
### Grand Knight Message – SK Dan Kimble


#### Not Broken, But Exalted

"Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after Me cannot be My disciple." — Luke 14:27

The Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross is observed annually on September 14 by the Catholic Church. The feast commemorates both the discovery of the True Cross by St. Helena and the dedication of the Basilica of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem. The feast also honors the Holy Cross as a sacred symbol of Christ's death and resurrection, celebrating it as the source of salvation, life, and victory over sin and death.

The Exaltation of the Cross calls Knights to see hidden burdens as steps to strength and honor, not weakness. It's an uncomfortable truth that most men carry a cross no one sees. It might be the quiet frustration of aging or declining health, the unspoken grief over a child who's gone astray, or a regret that still echoes in the conscience. Sometimes the weight is physical. Sometimes it's emotional. Often, it's both. But always—it's hidden.

As Knights, we are called to serve visibly: to be protectors, providers, defenders of the faith. And rightly so. But beneath that visible call lies a more personal mission—one that happens in the quiet of a man's heart, and is often harder to accept, because it asks not for strength, but surrender. It is the mission of carrying the Cross.



The Exaltation of the Cross is one of the most paradoxical moments in the Church's calendar. We exalt—not the Resurrection, not the miracles, not the empty tomb—but the instrument of torture. The very thing that crushed Christ's body becomes the symbol that lifts up the whole world. Why? Because the Cross is not about pain. It's about offering. The Son of God didn't simply suffer. He gave. And what He gave was not just His life—it was His obedience, His trust, His yes. Many men carry frustrations they don't share. They sense life made a turn they didn't expect. They have questions that remain unanswered. They worry they are becoming less useful. And without complaint, they bear the load themselves. These are hidden crosses. And Christ sees every one of them. Without the Cross, there is no spiritual maturity and no true manhood. To carry one's cross is not to be sullen. It is to recognize that we quietly accept hardships as a way of sharing in Christ's suffering—and trusting that, with Him, even pain has a purpose.

As Knights, we live by the principles of charity, unity, fraternity, and patriotism—each rooted not in comfort, but in sacrifice. Charity costs. Unity humbles. Fraternity forgives. Patriotism gives without applause. Yet, these pillars cannot stand without the Cross beneath them. When we unite our hidden frustrations to Christ's Cross, we are not broken but exalted, because in Him, suffering leads to new life. Your Cross may not be seen, but it is never wasted. In surrender, you are not broken by the Cross—you are lifted and raised by Christ.

### <u>Lecturer Message – SK Gary Konopka</u>

#### The Blessed Father Michael McGivney Miracle

Father McGivney's beatification was a significant event for the Knights of Columbus, as he is one step away from being recognized as a saint. The "Father McGivney miracle" refers to the healing of Michael "Mikey" Schachle from a life-threatening condition called fetal hydrops in utero. This healing, attributed to the intercession of Father Michael McGivney, the founder of the Knights of Columbus, played a key role in his beatification.

The story begins with the diagnosis of fetal hydrops in the unborn Mikey Schachle, a condition that gave him a near-zero chance of survival. His parents, Daniel and Michelle Schachle, prayed for a miracle through the intercession of Father McGivney, who was already on the path to sainthood. They also promised to name their son after Father McGivney if he survived. Remarkably, the baby was miraculously healed in the womb and born healthy, with doctors observing the disappearance of the fetal hydrops.

The miracle also highlights the importance of faith, prayer, and the pro-life values that Father McGivney championed during his life. The Knights of Columbus have long been involved in pro-life initiatives, and this miracle, involving a child with a life-threatening condition, further strengthens their commitment to protecting the unborn.

### Knights of Columbus Supreme Council Update

Knights of Columbus 143rd Supreme Convention: Honoring Pope Francis; Celebrating milestones in Charity Programs, *Cor*, and Growth of the Order

The Knights of Columbus 143rd Supreme Convention was held in Washington, D.C., from August 5 to August 7, 2025, with a call to charity, unity, fraternity and patriotism, as Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly urged members to be "heralds of hope" in a world searching for meaning.



