As you may know, Fred Rogers spent his early adult life as a college student at Rollins College in Winter Park. He never lost his connection to the area or the campus. My daughter, who attended Rollins, met him one afternoon in January while he was walking along.

The book comprises sayings that he collected that were meaningful to him and help direct his life. In his wallet, tucked away next to his neatly folded bills, was the following quote by Bessie Anderson Stanley. "He has achieved success who has lived well, laughed often, and loved much, who has enjoyed the trust of pure women, the respect of intelligent men, and the love of little children, who has filled his niche and accomplished his task, who has left the world better than he found it, whether by an improved poppy, a perfect poem, or a rescued soul, who has never lacked appreciation of Earth's beauty or failed to express it, who has always looked for the best in others and given them the best he had, whose life was an inspiration, whose memory a benediction." Those words are very powerful and were lived out in the life of Fred Rogers.

Fred Rogers' wife writes the introduction to the book, and she describes their first meeting and their life together. They were both very busy people; she says, that in spite of his being human, she always put him on a pedestal. Then she says, "Oh, did I mention what a kind person he was?" Wouldn't it be nice if people could say that about you? Kindness is a

Arbor Day 2024 is all about ensuring our earth and trees upon it are all happy, healthy, and growing to be as strong as they can be. National Arbor Day originated in the mind of a zealous tree lover named Julius Sterling Morton who had a passion for planting all kinds of trees. The first Arbor Day celebration can be traced back to Mr. Morton on April 10, 1872, in Nebraska City, Nebraska. It is estimated that one million trees were planted on this day. Over time, Arbor Day was celebrated throughout the country. It was not until 1970, however, that Arbor Day became recognized nationwide thanks to the efforts of President Richard Nixon.

The City of Winter Springs has been designated "Tree City USA" for many years and was most recently acknowledged for this distinction once again for 2024. The Tree City USA program sponsored by the Arbor Day Foundation has been greening up cities and towns across America since 1976. It is a nationwide movement that provides the framework necessary for communities to manage and expand their public trees. Winter Springs is one of more than 3,400 communities to make the commitment to become a "Tree City USA". Each year, the city celebrates Arbor Day by having a free tree giveaway for our citizens. As in past years, approximately five hundred trees will be delivered to our city residents at the end of the month.

MEET NED VOSKA

One of the many benefits of providing the monthly issues of Tuscawilla Today is meeting with so many talented and interesting residents that make up the fabric of our community. Such was the case for spending an

afternoon with Ned and Thelma Voska on a sunny day back in February. This is the story of an individual who, despite facing monumental challenges early in life, persevered to become a husband, father, grandfather, and successful businessman. Mr. Voska has also maintained an unwavering commitment toward civic engagement and duty his entire life.

Life for Nenad "Ned" Voska began Europe within was known what as the Kingdom of Yugoslavia. With the onset of WW II, young Ned lost both his father and brother to the ravages of the war. To survive, his family, along with other villagers, hid in the mountains before being captured by the Nazis. His remaining family members were split

up from one another and transferred to separate prison camps. Fortunately, the family members were able to reunite after the war and eventually made their way to the United States.

While his early years were fraught with extraordinary hardships, Mr. Voska emphasized the need and desire to focus on the positive experiences that life has to offer. Upon arrival with his mother in Monroeville, Ohio and then moving on to Chicago, Illinois, Ned decided to join the U.S. Air Force. His military service included being assigned to the Strategic Air Command at Offutt Air Force Base near Omaha, Nebraska, as well as serving in Korea and Greenland. As fate would intervene, Ned was also assigned to the Air Rescue Headquarters located in Baldwin Park where he met his future wife at a local dance club. They were married in 1957.

Thelma Voska was originally from the small mining town of Carswell, West Virginia. She worked for a local doctor who assisted her when she applied to attend the Richmond Medical Center in Richmond, Virginia where she earned her nursing degree. Thelma would eventually move to Orlando and become the head nurse at the Orange Memorial Hospital that is now the Orlando Health Orlando Regional Medical Center. Her move south to escape the harsh winter months up north led to meeting Ned Voska at the local dance.

