
Knights Reflections for November 2025

Veterans Day – November 11: Veterans Day began in 1919 as "Armistice Day," marking the end of World War I. In 1954, it became a day to honor all U.S. veterans, living and deceased. As Knights, we thank them for their sacrifice and service, and we're called to support them with prayer, gratitude, and action.

St. Cecilia – November 22: St. Cecilia is the patron saint of musicians and singers. She reminds us that music is a powerful way to worship God and lift up the soul. As someone who sings in the praise band, I'm inspired by her example to use my voice in praise and service. On her feast day, let's thank God for the gift of music and those who lead us in worship.

Christ the King Sunday – November 24: Christ the King Sunday was started in 1925 by Pope Pius XI to remind us that true peace and power come from Christ, not from the world. It ends the Church year and points to Jesus as our leader and judge. As Knights, we're called to put Christ first and serve His kingdom.

Thanksgiving – November 27: Thanksgiving started with early settlers thanking God after a tough harvest. Today, it's a day to be grateful – not just for things, but for family, faith, and freedom. As Catholic men, we show thanks through prayer, hospitality, and generosity. May our gratitude inspire us to serve.


