Today, I walk with confidence, knowing that God is with me, for me, and working through me.

I am equipped, empowered, and covered by His grace. My children and I are blessed, protected, and thriving. And we will serve the Lord now and forevermore.

The Ten Commandments (KJV)

1. Thou shalt have no other gods before me.

God requires that we worship Him alone. This commandment teaches us to put God first in our lives above everything else.

2. Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image, or any likeness of any thing that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth: Thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them: for I the LORD thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate me; And shewing mercy unto thousands of them that love me, and keep my commandments.

This commandment is about worshiping God in the right way. God forbids us from making or bowing down to physical objects as representations of Him. No created thing can capture His infinite glory. It does not mean that art or beauty are wrong, but that nothing should be worshiped in place of God. When Israel made the golden calf, it was condemned because it replaced true worship with idolatry. Today, idols can be money, fame, relationships, or even ourselves. This commandment calls us to worship God in spirit and truth (John 4:24), keeping Him at the center of our devotion.

3. Thou shalt not take the name of the LORD thy God in vain; for the LORD will not hold him guiltless that taketh his name in vain. We must speak God's name with reverence. This command warns us against using His name carelessly, in false oaths, or disrespectfully.

4. Remember the sabbath day, to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labour, and do all thy work: But the seventh day is the sabbath of the LORD thy God: in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, thy manservant, nor thy maidservant, nor thy cattle, nor thy stranger that is within thy gates: For in six days the LORD made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is, and rested the seventh day: wherefore the LORD blessed the sabbath day, and hallowed it.

The Sabbath commandment is about rest and worship. God created the world in six days and rested on the seventh, setting a pattern for us. For Israel, the Sabbath was a literal day of rest, family, and devotion to God. It reminded them that He was their Creator and Provider. For Christians, while Christ fulfilled the Sabbath (Colossians 2:16–17), the principle of rest and worship still applies. Many gather on Sunday, the day of Christ's resurrection. On a deeper level, the Sabbath points to Jesus Himself (Hebrews 4), our true rest. This command calls us to pause from endless labor, trust in God's provision, and center our lives in Christ.

5. Honour thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the LORD thy God giveth thee.	This teaches us to respect our parents and elders. Honoring them brings God's blessing of long life and stability.
6. Thou shalt not kill.	This commandment protects human life. It teaches us to value life as a gift from God and not to harbor hatred in our hearts.
7. Thou shalt not commit adultery.	God calls us to purity and faithfulness in marriage. This command protects the sanctity of family and relationships.
8. Thou shalt not steal.	We are to respect the property of others. Stealing shows lack of trust in God's provision, while honesty honors Him.
9. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour.	We are to be truthful and avoid lies, gossip, or slander. Honesty protects relationships and reflects God's character.
10. Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's wife, nor his manservant, nor his maidservant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor any thing that is thy neighbour's.	Coveting means craving what belongs to others. God calls us to be content with His blessings and rejoice for others instead of envying them.
