through the time of the pandemic - times of isolation, great difficulty, sometimes even difficulties in your families, or in our world today. Sometimes it may be that the context of your life has not given you the opportunity to live the faith, to live as participants in a faith community, and I'd like to take this opportunity to invite each one of you to look into your own hearts, to recognize that God is present and that, perhaps in many different ways, God is reaching out to you, calling you, inviting you to know his Son Jesus Christ, through the Scriptures, perhaps through a friend or a relative... a grandparent, who might be a person of faith. But to discover how important it is for each one of us to pay attention to the presence of God in our own hearts, to that longing for love in our lives, for ... searching, a true

searching, for finding the ways that we may be able to do something with our own lives to serve others.

And in that service to others, we may find that coming together in friendship, building up community, we too can find true meaning in our lives. Moments of anxiety, of loneliness. So many people who suffer from different experiences of depression or sadness - they can discover that the love of God is truly healing, that it brings hope, and that actually, coming together as friends, as brothers and sisters, in community, in a parish, in an experience of living our faith together, we can find that the Lord's grace, that the love of God can truly heal us, can give us the strength that we need, can be the source of that hope that we all need in our lives. To share that message of hope with one another - in outreach, in service, in looking for ways to make our world a better place - gives true life to all of us, and is a sign of hope for the whole world.

To the young people who are gathered here, I'd like to say that you are the promise of hope for so many of us. The world looks to you as you look around yourselves and say: we need you, we want you to come together to share with us in this common mission, as Church and in society, of announcing a message of true hope and of promoting peace, promoting harmony, among all peoples. We have to look beyond our own - if you will - egotistical ways. We have to look for ways of coming together and promoting a message of hope. Saint Augustine says to us that if we want the world to be a better place, we have to begin with ourselves, we have to begin with our own lives, our own hearts (cfr *Speech 311; Comment on St John's Gospel, Homily 77*).

And so, in this sense, as you gather together as a faith community, as you celebrate in the Archdiocese of Chicago, as you offer your own experience of joy and of hope, you can find out, you can discover that you, too, are indeed beacons of hope. That light, that perhaps on the horizon, is not very easy to see, and yet, as we grow in our unity, as we come together in communion, we can discover that that light will grow brighter and brighter. That light which is indeed our faith in Jesus Christ. And we can become that message of hope, to promote peace and unity throughout our world.



We all live with many questions in our hearts. Saint Augustine speaks so often of our "restless" hearts and says: "our hearts are restless until they rest in you, O God" (*Confessions 1,1,1*). That restlessness is not a bad thing, and we shouldn't look for ways to put out the fire, to eliminate or even numb ourselves to the tensions that we feel, the difficulties that we experience. We should rather get in touch with our own hearts and recognize that God can work in our lives, through our lives, and through us reach out to other people.

And so, I'd like to conclude this brief message to all of you with an invitation to be, indeed, that light of hope. "Hope does not disappoint", Saint Paul tells us in his letter to the Romans (5,5). When I see each and every one of you, when I see how people gather together to celebrate their faith, I discover myself how much hope there is in the world. In this Jubilee Year of Hope, Christ, who is our hope, indeed calls all of us to come together, that we might be that true living example: the light of hope in the world today. So, I would like to invite all of you to take a moment, to open up your own hearts to God, to God's love, to that peace which only the Lord can give us. To feel how deeply beautiful, how strong, how meaningful the love of God is in our lives. And to recognize that while we do nothing to earn God's love, God in his own generosity continues to pour out his love upon us. And as he gives us his love, he only asks us to share what he has given us with others.

May you indeed be blessed as you gather together for this celebration. May the Lord's love and peace come upon each and every one of you, upon your families, and may God bless all of you, so that you might always be beacons of hope, a sign of hope and peace throughout our world. And may the blessing of Almighty God, the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit come upon you and remain with you always. Amen.

Vatican Update

Faith in Jesus brings healing, hope, and new life, Pope Leo XIV says

At his final general audience before taking a brief Summer break, Pope Leo XIV urged the faithful to turn to Jesus during moments of despair, exclusion and suffering. The Gospel has many examples of miracles that reveal the healing and transformative power born of faith in Jesus, he said.

When facing despair, exclusion and disappointment, do not be afraid to turn to Jesus and pray for the healing power of his love, Pope Leo XIV said. "A very widespread ailment of our time is the fatigue of living: reality seems to us to be too complex, burdensome, difficult to face," he

told thousands of pilgrims gathered in St. Peter's Square for his general audience June 25. It was the last public general audience Pope Leo was scheduled to lead until July 30.

"At times we feel blocked by the judgment of those who claim to put labels on others," he said, and people may be tempted to "switch off, we fall asleep, in the delusion that, upon waking, things will be different." "But reality has to be faced, and together with Jesus, we can do it well," he said.

The pope centered his catechesis on two accounts of miracles in St. Mark's Gospel: Jairus' daughter who awakens from death and the woman who is healed of a hemorrhage. These two miracles "reveal the healing

power born of faith in Jesus," he said. "These two Gospel accounts teach us to be unafraid to turn to Jesus in prayer and to entrust ourselves to the healing power of his love, which can transform apparently hopeless situations and even bring life out of death," he said. "For God, who is eternal life, death of the body is like sleep. True death is that of the soul: of this we must be afraid!," Pope Leo said.

When Jesus revives Jairus' child, he "tells the parents to give her something to eat," which conveys an important message for parents today, he said. "When our children are in crisis and need spiritual nourishment, do we know how to give it to them? And how can we, if we ourselves are not nourished by the Gospel?" he asked.


The woman afflicted with hemorrhages had been condemned by others to stay hidden and isolated, he said. "At times, we too can be victims of the judgment of others, who presume to put a robe on us that is not our own. And then we suffer and cannot come out of it." But she is brave, has faith and emerges from the crowd to touch Jesus, resulting in her healing, he said. Others in the crowd who touched Jesus experienced no similar transformation because they lacked faith. "Perhaps today, too, many people approach Jesus in a superficial way, without truly believing in his power. We walk the surfaces of our churches, but maybe our heart is elsewhere!" the pope said. "This woman, silent and anonymous, conquers her fears, touches the heart of Jesus with her hands, considered unclean because of her illness. And she is immediately healed," he said, because as Jesus said to her, "your faith has saved you. Go in peace."

"Dear brothers and sisters, in life there are moments of disappointment and discouragement, and there is also the experience of death. Let us learn from that woman, from that father: let us go to Jesus," he said. "He can heal us, he can revive us. Jesus is our hope!" he said.




Membership Dues






