So, I decided to stop complaining about the weather. I couldn't change it.



We later moved to the Sunshine State. In July we came to Orlando looking for a house. It was so hot and humid that you couldn't stand out in the direct sun for more than a few minutes. Did I complain? No, if you live in Florida in the summer, it is very hot and humid. In July of 1997 we moved to



a wonderful place called Tuscawilla. I often hear people complain about the summer heat and humidity. I say to them what do you expect? You live in Central Florida. This is how it is. It is now June, and it won't be getting cooler until mid-October. Enjoy these days and go to the mall, the beach, enjoy your pool, and be thankful for air conditioning. Over all we do enjoy a nice climate and have a nice place to live.



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# HURRICANE SEASON IN CENTRAL FLORIDA: HOW WINTER SPRINGS IS INVESTING AND BUILDING RESILIENCE

Hurricane season is officially here—running from June 1st through November 30th—and in Winter Springs, especially in our Tuscawilla community, we know how serious that can be. Just three years ago, Hurricane Ian brought devastating impacts to our city—washing out multiple bridges, disrupting water and sewer service, and leaving many residents to deal with flooding and prolonged recovery efforts.

That experience reminded us how vulnerable Central Florida can be and just how important preparation and infrastructure investment truly are.

This year, residents can take comfort in knowing that the City of Winter Springs is making historic investments in stormwater protection and hurricane resilience. In fact, more than \$13 million in storm-related infrastructure projects are currently underway or in development.

#### Here are just a few of the key efforts:

- Tuskawilla Crossings Pond 1 Repairs \$2.5M
- Wetland Park Outfall Improvements \$1.5M
- Gee Creek Stabilization at Moss Park \$190K City match
- Safe Room at Police Station \$600K City match





- Hurricane Milton Debris and Sediment Removal Projects \$0 City match (100% grant-funded!)
- Permanent Generator at Public Works \$185K City match
- Flood-Proofing 12 Sewer Lift Stations \$1.2M City match
- Acquiring & Elevating Flood-Prone Homes Over \$200K in local match
- Culvert & Channel Improvements on Gee Creek and No Name Creek – Over \$1.2M
- Future projects from our Kimley-Horn Stormwater Master Plan Estimated at \$5M

These projects represent a powerful combination of local commitment and federal/state grant support, all aimed at protecting homes, reducing flood risk, and improving recovery time after storms.

As always, we encourage every household to prepare: stock up on essentials, update your emergency plans, and sign up for city alerts. But know this—Winter Springs is preparing too, and the work underway today will help protect our community for years to come.



# PREPARING FOR HURRICANE SEASON: A COMMUNITY RESPONSIBILITY

As hurricane season approaches, it's essential that every Winter Springs resident takes time now to prepare. While we hope for a quiet season, preparation can make all the difference when storms do occur. In recent years, our city has experienced firsthand the devastating impact of hurricanes which flooded hundreds of homes across Winter Springs. Being ready is not just about convenience; it's about protecting lives, homes, and neighborhoods.

#### **Build a Kit**

Start by assembling an emergency supply kit. Include essentials such as:

- At least three days' worth of water (1 gallon per person per day)
- Non-perishable food
- Flashlights and batteries
- A battery-powered or hand-crank radio
- Prescription medications
- Important documents in a waterproof container
- Chargers and backup power for electronics
- First aid supplies and hygiene products

#### Make a Plan

Discuss evacuation routes and shelter plans with your family. Know whether you live in a flood-prone area and review Seminole County's evacuation zones. Make arrangements for pets, and if anyone in your home has medical needs, register in advance for special needs shelters.

#### **Stay Informed**

Follow official sources like the National Weather Service, Seminole County Emergency Management, and the City of Winter Springs for real-time updates. Sign up for local alerts through the City of Winter Springs or Alert Seminole to receive emergency notifications directly to your phone or email.

#### **Prepare Your Property**

Clear gutters and drains, secure loose outdoor items, and consider installing storm shutters or reinforcing garage doors. Trim trees and branches near your home to minimize damage from high winds.

#### **Community Matters**

Check on neighbors—especially seniors or those with limited mobility. When we prepare together, we strengthen the safety net that makes Winter Springs such a caring and resilient community.

