Greetings Comrades & Friends of the Legion,

Key dates in the month of May include Star Wars Day May 4th, Cinco de Mayo May 5th, Mother's Day May 10th, International Nurses Day May 12th, World Bee Day May 20th, and Memorial Day May 25th.

You may have noticed driving by the Legion all the work that is taking place on our grounds is progressing quite nicely. Thank you to John Christina and all the contractors and laborers who are involved in this project. We are very thankful and gratefully appreciate any and all volunteers and the local businesses who have donated materials and labor. I will try to mention them at a later time. Some of the work that has been done—we moved to a new location and installed a protected area to contain our dumpsters. Removed old fencing and shrubbery and a concrete area that had been where the dumpsters were. A new concrete patio area has been created. Top soil has been donated and delivered by Latham Sand and Gravel. Giuseppe Masonry has donated the labor to remove the old concrete and haul away, prepare the area for the new patio, on the west side of the building old dead brush and shrubbery was cleared. The concrete for the new patio was donated by Michael Sears of Sears Concrete. Our main entrance steps are being repaired and replaced by Goodrich Masonry. As you can see there are improvements to our grounds being accomplished and we are grateful for all the donations that we have received. Our goal with this project is to improve the appearance of our grounds and have this work accomplished by Memorial Day.



As was mentioned in last month's Reporter, The Auxiliary Unit 803 and Long Island Cares Veterans Project are hosting a Veterans Resource Fair and Food Distribution on Saturday May 2nd from 10 AM to 2 PM in the Legion Hall. Joan Cear for the Auxiliary and 2nd Vice Commander David Wilburn for the Legion are in charge of coordinating this event, along with Justin Berbig of L I Cares.

On Memorial Day this year, May 25th The Color Guard, Officers, and any members wishing to do so will muster at the Legion at 7:30 AM to attend five war monuments and offer a brief, solemn memorial ceremony to honor and remember the soldiers who gave their lives for our country during the various wars in the past. At 10:00 AM we will meet in Greenport at the war monument across from Townsend Manor for this year's Memorial Day Parade which I believe is scheduled to begin at 11:00 AM, hosted by Greenport American Legion Burton Potter Post 185.

The Walk 4 Valor originally scheduled for May 2nd has been changed to take place on Sunday June 7th 8:00 AM beginning at the legion walking to Orient Fire Dept and back to end at Southold Fire Dept.

There is much preparation and planning taking place for the 250th anniversary of America and the Annual 4th of July Parade. Be on the lookout for more information in the local papers, next month's Reporter and WLNG.

VETERANS GET A BREAK ON THEIR PROPERTY TAX

New York State has enacted new legislation (S1183) granting 100% service-connected disabled veterans a full property tax exemption on their primary residences. Effective October 1, 2026, this mandatory exemption applies to the 2027 assessment roll, removing the previous local option, ensuring all eligible veterans receive full tax relief. Veterans with a 100% service-connected disability rating from the VA who hold an honorable discharge must submit Form RP-458-a(Alternative) or equivalent, along with proof of service and disability, to their local assessor. The deadline is typically the taxable status date (often March 1st in many localities), but veterans should confirm with their local assessor's office.

The following exemptions were emphasized under this new resolution. The Alternative Veterans' Exemption grants a 15% reduction in assessed value for wartime service, plus an additional 10% for combat zone service. Any Cold War Veteran gets an exemption of 10% or 15% reduction for service between Sept. 2, 1945, and Dec. 26, 1991. Also a spouse or unremarried surviving spouse of an eligible Veteran as well as a Gold Star Parents of a service member who was killed while serving on active duty during a time of war can receive these benefits. To receive any information on these exemptions please contact your local assessor's office.

