





Spiritual Advisor Message – SK Deacon Bruce Gesinski

Sunday Obligation during the Summer, when out of town, or on vacation



Sometimes in the Summer months (and being from Florida, sometimes in the Winter months as well) we are confronted with the following questions, “Do I really have to go to Mass if I’m out of town? Do I really have to go to Mass if I’m traveling? What if I don’t know where a Catholic church is where I’m going on vacation? What really is our “Sunday obligation” to participate at Mass?”

Our Sunday obligation is one of the Precepts of the Church. It is a privilege and a duty that the Catholic Church requires of all of faithful. It isn’t a suggestion or a rough guideline but one of the things that the Church teaches that is necessary for Catholics to do in order to advance in Catholic life. It isn’t something to disregard on a whim. **It is a mortal sin to not attend Mass on Sunday.** The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that the first precept is “You shall attend Mass on Sunday and Holy Days of Obligation and rest from servile labor.” That statement is not qualified with, “when you are at home” or “when it is convenient” or “when you are close to your home parish.” Our obligation is binding on every Sunday and Holy Day of Obligation no matter where we are at the time. That being said going to Mass on Sunday should not be seen as a burden but as a normal part of our Catholic life and a privilege. There are parts of the world where Catholics would love to be able to find a Catholic Mass as close and as often as we can.

“The Sunday precept is not an externally imposed duty, a burden on our shoulders. On the contrary, taking part in the celebration, being nourished by the Eucharistic bread and experiencing the communion of their brothers and sisters in Christ is a need for Christians, it is a joy; Christians can thus replenish the energy they need to continue the journey. We must rediscover the joy of Christian Sundays. We must proudly rediscover the privilege of sharing in the Eucharist, which is the sacrament of the renewed world.” (Pope Benedict XVI, May 29, 2005.)

There are limited circumstances in which we are unable to fulfill our Sunday obligation. If through no fault of our own or because of illness, we are not able to attend Mass then we haven’t violated this precept. If in doubt as to whether you have violated this precept, ask your priest and explain the circumstances. We are required to do our part to locate a Catholic Church and to attend Mass. “Well, we wanted to go to the beach on Sunday and so we couldn’t attend Mass” doesn’t cut it. Neither does, “We had never been to this town before, so we didn’t know where there was a Catholic Church” nor “The people we were visiting were not Catholic.” There are plenty of ways to find Catholic Churches no matter where you are. Most Hotels keep a directory of local churches and times of Sunday services at the counter, or you can look in the local phone book. There are plenty of places on-line to find a Catholic Church and Mass times. For those traveling anywhere in the United States, there is: masstimes.org, thecatholicdirectory.com, catholic-mass-times.com, parishesonline.com. Outside of the United States both masstimes.org and thecatholicdirectory.com are great resources. Another way is to ask your smart phone. You will not only find the nearest Catholic Church but will also websites to find Mass times. There is no reason not to go to Sunday Mass, especially if you make the effort and do a little planning.

Several years ago, I was helping a non-Catholic friend move. We were in a city that I had never been to before and one of the things I asked my friend was if we could go visit some of the local Catholic Churches. We went to daily Mass at several of the local churches and stopped to introduce ourselves to the priest after Mass. In several places, the priests were more than happy to give us a tour of the church building, point out some interesting things about the parish and the community, and give us a little church history.

Take the time to plan your trip, go to Sunday Mass, and enjoy visiting different Catholic Churches while you are away from home. Peace and safe travels!

Faith, Fatherhood, and the Sacred Heart

As I offer my final reflection as your Lecturer, my heart is full of gratitude for all we've shared, and hope for what this council can become. Together, we have grown as Catholic men of faith and action, and I believe our best days are ahead.

This month, we celebrate Father's Day — a time to reflect on fathers' roles in our families, Church, and council. This theme has become more meaningful to me recently. I lost my father just over two years ago and am only now fully grasping the quiet ways he shaped my life. Meanwhile, I continue growing as a father — to two adult children in their 30s — still striving daily to live a legacy they can be proud of.



Each of us is called to spiritual fatherhood: to mentor, support, and guide one another with love and courage. That call is urgent. Our world shifts rapidly, and the Church faces real challenges. Knights of Columbus Supreme Council Update

From his very first public appearance May 8, Pope Leo XIV, the first U.S.-born pontiff in history, has articulated a vision for his pontificate and the Catholic Church: one of peace and unity, centered in Jesus Christ.

“Peace be with you all,” the pope proclaimed from the loggia of St. Peter’s Basilica. “Dear brothers and sisters, these are the first words spoken by the risen Christ, the Good Shepherd who laid down his life for God’s flock. I would like this greeting of peace to resound in your hearts, in your families, among all people, wherever they may be, in every nation and throughout the world.” “It is the peace of the risen Christ. A peace that is unarmed and disarming, humble and persevering. A peace that comes from God, the God who loves us all, unconditionally.”

