

Financial Notes

- In response to our Audit of the Memorial Fund Account, we have established a Memorial Account on QuickBooks to better keep track of expenses and what they were for.
- Our Treasurer. Tom Herget, completed the treasurer training course offered by the Diocese.
- The Vestry gave the go ahead this month to move forward on implementing an on-line giving program. Watch for further notice of this as we move forward.
- Our portion of the Roof replacement is \$27,000. \$1,000 is our deductible to the Insurance Company and \$26,000 is for the roof over the Altar which was not covered by insurance. Donations for the project have been \$2,570 so far. The project is finished except for the repair of the asphalt their big crane caused.



- We received a very generous donation totaling \$8,000 toward the painting of the church ceiling.
- Speaking of the ceiling of the Church, now that the Church roof portion of this project has been completed, we will proceed with the painting of the ceiling.
- We have also installed a grab bar by the Parish Hall Toilet and extended the railing coming up the stairs to the parish hall to help with that difficult last step!
- My thanks to Fr. Denzil’s discretionary fund and The Sandwich Board for splitting the cost of the new railing at the entrance from the parking lot to the Parish Hall.
- We received a thank you note from Lore Baker, the new President of the Association fro Individual Development (AID) thanking us for the \$500 donation we made to one of their Group Homes. Way to go Outreach! (See page 5 for a copy of the letter.)
- Speaking of Outreach, our Back To School Drive ends August 4, 2019. Thanks you all for your support!
- Thanks to the individuals who donated to our memorial fund in memory of Esther Watson, two new “Welcome to the Episcopal Church” signs that will hang at the entrances to our parking lot, have been purchased. One of the old ones had rusted through and we found a place where we could get two for the price of one. They should be here in August!
- Linda didn’t mention is her notes that we continue to get weekly support from our volunteers from AID. Here are some of the things they do: wrap the silverware for the Sandwich Board meal, fold and staple our Sunday Service Bulletins, distribute the Psalm for the Thursday Service, update the hymn boards in the Church with Sunday’s hymn numbers, replace the candles at the back of the Church and update or replace the envelopes in the pews. As much of this work would have to be done by the office if they were not here, I am eternally grateful!
- Average weekly attendance in Church for the year is nearing 50! We’re growing in spirit, strength and spirituality
- Our ongoing thanks to Gary and Maria for their patience with the lawn care while the roofing project was completed.
- There are now three flood lights shining down on the Parking lot. They are solar and make it a lot brighter out there at night!
- The big lift they used to get materials up to the roof ripped up some of our asphalt. The repairs will be done by the contractor who did the roof and are being scheduled as I write.
- Watch for new exterior banners outdoors, soon to be unfurled!

CREDO, COMMITMENT, AND CALL: NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

We say the Creed every Sunday. “I believe...” And what follows is a statement of faith. But, we say “I believe” many times in the week. A few nights ago I was watching a program where former athletes were predicting the outcome of an important game. Each said, “I believe that a certain team will win the game.” Another would counter with a different statement, but it still began, “I believe...”

The importance of this is the faith that is behind the statements. None of the former stars really knew who would win, but each of them “believed” with all their hearts that they were right. Listen to yourself this week and see how many times you say, “I believe.” Did you know you were making a statement of faith?

Many seminary students have to write a statement of faith before they are ordained. Many of them have to defend their beliefs. When we say, “I believe...” do we have the knowledge, sources, translations, etc. to defend our beliefs? When we open our minds and read scholarly articles we may find that our beliefs might need some updating.

Certainly, the Dead Sea Scrolls shed new light on many passages of scripture. Other documents have made us aware of words that have more than one meaning. In any case, remember that when you say, “I believe...” you are making a statement of faith.

As Christians we have a deep commitment to the teachings of Jesus Christ. The summary of the law puts it well:

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like it; You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets.