Hello Legion Family:

I'm excited to get home just in time to conduct the Walk4Valor on Sunday, June 7th. This deployment was incredibly challenging, and it reinforced my commitment to bring awareness to the epidemic of Veteran Suicide. We lost more Veterans to suicide than we lost conducting the War on Terror. Think about that for a moment. These Veterans survived serving during a time of War only to lose the battle of their life to suicide. Why? There are many reasons why Veterans commit suicide. Some of the reasons are not even related to their service but I believe one reason for Veterans to choose life is Family. I'm not just talking about blood relatives. I'm talking about organizations like the American Legion and the extended family bonds that are formed. I can tell you that I had some low moments during this deployment, but I kept getting encouraging messages from my Legion family. Peter Haack, John Christina, John Copertino and Denise Thilberg consistently reached out to me to give me encouragement and keep me updated on Legion activities. Gary Iorio and Charles Barkley helped Alina with a couple of house issues that I could not fix while on deployment. John Copertino and the Auxiliary Team sent the fuel that keeps a staff functioning...Coffee. Commander Dave DeFriest and other Legionnaires cleaned out my office in Town Hall after I lost the election for Assessor. There were many more acts of kindness shown to me while I was deployed and I thank every one of you for your support. These acts of kindness are perfect examples of how we can combat Veteran Suicide. Providing Veterans a sense of purpose through shared values such as the Four Pillars of the American Legion and being supportive during trying times. I would like to encourage everyone reading this to come out and support the Walk4Valor this year. You don't have to do all 22 miles. You can support with a virtual registration and come for the morning ceremonies and BBQ at the end. A community can have a positive impact and save Veteran's lives when it truly shows it Values its Veterans like Post 803 does daily.

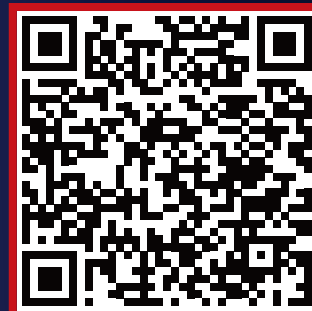

Brothers Frank and Albert Napoli may not have known it at the time but they are for certain part of America's greatest generation. Born in the Bronx, Albert and Frank both served their country in WW II: Albert in the Navy and Frank in the Army.

Albert Napoli joined the U.S. Navy at 17 years of age in 1944 and served on the USS Belleau Wood. His ship was hit by enemy kamikazes in the Gulf of Leyte, Philippines, causing fire to quickly engulf the ship. His back in flames, Albert jumped overboard, a 60 foot drop. Despite his injuries he assisted his shipmates onto a rescue ship. Later on he would learn over 92 shipmates had perished.

Meanwhile in the European theater, his brother Frank Napoli was engaged in a fierce tank battle against Hitler's armored tanks.

Fifty years later in 1995, this was his recollection of events from January 19, 1945, Company L 411 Infantry 103th Division:

We laid down a mortar attack on the Town of Sessenheim (Germany), followed by a spearhead of 5 medium tanks and the men of the 1st weapons platoon. Crossing an open field, within ten minutes the Germans destroyed our five tanks. In one tank, two men were able to get out and run towards the rear, while in another tank, a soldier was dead in the turret.

Our Lieutenant and some of our men were wounded. I was advancing with one of the tanks as a shield from the flames all around me. The tank was hit broadside and as it exploded, I was in the core of the flying shrapnel, but the good Lord was really looking out for me then, and many other times as well.

We continued the attack and reached the outskirts of the town and entered some of the barns for cover, and shortly thereafter we were surrounded by German soldiers. One of the fellow's lifted his rifle to shoot at the Germans. I knocked his rifle down as we didn't stand a chance to get away alive. The Germans disarmed us and took our packs and helmets. I had two hand grenades on my belt and started to remove them. When the German soldiers saw what I was doing, they backed away from me. They feared that I was going to blow us up. The pins still in the grenades, I tossed them on a bale of hay. The Germans marched us out of the barns while kicking and slapping us across the head.