Before his election, Pope Leo XIV was known as Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost, a native of Chicago and a member of the Order of St. Augustine. A former missionary in Peru, where he served as bishop of Chiclayo, he most recently served as prefect of the Dicastery for Bishops since April 2023. Inspired by Pope Leo XIII, whose landmark encyclical *Rerum Novarum* in 1891 addressed the social and economic upheaval of the Industrial Revolution, the Holy Father reflected on the selection of his papal name during his first official speech, to the College of Cardinals on May 9. “Sensing myself called to continue in this same path [as Leo XIII], I chose to take the name Leo XIV,” he said. “In our own day, the Church offers to everyone the treasury of her social teaching in response to another industrial revolution and to developments in the field of artificial intelligence that pose new challenges for the defense of human dignity, justice and labor.”

In a May 8 statement, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly affirmed the Knights of Columbus’ commitment to be strong supporters and close collaborators with Pope Leo XIV. “I pledge our loyalty to Pope Leo XIV as well as our prayers today and every day of his pontificate,” the supreme knight said. “In the years ahead, we will proudly stand with him as we seek together to build up the Kingdom of God.”

Speaking with EWTN after the pope’s election, the Supreme Knight elaborated further on his knowledge of the man who became Pope Leo XIV, and the significance of his election for the entire Church. “He’s a very easy person to talk to,” said Supreme Knight Kelly, who met the future pope twice in 2023. “It’s a very, very good thing for the Church, what happened today. This was a conclave of surprises, I would say, brought to us by a God of surprises.” Pope Leo XIV’s experience as an Augustinian missionary priest and bishop in Peru, the Supreme Knight added, is a sign that the poor and vulnerable are close to the Pope’s heart — a priority that aligns well with the Order’s charitable work.

Supreme Knight Kelly was among the thousands who gathered in St. Peter’s Square on May 18 for the inaugural Mass marking the official beginning of the pontificate, which was broadcast worldwide thanks in part to equipment donated by the Knights of Columbus to the Vatican’s Dicastery of Communication. Since 1978, the Order has provided financial support for the massive Vatican communications effort related to papal funerals, conclaves and the installation of each successor of St. Peter.

“If you love me, you will keep my commandments. What is your response to Jesus’ question, “Do you love me?” Do you show your love for Christ in how you live? In what ways do you need to become more attentive to the commandments and the teachings of the Church?

U.S. Bishops Encourage Lawmakers to Protect Human Life and Dignity and Uphold the Common Good in Reconciliation Legislation


As the U.S. Congress considers the “One Big Beautiful Bill Act” in the budget reconciliation process, Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio, president of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), encouraged lawmakers to uphold human life and dignity and the common good.



“My brother bishops have sent a comprehensive letter to Congress commending parts of the budget proposal that will support human life and dignity, while also strongly encouraging them to reconsider provisions that will harm the poor and disadvantaged, our immigrant brothers and sisters, and our environment. To our elected lawmakers, I echo the call of my brother bishops and urge you to remain consistent in protecting human life and dignity and supporting the common good so that families can flourish. I also underscore the grave concerns expressed by my brother bishops and implore you to address the real and substantial harms that would result from provisions in this bill before it advances further. Raising income taxes on the working poor, cutting nutrition and healthcare programs for those most in need, and eliminating investments in environmental stewardship would place a terrible burden on the least of our brothers and sisters,” said Archbishop Broglio.

Vatican Update

Remember Christ's compassion, show compassion to others, Pope Leo XIV says

On the Jubilee theme of "Christ our Hope," Pope Leo XIV looked at the Gospel parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37).

Being religious does not automatically mean someone is compassionate, and yet for a Christian compassion is a clear sign of following Christ, Pope Leo XIV said. "Before being a religious matter, compassion is a question of humanity! Before being believers, we are called to be human," the pope said May 28 as he held his weekly general audience in St. Peter's Square.



At the end of the audience, Pope Leo again pleaded for peace in Gaza and in Ukraine. "From the Gaza Strip there rises to heaven ever more intensely the cry of mothers and fathers who, clutching the lifeless bodies of their children, are continually forced to move in search of some food and safer shelter from the shelling," the pope said. "To the leaders, I renew my appeal: Cease firing; free all the hostages; fully respect humanitarian law." And after days of Russia increasing its attacks on Ukraine, killing civilians and destroying infrastructure, the pope assured the Ukrainian people of his "closeness and my prayers for all the victims, especially the children and families." "I strongly renew my appeal to stop the war and support every initiative of dialogue and peace," he said. "I ask everyone to join in prayers for peace in Ukraine and wherever people suffer because of war."