At the first Knights of Columbus Supreme Convention since Pope Francis' death, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly offered a tribute to the former pontiff's legacy and celebrated the growth of the organization and its charitable accomplishments over the past year. Kelly, who has served as Supreme Knight since 2021, remembered Pope Francis' dedication to the most vulnerable — a hallmark of the Knights of Columbus' global charity work — and the late pontiff's close relationship with the fraternal organization.

"Pope Francis was a powerful witness to charity and when he summoned the Church to the peripheries,

he led by example — like a good father," Kelly said in his delivery of the annual report of the Knights' charity work. "His love for the poor and the sick was extraordinary," he said. "Who can forget the moment, in the early days of his papacy, when he embraced a severely disfigured man in St. Peter's Square or when he celebrated his 80th birthday by sharing breakfast with the homeless? He did what our world so often refuses to do. And the world watched, with admiration." Kelly said Francis was "a great friend of the Knights of Columbus" who "encouraged our charity around the world" and "especially praised our humanitarian work in Ukraine, as well as our efforts to combat human trafficking." He also credited Francis with inspiring the organization to grow its outreach to the Indigenous people of the United States, Canada, and the Philippines.

During his address, Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly also reported on the fraternal organization's ongoing charity work globally and its growth. The report noted that members of the Knights of Columbus collectively dedicated more than 48 million hours to service. The organization also broke its record for charitable donations, reaching about \$197 million over the year. According to the report, the Knights of Columbus surpassed 2.1 million members after more than 96,000 men joined the organization last year. The Knights of Columbus have 146 councils on college campuses 8,000 Knights.

Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly noted that the Knights of Columbus is currently responding to the flash flood in Texas, where "hundreds of families lost their loved ones — and one brother knight tragically lost both his parents and his two young daughters." The Knights also responded to floods in Florida, North Carolina, Tennessee, and Florida along with the wildfires in California. The report stated that the Knights of Columbus have continued "bringing emergency supplies to refugees" in Ukraine with the organization's Charity Convoys and serve people in the country through its Mercy Centers. "We pray for an end to the war in Ukraine, but so long as the war continues, we'll be there for those who suffer," Kelly said.

Supreme Knight Patrick Kelly reported on the growth of the Knights' Global Wheelchair Mission, which has now donated more than 158,000 wheelchairs, including 19,000 last year. This includes 300 to Nigeria, which was provided to "Christians who have endured violence and persecution for their faith." The Knights of Columbus also set a new record for winter jackets delivered to children through its Coats for Kids initiative, which has now surpassed 1.6 million



total jackets to children. According to the report, the Knights' program Aid and Support After Pregnancy (ASAP) provided pro-life pregnancy centers with \$6 million last year and more than \$17 million over the last three years. The Knights also surpassed more than 2,000 donated ultrasounds through its Ultrasound Initiative meant to "save lives by showing parents their unborn children."

The Knights of Columbus also saw growth in its *Cor* program, which is a "small-group setting [that] gives men a place to embrace the mission for which they were made — the mission that God himself has uniquely given to them," according to the report. In August 2024, *Cor* was active at 650 councils but has now expanded to more than 5,000 councils.

"Like every generation that came before us, we will move forward — in charity, unity, and fraternity," Kelly said. "We will serve Our Lord by serving others," he added. "And we will sacrifice for them, like he did for us."

# On 20th Anniversary of Hurricane Katrina: Faithful Encouraged to Renew Commitment to Racial Equality and Justice

Bishop Campbell, chairman of the USCCB's Subcommittee on African American Affairs, and Bishop Perry, chairman of the USCCB's Ad Hoc Committee Against Racism mark the anniversary of Hurricane Katrina. "As

we mark the 20th anniversary of this tragedy, we remember those who were lost and displaced but also renew our commitment to racial equity and justice in every sector of public life," said Bishop Roy E. Campbell, Jr., chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Subcommittee on African American Affairs, and Bishop Joseph N. Perry, chairman of the USCCB's Ad Hoc Committee Against Racism in a statement for the 20th anniversary of Hurricane Katrina.

