Why Lent? The Ash Wednesday liturgy sets the tone; a somber reflective flavor. We take inventory of ourselves and consider how we have responded to the gifts with which God has blessed our lives. Not always a cheerful task. Lent seems dark after the light of Epiphany.


As I write this article, I find myself wondering how the earliest Christians observed Lent. Lent for them was a time of preparation for baptism. How many of us are excited about renewing our baptismal vows? How many of us take seriously the need to repent and amend our lives?

Christians are called to a reformation of life. Who hasn't felt remorse when one's behavior was less than Christ-like? We know we aren't perfect, but is Lent only mournful, only sackcloth and ashes? I think not. The ashes placed upon our foreheads on Ash Wednesday are a vivid reminder of our mortality, but they are not merely a smudge, but a cross - Christ's cross! And the cross is not merely a sign of sorrow and defeat, but also points to the joy and victory of Easter.

In our baptism, we are called to share in Christ's resurrection. We are called to share the good news of God's love and to invite those who do not know the good news to learn about it and to join us. We do well to be reminded at the beginning of Lent that we will die, but Lent is not just a season of death. It is a season of life. New life in Christ will not make sense to anyone until life is understood as meaningful and it is very difficult for anyone to see meaning when a cloud of darkness and gloom hover. There's an oft-heard litany that today's lifestyles, absence of values, young people, television, etc., etc. lead only to hopelessness. Christians are called to rise above that litany and show the world about God's forgiveness and love and plans for our future. When we do, Lent re-establishes its place within the seasons of the church as a time to prepare for the celebration of baptism; a time to renew our vocations as God's chosen and to celebrate our life in Christ. Thanks be to God!

Financial Notes


- Actual Budgeted Income is \$29,038 but includes a draw down from the Memorial Fund of \$12,500.
- Endowment Income was \$2,515 higher than budgeted. Quarterly Pledgers boosted Pledge and Plate income by \$1,021 over budget
- Building and grounds totals include our first quarter insurance payment of \$1,999.50.
- Office and Administration includes \$1,604 in end of 2017 taxes.

Building and Grounds

- We got an extension on our Grant from the Community Foundation of the Fox Valley to install a fire protective hood over the stove in the kitchen. The extension is to get a second bid on the installation and see if we can raise some matching funds.
- Contacted Heitkotter, Inc. to give us a bid on the Stucco work. We have had three painters come and look at the Church Ceiling project. So far we haven't received any bids.
- Installed humidifiers on two Pianos (the Grand Piano in the Parish Hall and the upright piano in the choir room.) Purchased a protective cover for the Grand Piano.
- Removed the broken Storm Door to the Parish Hall.
- Applied to Painters District Council No. 30 for a grant to paint the Kitchen. They won't make a decision until May.
- The Jubilee Ministry received two grants from the Episcopal Church totaling \$1,000.

Ritual, Reason, and Why...

During the season of Lent, we are encouraged to stop and take stock of our lives and the journey we are following. We are also to contemplate the suffering and death of Jesus, who took on all the aspects of being human, even those most fearsome ones. And we have also created, in our church, the practice of praying with those who are ill or are close to death.

Our Book of Common Prayer refers to these two practices as Ministration to the Sick and Ministration at the Time of Death. In days past, these two processes were referred to as Extreme Unction, or Last Rites. Over the years, these rites have been shared with those who are not necessarily suffering life-threatening illnesses, but to all who find themselves needing the support of prayers during difficult times.

We may travel back to the time of Jesus for the roots of these ministrations. In Mark, Jesus sent his twelve out to preach and “they cast out many demons, and anointed with oil many that were sick and healed them. (Mark 6:13). And Jesus’ brother, James, also suggests this anointing: “Is any among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord; and the prayer of faith will save the sick man, and the Lord will raise him up, and if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven.”

(James 5:14-15)

We at Trinity Church are gifted by the tradition we have instituted of the Laying on of Hands, Anointing, which is part of the Ministration to the Sick.