The pope's main talk at the audience focused on the Gospel parable of the good Samaritan, a story the pope said offered important lessons for Christians but also was a source of hope. "The lack of hope, at times, is due to the fact that we fixate on a certain rigid and closed way of seeing things, and the parables help us to look at them from another point of view," Pope Leo said.

The parable of the good Samaritan is an obvious lesson in being compassionate and recognizing all men and women as neighbors, he said. But it also says something about the compassion of Jesus.

"We can also see ourselves in the man who fell into the hands of robbers, for we have all experienced the difficulties of life and the pain brought about by sin," he said in his English summary. "In our frailty, we discover that Christ himself is the Good Samaritan who heals our wounds and restores our hope." "Let us turn, then, to the Sacred Heart, model of true humanity, and ask him to make our heart ever more like his," the pope said. The wounded man on the side of the road "represents each one of us," he said, and remembering "all the times that Jesus stopped to take care of us will make us more capable of compassion."

Being compassionate, he said, is not just a feeling; it means taking action. "If you want to help someone, you cannot think of keeping your distance, you have to get involved, get dirty, perhaps be contaminated," the pope said, noting that in the parable, the good Samaritan cleans and bandages the man's wounds and takes him to safety.



Pro-Life Legislative Update

The 2025 Session of the Florida Legislature drew to a close on May 2 for all pending bills, other than the Appropriations Bill (Budget) which was held over for a Special Session. Several bills were considered this Session relating to the protection of life and were of interest to our Knights of Columbus. Two bills were approved and two were not. Please see the summaries below. For more information, please visit Online Sunshine Florida at www.leg.state.fl.us. Thanks to BK Ron Nowvskie for keeping our Council updated during the 2025 Legislative Session.

✓ The Initiative Petitions for Constitutional Amendments Reform Act (HB 1205), which strengthens signature verification, limits out-of-state petition influence, increases transparency to protect Florida's ballot process, and makes it much more difficult to amend the Florida Constitution by well-funded outside groups as almost happened with the recent pro-abortion and legalized marijuana amendments that were narrowly defeated in November. This bill passed its final committee and then the full House (76 to 31). The Senate passed the bill (28 to 9), and it was signed into law by the Governor and became law on May 2.



✓ The Fetal Development Educational Act (HB 1255) revises multiple education policies to protect students and foster a more positive learning environment, including restricting the use of taxpayer funds for political activism and enhancing discipline standards. On April 23, the House passed this bill with an 86-27 vote. Most notably, the bill requires that 6th through 12th graders (with parental consent) receive comprehensive fetal development education through high-definition videos, helping students better understand and respect the miracle of human life. Despite intense opposition, the bill passed the Senate with amendment (38 to 0) on May 1, and the full House on May 2 (100 to 0). It is pending approval and signature by the Governor and would take effect on July 1.

✗ The Unborn Child Parent's Survivor Act (SB 1284) allows parents to file civil lawsuits for the wrongful death of an unborn child. It recognizes an unborn child as a separate legal entity and extends legal protections to ensure accountability in cases of negligent or intentional harm. The legislation creates new avenues for parents to seek damages for emotional and financial loss resulting from the wrongful death of their unborn child, further humanizing the unborn in state statute. This bill passed the Judiciary Committee (6 to 4) on April 1, and the Appropriations Committee (5 to 3) on April 11. It was not heard by its third Senate committee and was indefinitely postponed.

✗ The Office of Faith and Community Act (SB 820), which codifies the Office of Faith and Community within the Executive Office of the Governor to build collaborative relationships between faith-based organizations and state agencies. This bill passed the Government Oversight Committee (6 to 1) on April 1, the General Government Committee (9 to 3) on April 15, and the Appropriations Committee (14 to 4) on April 22. It passed the full Senate (27 to 9) on April 24 and was sent to the House. It was not taken up by the House and was indefinitely postponed.



First Friday Mass and Adoration

Our Council supports First Friday Mass and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament as a Faith activity. Adoration is an opportunity to pray and worship Jesus in the Eucharist, which we believe is His body, blood, soul and divinity. All Knights are welcome to attend Mass beginning at 5:30 pm, followed by Holy Hour with Adoration at 6:00 pm in the Church on the first Friday of every month. The next First Friday Mass is this coming Friday, June 6.



We encourage Knights to consider spending one hour each month in Adoration, at the Adoration Chapel, at the Holy Hour on any Friday of the month, or other opportunity as available, including the Forty Hours of Devotion this month from June 19 to June 21, which will include an hour of Adoration led by our Council.





Council Shirts Ordering