The bishops reflected on the inequities revealed

by the destruction of Hurricane Katrina, and how the Church has provided a powerful witness and response in the wake of the tragedy. "Over 1,800 people lost their lives and many more suffered traumatic experiences during the aftermath. Today, the impacts of ongoing mental and physical injuries remain and today the cost of the injuries is borne unequally," said the bishops. "The powerful witness of the Catholic Church filled the gaps of an inadequate governmental response to the tragedy. It was people of faith, moved by their hearts, who assisted in resettlement efforts in new cities, and supported rebuilding when people attempted to return home." Two decades later, the Church must continue to accompany the most vulnerable populations who still feel the effects of Hurricane Katrina: "As Church, let us be a lifeboat in the flood waters of injustice."

### Vatican Update

### Pope prays for Minneapolis victims, denounces "pandemic" of gun violence

Pope Leo XIV, praying publicly for the victims of the school shooting in Minneapolis, also prayed for an end to the "pandemic" of gun violence.

After reciting the Angelus prayer with visitors and pilgrims in St. Peter's Square on August 31, Pope Leo switched from Italian to English when he led the prayers for the community of Annunciation Catholic School in Minneapolis where two children were killed and 18 other people were injured during Mass on August 27. In remembering "the victims of the tragic shooting during a school Mass in the American state of Minnesota," the Pope said, "we include in our prayers the countless children killed and injured every day around the world." "Let us plead God to stop the pandemic of arms, large and small, which infects our world," he said. "May our mother, Mary, the Queen of Peace, help us to fulfill the prophecy of Isaiah: 'They shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks.'"



Pope Leo called again for an end to Russia's war on Ukraine, decrying renewed attacks on various Ukrainian cities, including Kyiv. "Unfortunately, the war in Ukraine continues to sow death and destruction," the Pope told thousands of people gathered for the midday prayer. "I renew my closeness to the Ukrainian people and to all the wounded families," he said, calling on everyone "not to give in to indifference but to draw near (to the Ukrainian people) through prayer and concrete acts of charity." The Pope said his heart is also wounded for those who have died or are missing after a boat capsized carrying migrants from Africa to the Canary Islands.

"I strongly reiterate my urgent appeal for an immediate ceasefire and for a serious commitment to dialogue," he said. "It is time for leaders to abandon the logic of weapons and to take up the path of negotiation and peace, with the support of the international community. The voice of weapons must be silenced, while the

voice of fraternity and justice must be raised." Speaking in both English and Italian, the Pope entrusted all the "injured, missing and dead everywhere to our Savior's loving embrace."


In a Papal Message the day of the shooting, Pope Leo XIV expressed his profound sorrow upon learning of the loss of life and injuries that took place at Annunciation Church in Minneapolis, Minnesota. In a telegram to Archbishop Bernard Hebda of Minneapolis, the Pope expressed his "heartfelt condolences and the assurance of spiritual closeness to all those affected by this terrible tragedy, especially the families now grieving the loss of a child." The Pope said he commends "the souls of the deceased children to the love of Almighty God" and "prays for the wounded as well as the first responders, medical personnel and clergy who are caring for them and their loved ones. As a "pledge of peace, fortitude and consolation in the Lord Jesus," Pope Leo imparted his Apostolic Blessing upon "the Annunciation Catholic School Community, the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis, and the people of the metropolitan area."





### **Council By-Laws Amendments Approved**


New Council Operating Policies and Procedures also approved




## <u>Upcoming Events: Blood Drive; Cor; Pancake Breakfast;</u> <u>Icon of the Sacred Heart of Jesus</u>






