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


























What are Visual Supports?

- A method of communication that uses pictures rather than words.
 - Photographs, drawings, objects, written words, or lists
 - Can be used for people of all ages and levels of functioning
 - Generalize across environments
 - Individualized to a person's specific needs
- Visual supports are used with children who have autism spectrum disorder (ASD) for two main purposes:
 - 1. They help parents communicate better with their child
 - 2. They help their child communicate better with others






Why Can Visual Supports be Helpful?

- To make wants/needs known
- To offer choices
- To show and tell what to expect to aid with transitions, changes in routine, or new environments
- To show and tell expected behavior
- To teach social skills

- 6. Location-Specific Choice Boards



First - Then Board











- There are many online resources (do2learn.com) for free printable picture cards in categories such as health, self-help, activities, home, school, social skills, safety, scheduling, and technology
- Making your own visual aids is a great way to customize them to your child's needs and preferences
- The same picture cards can be used on various types of visual supports or mix and matched
- A "STOP" folder can signal where children can place cards after he/she has finished an activity or to show that an activity is not a current choice
