Financial Notes

We took our first drawdown of the \$12,500 from the Memorial Fund the beginning of March that was scheduled to be drawn • down on January 1, 2019.

** Building and Grounds is \$3887 over budget. We had pipe repair costs of \$3,312 which is \$937 over budget. It has been an expensive year for natural gas this year: \$4,135 as compared to \$2,375 budgeted.

*** This number is inflated due to a double tax payment. We are now square with both the IRS and the State of Illinois.

The biggest B & G news of the month is the approval of our claim to replace the roof of the Church due to wind damage! The total cost of the roof over the nave of the Church is \$182,308.51. Trinity's deductible is \$1,000. We were given the option to also do the roof over the Sanctuary. Our negotiated price for that work is \$26,000. If we do both our liability is \$27,000 plus the cost of permits. The contractor is seeking the permits as I type. Work should begin in early June and continue through the beginning of August. This is terrific news!

Once the roof is redone, we are contracted to fix and repaint the Church Cciling. The • ceiling has been our One - to - Grow on project for the last two years. I am very glad it was so hard to find a contractor (we have one waiting in the wings, ready to jump in when the roof is finished). The roofers warned us that there might be some plaster damage due to work on the roof and that if there was, they would follow up for additional financial support from the insurance company. Sometimes God sends the right plan even though it drives us 'getter done now' humans crazy!

Thanks to Ken Adam and his family, we finally got the new flagpole installed and the brackets installed!. Next up, seasonal banners for each!

Ritual, Reason, and Why... Incense

Incense Refers to: any number of woods and/or resins which, when heated or burned, give off a fragrant smell. "frank" means PURE incense. Resin from the tree species - *Boswellia*.

Use: very old and widespread. Used by MANY religions.

7 uses:

- \cdot as a sacrifice to the god or gods
- \cdot as a sacrifice to a deceased human(s)
- \cdot as a symbol of honor to a living person(s)
- \cdot as a "demonifuge" = to drive away evil spirits ~ living or dead
- · as a means of purification or healing
- \cdot as a festive accompaniment for processions and ceremonies
- · simply to create (through using senses) a worshipful atmosphere

ALSO had PRACTICAL USE ~ to cover the smell of the burnt offerings and the People. Has also come to represent our PRAYER RISING.

1st three centuries NOT used in Christian ceremonies because OTHER religions used it and it was associated with sacrifices to "GOD(S)" other than the Christian God and also to the emperor(s). All which was consider FALSE use.

 4^{th} and 5^{th} century we begin to see it coming into use. HONORIFIC led to rapid widespread use by the 6^{th} century ~ sacrificial offering as an act of ADORATION.

AT HOLY COMMUNION used:

- \cdot in processing the gospel book BOTH INTO the church and to it PROCLAMATION
- \cdot in HONORIFIC reverence to the ALTAR (can be used at entrance OR just before the

EUCHARIST.

- \cdot HONORIFIC reverence to the OFFERINGS OF THE PEOPLE \sim BOTH MONEY
 - and BREAD AND WINE.
 - in RECOGNITION of the participants of the worship service: the celebrant, the servers, the choir, the People.

Our quilt was lovingly hand-made by St. Margaret's Woman's Guild members and a quilting friend. Raffle Tickets \$5 each or three for \$10




We are selling tickets for the quilt raffle which will be held in November



Mary, Martha (and Lazarus) of Bethany

Martha, Winner of the Lent Madness 2019

Mary and Martha of Bethany, with Lazarus their brother, are described in the Gospels according to Luke and John, as close and well-loved friends of Jesus. Luke records the well-known story of their hospitality, which has made Martha a symbol of the active life and Mary of the contemplative, though some commentators would take the words of Jesus to be a defense of that which Mary does best, and a commendation of Martha for what she does best-neither vocation giving grounds for despising the other.

John's Gospel sheds additional light on the characters of Mary and Martha. When Lazarus is dving, Jesus delays his visit to the family and arrives after Lazarus' death. Martha comes to

meet him, still trusting in his power to heal and restore. The exchange between them evokes Martha's deep faith and acknowledgment of Jesus as the Messiah (John 11:21-27).

John also records the supper at Bethany at which Mary anointed Jesus' feet with fragrant ointment and wiped them with her hair. This tender gesture of love evoked criticism from the disciples. Jesus interpreted the gift as a preparation for his death and burial..

"Who was Martha in the Bible?"

Martha is a significant New Testament figure, a personal friend of Jesus, and someone with whom many women today identify. She lived in Bethany with her sister, Mary, and her brother, Lazarus, whom Jesus raised from the dead (John 11:1–15, 43–44). We meet Martha three times in the Bible, and each event helps to build a profile of this

interesting woman.

The Bible first mentions Martha in Luke 10. She is in her home in Bethany, a small town near Jerusalem, where she is hosting Jesus and the disciples. Jesus was well-known to Martha and her siblings; in fact, Jesus loved this little family (John 11:5). On the day that Jesus visited, Martha's desire was to be a good hostess—to serve the best meal with the best possible presentation, for Jesus' sake. Her sister, Mary, however, was taking some time out to listen to Jesus (Luke 10:39). As Martha "was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made" (Luke 10:40), she became a little cross with Mary and spoke rather abruptly to the Lord: "Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me!" (verse 40). In this foolish utterance, Martha implied that Jesus did not care about her, and she gave the Lord a command, demanding that He force Mary to assist in the serving. In her busyness, Martha had taken her eyes off the Savior. Jesus, who was able to see into her soul, diagnosed her problem: she was worried and troubled about the serving and had no peace in her heart. He gently told Martha that a simple dinner was more than adequate, and He reminded her that Mary's decision to sit at His feet and hear His word was the better choice (verses 41-

42).

We see Martha again just after her brother, Lazarus, had died (John 11). The sisters had sent for Jesus when Lazarus fell ill (verse 3), but He did not arrive in time to heal him. When Jesus finally approached Bethany, four days after Lazarus' death, Martha ran out to meet Him and declared, "If you had been here, my brother would not have died. But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask" (John 11:21–22). Notice Martha's faith: she firmly believed that Jesus could have healed Lazarus of his illness. And her faith is not diminished by the fact that Jesus had arrived "too late." Jesus encourages Martha with one of His "I AM" statements: "I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die. Do you believe this?" (verses 25–26). Martha's response is one of great faith and understanding of Jesus' divine nature: "Yes, Lord . . . I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, who is to come into the world" (verse 27). Martha's faith was rewarded that very day as she witnessed her brother's miraculous resurrection from the dead (verses 43-44).

The third time we encounter Martha in the Bible, she is doing what Martha was known to do-serving (John 12:2). Jesus is again attending a dinner in His honor in Bethany, and Martha is again serving. It is on this occasion that Martha's sister, Mary, anoints Jesus' feet with expensive perfume (verse 3). It becomes apparent that Martha was likely a woman of some means, evidenced by the size of her home, the frequency of her hosting dinners, and the expensive perfumed oil her sister owned.


In Martha's life-changing encounters with Jesus, we see the importance of balancing service with worship, of trusting the Lord even when all seems lost, and of using our material resources for the glory of God.

O God, heavenly Father, your Son Jesus Christ enjoyed rest and refreshment in the home of Mary and Martha of Bethany: Give us the will to love you, open our hearts to hear you, and strengthen our hands to serve you in others for his sake; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.
