



The Second Reading

Romans 4:13-25

The promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, “I have made you the father of many nations”) —in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into

existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become “the father of many nations,” according to what was said, “So numerous shall your descendants be.” He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah’s womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith “was reckoned to him as righteousness.” Now the words, “it was reckoned to him,” were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification.

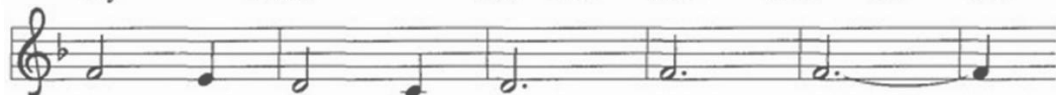

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

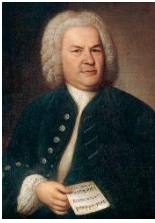

2. By donating money which the committee will use to purchase non-perishable food to stock the Box. You can donate by check or by going to the Neighbor Box donation tab on our website; www.trinityaurora.org on the Online Giving page.
3. By assisting committee members purchase food and stock the Box.

Non-perishable items can be donated in collection boxes at the back of the Church. Suggested non-perishable items include but are not limited to:

Canned: fruit, veggies, beans, soup, stews, fish, meat
Peanut butter
Fruit juice individual servings
Fruit cups such as apple sauce
Baby food
Water
Pairs of stockings
Personal hygiene: toothpaste, deodorant, shaving cream, tooth paste, combs, hairbrushes.

Trinity hosts squirrels who love to scratch open boxes of food, so be mindful of items they can steal.
