Hello Fellow Legionnaires & Friends of the Legion:

2019 Reflecting Back

What an amazing year of accomplishments for Post 803. The Post ended the year with a wonderful breakfast with Santa organized by the Auxiliary and cooked by Jan Powers. Everyone

came together and provided a wonderful time for children and parents. Pictures to follow at the end of this article. In 2019 we also successfully planned and executed eight dinner socials that resulted in an estimated 700 meals served. We ran nine fundraising events to include Daytona 500 (February), St Patrick's Dinner (March), Golf Classic (June), two legion breakfast events (July & December), Auxiliary Yard Sale (July), Car Show (August), Chicken BBQ (September), Auxiliary Craft Fair (November). In addition to this we held and or participated in Veterans Day, Memorial Day and 4th of July ceremonies. We fellowshipped together at the Veterans Dinner Dance and Christmas Pot Luck Dinner. We coordinated all of these events through monthly meetings held by Legion and Auxiliary members. We gave back by providing the hall free of charge to outside organizations such as the Cub Scouts, Boys Scouts, Girl Scouts and we rented the hall at affordable prices to those that need a place to host birthday parties, sweet sixteen parties, weddings and more. We gave three \$1,000 scholarships to local high school students and sponsored kids to participate in Boy's State to promote Americanism. We also gave back to other Veterans organizations totaling \$1,000.

The Post accomplished many of our 2019 goals to include repairing our kitchen stoves, installing a new professional coffee maker, repairing our brick steps, purchase of new bar furniture, replacement of decorative light fixture and raising emergency funds for our kitchen hood and suppression system in the amount of \$25,000. All of this was accomplished through the coordinating efforts of Denise Thilberg, E.J. Flynn, Bob Cochran, Joe St. Pierre, Michael Devine (RIP Brother), Jeff Chagnon, and Jan Powers. The funds to execute these goals came from the generous donations of the Lomangino family,

Bill Kietsek, Bill Von Eiff, Doris Sherman, Paul Kreiling and Al Kropp as well as all of those that paid for the brass plates that are now affixed to the bar furniture.

2020 Planning Forward

On December 3rd we held our 2020 planning meeting to map out our events and set our goals for the new year. Our calendar is now set and our 2020 goals are published as reflected in this month's Reporter. In order for 2020 to be successful we are calling on our membership and our Friends of the Legion to review our calendar of events and goals and schedule your time to volunteer for an event or give in support of our goals. We are looking beyond 2020 as we prepare to start working on some of our long-term goals. One method to reach these goals is to increase our yearly funds allocated to the building fund. It is our goal to raise \$25,000 over and above our normal fundraising activities each year to start addressing accomplishing larger items also listed in this month's Reporter. Anyone willing to donate toward the building fund may do so by writing a check to American Legion Post 803 and sending it to our P.O. Box 591 Southold, NY 11971. In the future we will be looking into a Go Fund Me account to link up with our website.

2020 Advertisement & Communication

We are also looking to expanding our advertisement base and communication with the public with a new website design. Every sponsor that takes out a yearly ad for \$600.00 will also be featured on our website with a direct link back to their website with the goal of driving business to our sponsors. In order for us to pay for the cost of producing and publishing the Reporter, updating our website and maintaining it monthly we need 16 paid ads. When we

first started taking out ads in the Reporter we only sent to approximately 230 people but we are now up to 700+ with more each year. We need people like you to reach out to businesses you may know in the community and ask if they would be willing to take out an ad. Our website update is scheduled to be complete by the end of January 2020. To take out an ad all we need is a check for \$600.00 and a business size ad sent to us. 2020 New Fundraising with the Queen of Hearts

This year we will be adding the Queen of Hearts game that is open to the public and will help us raise additional funds. Jan Powers is the chairman of this event and is also a member of the Moose Lodge where they offer this game. In week 43 of the Port Jefferson Moose game the winning amount is now \$186,525. We have the potential to raise as much as the Lodge. Here is how the game works. The game consists of 52 shuffled playing cards plus two jokers. Each card is randomly sealed inside an envelope, which are numbered from 1 to 54 and displaced in a locked glass case. Players write one of these numbers from the unopened envelopes on each of their Queen of Hearts tickets (\$10.00 for 3 tickets). Each week on Friday evening at the Legion bar a ticket will be drawn randomly from a large bin and the envelope that corresponds with the number on that ticket is opened to reveal the card inside. If the Queen of Hearts card is chosen the ticket holder wins 60% of the jackpot for that drawing. If the Queen of Hearts is not chosen, the game continues until the following week and the funds roll over into the next drawing and more tickets will be sold building up the pot. All the official rules will be posted in the Legion Bar and the card display case and tumbler will be located in the bar and locked until the drawing. We will be introducing this game at our 1st event of the year the Daytona 500 Party on Sunday February 16th with the first drawing Friday the 28th of February.

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

Queen of Hearts Game

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HISTORIAN

Commander's Note:

As we enter 2020 let's take a moment to reflect just how blessed we are today in comparison to those ringing in the New Year of 1942. For many it would be one of the last evenings they enjoyed before preparing for War.

Article:

As the nation rang in the New Year last night, the anxiety of war loomed over the typically festive occasion. Americans packed churches in quiet reflection, government employees gave up their days off, and major cities saw an enormous police presence. Officers patrolled areas where large groups of people were gathered to celebrate the start of 1942, such as Times Square in New York and F Street in the District of Columbia.

The police detail in Times Square was the largest ever assigned to the vicinity. More than 2,000 officers were assigned to the area as a safety measure on New Year's Eve, compared to 1940's patrol of just under 1,500 officers. "You can't close Time Square unless you close every theater, movie, hotel and night club," New York City Police Commissioner Lewis Valentine said. "There's no justification for that." Valentine said he decided to permit the festivities in spite of the danger of an air raid. He ordered the emergency services spotted on site in the event of an air attack. There were no air raids during last night's celebrations.

Washington, D.C. police officers reported a lesser use of horns at midnight, a likely result of Director of the Office of Civil Defense Fiorello La Guardia's request. "We can have just as much fun without blowing the horns," La Guardia said. He sent the request for minimal use of sirens or horns last night to prevent the possibility of serious disorder. The concern stemmed from the thought that the horns might be mistaken for the air-raid siren. Even with the precautions in place, a majority of the clubs, hotels and restaurants remained open. Theaters on Broadway have sold out their shows for the week.

The spike in business started as soon as the announcement that the Times Square festivities would be permitted. Although there were fire trucks, ambulances and patrol cars at hand (among other remind-

ers of the war), more than 500,000 people gathered in Times Square to watch the ball drop at midnight. Precautions were taken across the board, with officers stationed at every streetlight and fire alarm box in Times Square. Due to the recent update of a manual shut-off feature, the officers stationed were placed to ensure street lights were not extinguished by an unauthorized individual.

Along with the additional police presence, evacuations signs were installed that directed the safest and fastest route out of Times Square. "In case of alarm, leave Times Square," the signs read. "Do not run." Washington, D.C. did not see the same turnout as New York City. Government employees returned to work today at the unprecedented request of bureau orders. As a result, approximately 100,000 employees offered their holiday to the war effort. Another request came from President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had asked the nation to spend New Year's Day in prayer. Churches held midnight services, including the first night watch at the Washington National Cathedral in its 35-year history.

Archbishop Samuel Stritch lead the prayer service at Holy Name Cathedral in Chicago, Ill. "Fervently we shall pray that God will make us calm in triumph ... without hatred and greed in our hearts," he said.
