Hello EAM,

I wanted to report on our "Virus Protection" version of the Saturday distribution.

First I want to sincerely thank those of you who wanted to come but agreed to stay home. It was a hard thing for me to ask that of you. The experts we discussed it with were very adamant not to take it lightly and follow the guidance and we did. I have always wanted this ministry to be inclusive not exclusive so this was difficult. Thank you for understanding that.

We had an extremely limited volunteer crew and everyone was spread out so well I thought the risk was well managed. None of the clients got out of their cars and Bill asked they had the trunk lids up before coming to the food delivery area. The parking lot looked like the ferry boat at times with cars staged 5 to a row and pulling forward in a very orderly fashion.

BEAM brought 225 bags of meat, 225 bags of bread and pastries and 225 bags of produce and fruit. Feeding NE Florida brought green beans I think they got from Disney. With Disney closing, they sent them a lot of fresh food, but the green beans were not in packages. They were in boxes, big boxes of green beans. We had to pack that food into our own bags, 13 gallon kitchen bags. They brought other things as well like eggs and broccoli. Everyone that came through for food received a lot of food. A lot of good food.

When Bill and I arrived at 5:00 AM we normally see 130 people lined up on the Mayport sidewalk. This morning, no one! Completely empty! I worried that we would have a lot of food left. Slowly they came and we let them drive through and loop around for seconds. People were so happy for what we were doing. One woman told us she was a substitute teacher and they told her no more work this year. She said she didn't know how she would make ends meet, but now she could! She was giggling with joy. So many from the heart sincere smiles. When the last car went through at 9:00 the last bag of food went with them. We gave away exactly the amount of food we had with nothing left over. Very few people spoke English. The officer with me, Lt Felipe Alicea, translated for me and we had brought written instructions in English and Spanish. People understood and we had very little problems. Jeff took care of the homeless and people walking or on bikes in a separate corner of the lot. We had to rework the entire model of how to distribute and I was worried all week about safety and execution but it all worked really well. We can improve but a great start.

In short, everyone was well protected from the virus, even the clients were grateful. As a church, whether you were there or not, you stood with these people in times of need and many of the people who came wanted to express their thanks. Once again, Saint John's demonstrated what being Christian looks like.

The Granting of Special Indulgences to the Faithful in the Current COVID-19 Pandemic

As Vicar of Christ and the Holy Father, Pope Francis on 20 March 2020 promulgated through the Apostolic Penitentiary a decree which provides for the faithful to gain a **plenary indulgence** as the world faces the Coronavirus pandemic.

In summation, the plenary indulgence is granted as follows:

▪ To the faithful who are suffering from the Coronavirus or Who are being quarantined by order of health authorities in hospitals or in the own homes

(1) When with a spirit detached from any sin can be spiritually united through any media with the celebration of the Mass or by praying the Holy Rosary, the Way of the Cross or any devotion;

(2) (2) Recite the Creed, the Lord's Prayer and any invocation to the Blessed Virgin Mary;

(3) Offering this trial in a spirit of faith in God and charity to others and fulfill the usual conditions to obtain a plenary indulgence (sacramental confession, Eucharistic communion and prayer according the Holy Father's intentions as soon as possible

▪ To health care workers, family members of those who are ill, indeed all who expose themselves to the risk of contracting the disease as they care for the sick are granted a plenary indulgence under the same conditions as cited above.

▪ To all the faithful (1) Who read Holy Scripture for at least 30 minutes, or reciting the Holy Rosary, or by making the Way of the Cross, or praying the Chaplet of Divine Mercy and (2) imploring God to end the pandemic, provide relief to those who are afflicted and eternal salvation for those whom the Lord has called to Himself are granted a **plenary indulgence** under the same conditions cited above.

▪ To those who find themselves unable to receive the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick and Viaticum, the Church entrusts each and every one to divine Mercy by virtue of the communion of saints and grants a **plenary indulgence** at the point of death provided making a recommendation for use of a cross or crucifix the person is duly disposed and having recited a few prayers during their lifetime (In this case only, the Church makes up for the three usual conditions required.)

Dear Padre,

March 29, 2020

I'm very disturbed at some clothing—or lack thereof—worn at Mass these days. I find myself being judgmental and I don't want to be. Does our Catechism mandate a dress code?

Being judgmental can exist on both sides of this issue: Those who dress casually or inappropriately at Mass may be seen as unmotivated and disrespectful; those who dress up may be accused of doing so not for God but to impress everyone else at Mass.

The casual-dress advocates are influenced by the current relaxed cultural norms on attire—in church and elsewhere. They rightfully point out that one's presence at Mass is more important to God than one's clothing. The dress-up advocates may believe this, too. However, the thought of actually being in God's presence at Mass determines their clothing choice.

Thus, an understanding of how the Mass is viewed today affects both casual-dress and dress-up proponents. While Catholics believe that Christ is present in all of creation and history, Christ's presence under the appearances of bread and wine is fundamental to our tradition. Moreover, a full appreciation of the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist impacts far more than our outward appearances!

While the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* has no official dress guidelines, it's best to assume that most attend Mass for the same reasons as you. Essentially, most people who dress sensibly and make an effort to attend Mass are expressing their reverence and love for God. —Fr. Byron Miller, CSsR