It is a lovely, comforting service, in which many readings remind us of the comfort we can find in God. On designated Sundays, we hear part of that service:

I lay my hands upon you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, beseeching our Lord Jesus Christ to sustain you with his presence, to drive away all sickness of body and spirit, and to give you that victory of life and peace which will enable you to serve him both now and evermore. **Amen**

And when our earthly travel is drawing to a close, we have a further aid in our journey back to God. Ministration at the Time of Death, words that sound so ominous, give way to another set of beautiful comforting guiding words to give us strength and hope as we go home. As humans, we fear death. As Christians, we are reminded that we are on our way to the end of our travels. In the prayer titled ‘A Commendation at the Time of Death’ we hear these words:

Depart, O Christian soul, out of this world;

In the Name of God the Father Almighty who created you;

In the Name of Jesus Christ who redeemed you;

In the Name of the Holy Spirit who sanctifies you.

May your rest this day be in peace and your dwelling place in the Paradise of God.

Thomas Cranmer *Archbishop of Cantebury and Martyr, 1556*



Thomas Cranmer was the principal figure of the English Reformation and was primarily responsible for the first Book of Common Prayer of 1549 and for its first revision in 1552.

Cranmer was born in Nottinghamshire on July 2, 1489. At fourteen he entered Jesus College, Cambridge, where by 1514 he had obtained his B.A. and M.A. degrees and a Fellowship. In 1526 he became a Doctor of Divinity, a lecturer in his college, and examiner in the University. During his years at Cambridge, he diligently studied the Bible and the new doctrines emanating from the continental Reformation.

A chance meeting with King Henry VIII at Waltham Abbey in 1529 led to Cranmer's involvement in the "King's Affair" – the annulment of Henry's marriage to Catherine of Aragon. Cranmer prepared the King's defense and presented it to the universities

in England and Germany, and to Rome.



While in Germany, Cranmer associated with the Lutheran reformers, especially with Andreas Osiander, whose daughter he married. When Archbishop Warham died, the King obtained papal confirmation of Cranmer's appointment to the See of Canterbury, and he was consecrated on March 30, 1533. Among his earliest acts was to declare the King's marriage null and void. He then validated the King's marriage to Anne Boleyn. Her child, the future Queen Elizabeth I, was Cranmer's godchild.

During the reign of Edward VI, Cranmer had a free hand in reforming the worship, doctrine, and practice of the Church. But at Edward's death he unfortunately subscribed to the dying King's will that the deprived, and degraded by Queen Mary I, daughter of Henry VIII by Catherine, and a staunch Roman Catholic. He was burned at the stake on March 21, 1556.

Cranmer wrote two recantations during his imprisonment, but in the end he denied his recantations, and died heroically, saying, "Forasmuch as my hand offended in writing contrary to my heart, there my hand shall first be punished; for if I may come to the fire, it shall first be burned."

Merciful God, through the work of Thomas Cranmer you renewed the worship of your Church by restoring the language of the people, and through his death you revealed your power in human weakness: Grant that by your grace we may always worship you in spirit and in truth; through Jesus Christ, our only Mediator and Advocate, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