As your local officials continue working on long-term flood protection and infrastructure upgrades, your personal preparation remains the first and most important line of defense.

Let's stay safe, look out for each other, and make this hurricane season one of readiness—not regret.

This year, the Tuscawilla Homeowners Association is proud to recognize Erik Anderson as the recipient of the 2025 Don Gilmore Award for outstanding volunteer service and civic involvement.

The award, named in honor of the late Don Gilmore, celebrates residents who embody the same spirit of service Don exemplified during his lifetime. Don's legacy includes time as a City Commissioner for Winter Springs, a past president of the Tuscawilla Homeowners Association, and a driving force behind numerous service-based organizations that continue to benefit the Tuscawilla community to this day.

Erik Anderson follows in these footsteps with quiet leadership and an unwavering commitment to others. Originally from Ohio, Erik moved to Florida to attend the University of Central Florida, where he met his wife Danielle. Married for 19 years, they've made Tuscawilla their home for the past 12, raising two sons in a household where service isn't just a value — it's a way of life.



Danielle, a former full-time after graduating teacher from UCF, has continued her passion for education as both a dedicated mother and an active substitute teacher in the community. Her impact was recognized when she was named Lawton Elementary School's "Dividend of the Year" - an award honoring her outstanding volunteer work and commitment to the success of local students. Whether in the classroom or

at home, Danielle is a constant source of support, compassion, and generosity.

Together, the Anderson family leads by example. Erik credits his own parents for instilling in him the importance of giving back, and he has carried that forward every step of the way. He has served on the Board of Directors for the Chelsea Woods Homeowners Association for seven years, including approximately five years as President, helping guide one of our neighborhood's most established communities. Beyond his neighborhood, Erik dedicates time to Christian HELP, where he volunteers as a career coach working with individuals to find meaningful employment and prevent homelessness through stability and support.

He is also a proud graduate of Leadership Seminole, Class 32, a year-long civic leadership program. His class selected *Impower* — an organization supporting young adults aging out of foster care as their yearlong service project. Together, they worked to enhance housing and services for youth transitioning

into adulthood, and for Erik, it was another deeply rewarding opportunity to help others reach their full potential.

Professionally, Erik is a licensed Professional Engineer with a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering and a master's in industrial engineering. He has been with Wharton-Smith Inc for 20 years, a local construction management and general contracting firm known for its strong culture of giving back. Wharton-Smith is recognized not only for the projects they build, but for their commitment to hiring individuals who serve as true partners in community improvement. He works locally at Wharton-Smith, where he holds the title of Director of Collaborative Delivery – a fitting role for someone so devoted to bringing people together for the greater good. He currently serves on the national board of the Water Collaborative Delivery Association and the Board of Directors for the Florida Design-Build Institute of America. Fittingly, Erik is currently overseeing the replacement of Winter Springs' two wastewater treatment facilities - a vital infrastructure project for the city he serves so passionately. This massive project is one of the most significant infrastructure investments in the city's history. Erik's role as a key partner in this effort reflects the deep trust placed in him by both Wharton-Smith and the Winter Springs community.

His commitment to global service is equally noteworthy. Erik has contributed to fundraising efforts for Wine for Water, a charitable initiative organized by the Florida Section of the American Water Works Association. This program raises funds to promote safe, clean drinking water for underserved communities in developing nations, reinforcing Erik's belief that access to clean water is a human right, no matter where you live.

Outside of their many commitments, the Andersons are an active and adventurous family. They enjoy hiking together and have traveled to destinations such as the Shenandoah Valley in Virginia, Norway, and other beautiful corners of the world to share in their love of the outdoors. The Andersons are car enthusiasts and enjoy restoring and working on various automobiles. Danielle is also an avid runner, having competed in races ranging from 5Ks to half marathons. The family are active members of Willow Creek Church, where their values of faith, family, and community continue to guide their lives.

While Erik would likely find this kind of attention uncomfortable — a reflection of his genuine humility — as

this year's Don Gilmore Award recipient, Erik Anderson reminds us that service begins at home and grows outward through every kind act, every volunteer hour, and every commitment to a stronger, more connected community. Our neighborhood is better because of residents like Erik — and the family who walks beside him.