Matthew 22:37-40

We do our best to live lives that show God’s love to all people. But, sometimes we forget who our neighbor is. Or, maybe we don’t always want to know our neighbor. It’s always easier if we can get someone else to take care of our neighbor. But, the call to be a disciple of Christ is to reach out to all those around us. It is a hard task, and an easy one too. Hard to start, easy once you’ve begun.

When was the last time you invited someone to a special event at the church? Or to join a group in the church, i.e., the choir, a volunteer, or a committee? When we have visitors, we do such a good job of making them feel “at home” in our church. But, what about the “follow up?” I know that there are nice follow-ups from the clergy and Vestry members. But, that’s not exactly what I mean. What if they come back? What then? How do we bring new people into the fold of our Christian Community? When I came here, there were many things I was curious about. How did certain things get done? How did you know that everyone brought some special thing for a certain occasion? Let us all be aware of looking at the things we do through the eyes of visitors. They need a mentor to help them understand, and they need directions about how we do things.

The great hymnologist Erik Routley said, “Hymns are the take-home package of the Christian faith.” I think the hymn Jane Parker Huber wrote in 1981 sums it up well

*Called as partners in Christ’s service,
Called to ministries of grace,
We respond with deep commitment
Fresh new lines of faith to trace.
May we learn the art of sharing
Side by side and friend with friend,
Equal partners in our caring
To fulfill God’s chosen end.*

*Christ’s example, Christ’s inspiring,
Christ’s clear call to work and worth,
Let us follow, never faltering,
Reconciling folk on earth.
Men and women, richer, poorer,
All God’s people, young and old
Blending human skills together
Gracious gifts from God unfold.*

The Transfiguration of Our Lord



The Transfiguration is not to be understood only as a spiritual experience of Jesus while at prayer, which three chosen disciples, Peter, James, and John, were permitted to witness. It is one of a series of supernatural manifestations, by which God authenticated Jesus as his Son. It is at one with the appearance of the angels at the birth and at his resurrection, and with the descent of the Spirit at Jesus' baptism. Matthew records the voice from heaven saying, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him" (Matthew 17:5). Briefly the veil is drawn aside, and a chosen few are permitted to see Jesus, not only as the earth-born son of Mary, but as the eternal Son of God. Moses and Elijah witness to Jesus as the fulfillment of the Law and the Prophets. In Luke's account of the event, they speak of the "exodus" which Jesus is to accomplish at Jerusalem. A cloud, a sign of divine presence, envelops the disciples, and a heavenly voice proclaims Jesus to be the Son of God.

Immediately, thereafter Jesus announces to Peter, James, and John the imminence of his death. As Paul was later to say of Jesus, "Though he was in the form of God, he did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a servant, and was born in human likeness. And, being found in human form, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even death on a cross" (Philippians 2:6-8).

The Feast of the Transfiguration is held in the highest esteem by the Eastern Churches. The figure of the transfigured Christ is regarded as a foreshadowing of the Risen and Ascended Lord. The festival, however, was only accepted into the Roman calendar on the eve of the Reformation, and for that reason was not included in the reformed calendar of the English Church. Since its inclusion in the American revision of 1892, it has been taken into most modern Anglican calendars.

O God, who on the holy mount revealed to chosen witnesses your well-beloved Son, wonderfully transfigured, in raiment white and glistening: Mercifully grant that we, being delivered from the disquietude of this world, may by faith behold the King in his beauty; who with you, O Father, and you, O Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. Amen

Ritual, Reason, and Why....

To the popular mind, prayer is a series of petitions recited to God attempting to bend His will to that of the person praying, and which God is honor-bound to fulfill if it is "in accordance with His will." But prayer is no such thing at all! Since God has conferred free will upon His creatures it is no longer possible for Him to accomplish anything with or through them without their consent. No matter how insistently God may knock at the door of one's heart, that door can only be opened from within by oneself. And prayer is the means by which one voluntarily makes contact with the wisdom and power of God and opens up the channels through which the divine grace may flow into one's life. Prayer is, then, not an attempt to conform God to one's scheme of things, but the means of adjusting one's life to God's plan. - from [An Introduction to the Episcopal Church](#) by J. B. 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