2018 Annual Meeting Minutes With 2017 Annual Reports

1. Attendance list is attached to the file copy of this report.
2. Father Denzil called the meeting to order and began with an opening prayer
3. Appointment of a clerk: A motion was made, seconded and passed to appoint Rob Borchert Clerk of the annual meeting.
4. Approval of the 2017 Annual Meeting Minutes: A motion was made, seconded and passed to approve the 2017 Meeting Minutes.
5. Report of the nominating Committee. John Heath reporting. John presented the two new members put in nomination for the open Vestry positions: Guy Stephens and Ken Adam. At a later point in the meeting a motion was made seconded and passed to elect Ken and Guy to the Vestry. There were no other nominations from the floor.
6. Report of the Rector: Father Luckritz took this opportunity to offer thanks to all who contribute so much to Trinity.
 - a. Thanks to Karen Dolan and Janet Stephens who contributed so strongly to the Vestry. A motion was made, seconded and approved thanking them for their dedicated service. He thanked the whole Vestry for their passion for Trinity.
 - b. He expressed his admiration and thanks to Linda Barber for her stewardship of the Sandwich Board, and to Gale Blogg for her continued support.
 - c. He thanked Greg Gyllsdorff and all the members of the choir for the beautiful music throughout the year.
 - d. He thanked Janet Stephens and all the Lay Readers for their sharing of God's Word throughout the year. As more Readers step forward, Father intends to expand their role in the prayers of the people in the next year.
 - e. He thanked Pat Wilson and all the members of the Altar Guild for preparing for each and every service held in the Church and for their dedication to the beautification of the Church.
 - f. He thanked Linda Barber and Chireen DeKing for their leadership of St. Margaret's Guild and thanked the Guild for its support and dedication to Trinity. He also thanked Dolores Palmquist for her many years heading the Guild.
 - g. He thanked all of our Community Service Workers, especially Ruben, who was in attendance, for all of their work to clean and better the Church.
 - h. He thanked our Sexton, Gary Gorney, for all his work, his dedication and his willingness to go the extra mile.
 - i. He thanked Maria Ulloa for her ongoing work to make Trinity's grounds beautiful.
 - j. He thanked Trinity's Committees: Outreach, led by Marilou Clohessy; Finance, led by Tom Herget.
 - k. He thanked anyone he might have missed!
7. Report of the Wardens:
 - a. Marilou Clohessy, Senior Warden, referred people to her written report.
 - b. John Heath, Junior Warden said he was excited about the new grand piano and that it was actually being used!
8. Report of the Treasurer: Tom Herget reviewed:
 - a. The end of year financial statement.
 - b. The 2018 approved budget.
 - c. Our Endowment and Memorial Fund asset allocations. He reiterated that the Finance Committee sets the allocations and directs Morgan Stanley in following them.
 - d. The report of Parish Funds.
 - e. The Memorial Fund Subsidy of the Rector's Salary. A motion was made, seconded and approved that this investment is paying off very big dividends.
 - f. And the 2017 Finance Committee Report.
 - g. Father Luckritz reviewed the new separate Mission Funds Checking account and explained how it allows us to track dedicated donations and assure that the donor's wishes are followed.
9. Standing Committee and Miscellaneous Reports. Father Luckritz referred us to the submitted written reports, asked if there were any questions and then asked for a motion to approve all of the reports. A motion was made, seconded and approved to approve all of the submitted reports. (Continued on Page 7)



10. New Business:

- a. Father Luckritz discussed the appointment of Marilou Clohessy, Sr. Warden; John Heath, Jr. Warden; and Tom Herget, Treasurer to an additional three year term on the Vestry when their terms expire in January 2019. Linda Barber questioned the canonical and by-law limitations. Fr. Stated that he believed terms limits allowed for 2 consecutive terms being served before a break was required. Fr.'s purpose for bringing the topic up was to make certain the matter was addressed by the Vestry prior to next year's Nomination Committee brings to the Annual Meeting names for approval.
- b. He also asked approval of the appointment of Gale Blogg, Linda Barber, Karen Dolan, Mary Jacobsen, Cathie Patterson, and Pat Wilson as delegates and/or alternate delegates to the Diocesan Convention
- c. Linda Barber felt that we should abide by the Vestry-passed motion about sustainability at coffee hour. The question will be addressed by the Vestry.

The first one was from the Diocese of Chicago. This was a surprise. The next BIG surprise came from the National Church. I received a call from a lady in Washington, D.C. for a phone interview. We were awarded a grant. I had no idea how this came about, but what a pleasure this was to receive this recognition. I hope that you read about this in an e-mail Rob mailed out. Trinity is one of more than 600 Jubilee Ministry Centers in the Episcopal Church's Jubilee network. The award was part of \$67,000 distributed through 54 grants that support mission and ministry in 35 dioceses.

The article was published in the Chicago Diocesan newsletter. As I have said on many occasions: God works in mysterious ways!