Marching back into the town we observed a column of enemy tanks lined up in the town center. As they moved us to the rear we stopped at a machine gun emplacement,

and some of us were picked to move it. At that moment I remembered reading in Stars & Stripes, where the Germans took G.I.'s into the woods to machine gun them down. To my relief, they just wanted to change the gun emplacement. We continued marching to a river where we were led into barns along the shoreline. We were told to get into the pig pens by a German artillery outfit, and we wondered what was in store for us. The next morning, we were led across the fast-moving river using a cable and a barge. After we crossed, we had another long march.

We finally arrived at a Stalag, in a town called Ludwigsburg. We soon were loaded into boxcars, 100 men in a car. The trip took 3 days, moving only at night to another stalag. Our only toilet was the opening between the cars. During the day we were let out to stretch, one car at a time. At one

point we saw a pile of raw potatoes on the ground. We ran over, grabbed them, cleaned them on our pants and devoured them. When you are starving you will eat anything.

Another 3 days, another Stalag, this one outside Nuremberg. We had straw bunks, and met other GI's from England, France and the USA. Eventually I was moved with 20 others and used as farm labor. We worked hard but fed before being locked up for the night.

As days went on we began to hear artillery fire and bombings. The Germans were retreating! The farmers decided to hide us until the American Army arrived. They

hid us for three days. Then the bad news came. The SS troops heard about us and said they would find us and shoot us. As allied forces advanced on them, the German artillery outfit guarding us marched us to Munich at night avoiding daylight and allied bombers. During the day we were locked into barns. This lasted for 10 days and nights.

Eventually the 45th US Armored Division broke through to us. We ran across an American Officer and told him we had been P.O.W.s. He told us to get back to the Rhine River and be airlifted to Camp Lucky Strike in France. From there we came back to the USA on a navy hospital ship. We docked in Rhode Island where we had our first decent meal. I served 5 1/2 years, 4 1/2 years overseas. Frank and Albert both survived WWII.

Frank would open a gas station on Long Island then take a job at Grumman. He was a loving husband, father, and grandfather.

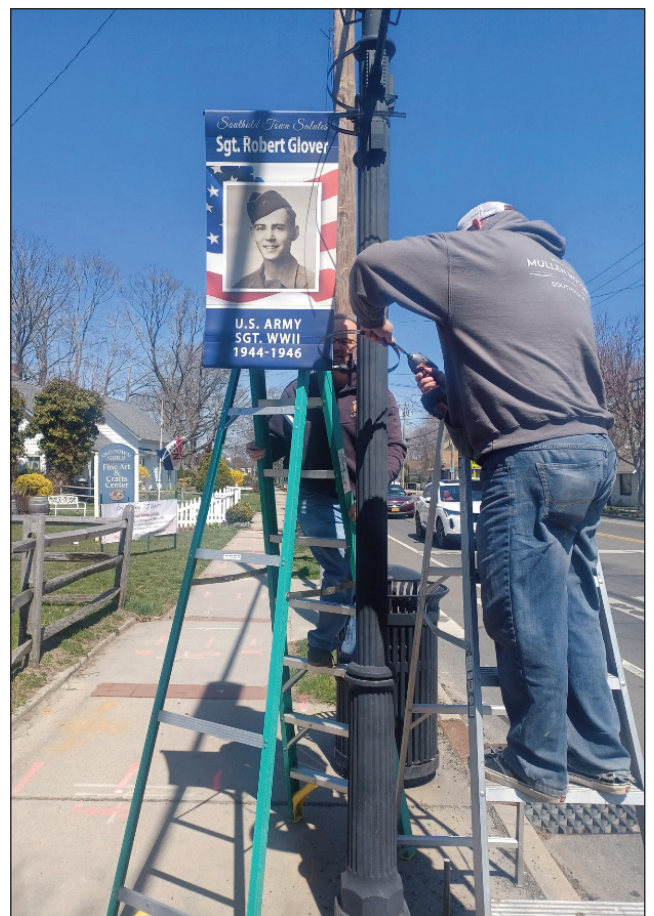

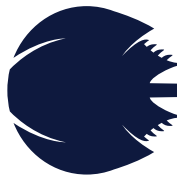
