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

TRULY RISEN!

The Lord is truly risen, alleluia!

(Easter entrance antiphon)

All during Lent the first readings of the liturgy were drawn from the Old Testament and told stories of the family of those who came before Jesus. When Jesus rose on Easter the people who loved and followed him in his life became part of the new family known as Christians. On the Sundays of Easter we will read about their stories from the New Testament book called the Acts of the Apostles. You are one of these Christians. Each Easter, we have the chance to imagine ourselves standing at the empty tomb with the apostles. Together we believe that Jesus is not among the dead but is "truly risen" and with us today.

SEEDS OF FAITH

There is a brevity, a certain terseness, in the scripture readings for Easter Sunday. Peter's speech in Acts is built of direct, pointed sentences. Paul's letters are based on straightforward creed-like statements. Even the Gospel story only briefly recounts what will turn out to be one of the most remarkable events in human history—the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. Advertising agents call these encapsulated points of information "bullet points." Scripture scholars call them keryamata, or "kernels" of our faith. Actually, "kernels" or "seeds" are good terms for these statements, since throughout the Easter season, we will hear in the Acts of the Apostles, the Letters of Paul, and the Gospel accounts of the days following the Resurrection exactly how these kerygmata began to flower, how they continued to grow through the life of the early church. May these Easter "seeds" of faith serve a similar purpose for us. too, so that the life of the Risen Christ will flourish in us and through our witness in the coming days.

CHRIST HAS RISEN

Where is your sting, O death? Where is your victory, O hell? Christ has risen, and you are overthrown. Christ has risen, and the demons have fallen. Christ has risen, and the angels rejoice. Christ has risen, and life reigns. Christ has risen, and not one dead rests in the grave. For Christ having risen from the dead became the first-fruits of them that slept. To him be glory and majesty to ages of ages. Amen.

Dear Padre,

What's the origin of the word Easter? It's not mentioned in the Bible. Wouldn't a better name be Resurrection Sunday?

Experts trace Easter back to Old-English meanings associated with Eostre, the goddess of spring and fertility. Others point to the German word for east, which is derived from the Latin word for dawn. Regardless, Christianity found new meaning in the ancient celebration of nature's rebirth during the spring equinox. This resurrection of new life over the dead of winter also pointed to Christ's resurrection from the dead at dawn.

Likewise, early Christians gave new meaning to ancient symbols of fertility, such as rabbits and eggs. For example, a hatching chick represented the risen Christ emerging from the shell of a tomb, and the Roman proverb Omne vivum ex ovo ("All life comes from an egg") symbolized the resurrection. Eggs, prohibited during the Lenten fast, were reintroduced at the Easter meal and shared as decorated gifts. In 1610, a prayer by Pope Paul V blessed the egg, "that it may become a wholesome sustenance to thy faithful servants, eating it in thankfulness to thee, on account of the resurrection of the Lord."

"Each week, on the day called the Lord's Day, [the Church] commemorates the Resurrection of the Lord, which she also celebrates once a year in the great Paschal Solemnity" (The Roman Missal, "Universal Norms on the Liturgical Year and the Calendar," 1). Thus, every Sunday—even those in Lent—is a Resurrection Sunday in celebration of Christ's triumph over death, which will include our own!

To the Faithful of the Diocese of St. Augustine,

Just a few weeks ago - more than 500 people gathered with me at the Cathedral Basilica of St. Augustine for the Rites of Election. These catechumens and candidates accompanied by many of their pastors and deacons have been preparing for the final leg of their journey of faith when they will receive the sacraments of initiation.

On Holy Saturday, at the Easter Vigil, men, women and children are initiated into the Church celebrating their baptism, confirmation, and the first reception of the Holy Eucharist with us. And celebrating with them that evening, and throughout the day on Easter Sunday, all of us renew our baptismal promises.

This year because of the extraordinary circumstances surrounding the corona virus pandemic, we will not be able to gather in our churches. Nevertheless, there is a reason for hope. When God chose Moses and directed him to go to the Pharoah- he paused and asked God - who am I to do this? God assures Moses - to not fear: I will be with you.

When Gabriel visits Mary to tell her she will have the child Jesus - the message from God is the same: Do not be afraid - you have found favor with God. And when the disciples seemed doomed by a terrible storm - they heir Jesus speak these words: Do not be afraid, it is I.

In the liturgy for the Easter Vigil, there is a powerful prayer: "May this day inflame us with new hope. May be Light of Christ dispel the darkness of our hearts and minds." Indeed, this year we need to hear the words: "May the Light of Christ dispel darkness. Do not be afraid."

The scripture readings for the Easter Vigil are remarkable - they trace the entire sacred story of salvation - from the moment of creation through the birth of Christ and the marvel of God's beloved Son's passion, death and resurrection. We learn in the history of our salvation, the delight that God takes in us, that he rescues and saves us, that we can call upon him, that he remains near to us, and that he continually creates anew our hearts:

This Easter is so different for all of us - affecting all generations. But the message is the same: Do not be afraid.

On Easter morning, one of the beautiful Gospels is when Mary of Magdalen discovers the empty tomb - and Peter and the beloved disciple, John, rush to find him. May we continue our search for him in our lives - indeed, rush to find him in new and unique ways.