Ned and Thelma moved to Chicago soon after their marriage where Ned worked days and attended school at night to

become an engineer. Thelma was a new mother and continued to work as a nurse. The four years spent up north

> ended, however, when Ned was offered a job at the Kennedy Space Center to work on the Gemini program. Returning to Florida in 1961 with a son and a newborn daughter were the earmarks of a new chapter in their with Thelma lives continuing in the nursing profession and Ned working at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

They would eventually purchase thirty acres in the town of Oviedo behind the Oviedo High School. Their house would become the favorite gathering place for the local kids because of their love for the community,

proximity to the local schools, and the enjoyment of having people visit their home. Of note is that Mr. Voska, like many of our seasoned residents, relates to a time when he would go hunting in what is now our Tuscawilla community. This new life would lead to both Ned and Thelma taking a leap of faith in 1966 by starting their own business.

Ned explained that, with \$300 cash and an old truck, they decided to start Voska Mechanical in a building located on S.R. 434 in the town of North Orlando (Winter Springs). Thelma ran their office for more than twenty years and became one of the first women in Seminole County to hold a mechanical license. Their hard work paid off and their business flourished as the years progressed. This continuous success allowed for the purchase of commercial rental properties to further grow their business holdings.

Along with the success in their business enterprises came the opportunities to become engaged with local organizations





and to serve their communities in various capacities. Ned stated that he was a volunteer for the Seminole County Sheriff's Department for over twenty years back in the 60s and 70s. Remarkably, Mr. Voska had a 29-year perfect attendance record as a member of the Rotary Club of Oviedo and is a past president. Thelma Voska was one of the first two women bestowed with the Paul Harris Fellow award in recognition of her longtime work with the Rotary Club. After selling their Oviedo property and moving to Winter Springs, he served on the Planning and Zoning Advisory Board for six years. Ned also served on the Tuscawilla Georgetown HOA board of directors with Arnie Nussbaum for eight years and the Voskas are supporters of Arnie's Secret Santa Guardian Ad Litem program.

Mr. and Mrs. Voska love the Oviedo/Winter Springs area and have lived in Tuscawilla for the past 22 years. Both their son and daughter live in Central Florida with their respective families and are professionals. Tony recently retired from his career as an engineer at the Cape and their daughter lives and works in the Titusville area for the Brevard County Clerk of Court. When asked about what advice he would share with the younger generation, Ned stated that maintaining a strong work ethic is the key to business success. On the topic of success, Mr. and Mrs. Voska have been married for 67 years. Ned was recently honored as the Seminole County "Veteran of the Month" this past January and will be honored again as the Seminole County "Veteran of the Year" during the April 18th Annual Veterans Appreciation Luncheon. Ned and Thelma are a remarkable couple and we thank them for sharing their insights for completing this article.

TUSCAWILLA WILDLIFE FLORIDA BARRED OWLS

This photograph of a Florida Barred Owl was shared by THOA member, Robert Jaynes. According to the Cornell Lab "All About Birds", Barred Owls are large, stocky owls with rounded heads, no ear tufts, and medium length, rounded tails. Barred Owls are mottled brown and white overall, with dark brown, almost black, eyes. The underparts are mostly marked with vertical brown bars on a white background, while the upper breast is crossed with horizontal brown bars. The wings and tail are barred brown and white. Barred Owls roost quietly in trees during the day, though they can occasionally be heard calling in daylight hours.

At night they hunt small animals, especially rodents, and give an instantly recognizable "Who cooks for you?" call. The southern barred owl or, alternately,

the Florida barred owl is one of three subspecies. The Florida Barred Owl subspecies is found in the southern part of North Carolina, Georgia and all of Florida. This is the smallest of the three subspecies on average according to Wikipedia. Known wing chord lengths can vary from 12.4 to 14.1 inches. The tail length is 8.1 to 9.1 inches and the bill from the cere is 0.91 to 1.10 inches. Males in Florida weigh between 1.501 to 1.764 lb., while females typically weigh between 1.874 and 1.9 lb.

ST. JOHNS RIVER WATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT DESIGNATES APRIL AS WATER CONSERVATION MONTH

Water conservation is at the core of the St. Johns River Water Management District's mission of protecting and ensuring the sustainability of Florida's water supplies. The District's Governing Board recently approved a proclamation designating April 2023 as Water Conservation Month.

April has been formally recognized as Water Conservation Month in Florida for the past 23 years, as April is typically a dry month when water demands are higher due to springtime planting.

"Water Conservation Month is a time that we can focus our efforts on thinking of all the ways we can use water wisely. This year we want to bring attention to leaks and how we can save water by fixing them," said St. Johns River Water Management District Water Conservation Coordinator Deirdre Irwin. "As the weather warms up and we await the end of our dry months, now is a great time to practice water conservation. Even the smallest changes can make a difference."

As the Water Conservation Coordinator, Irwin spends most of her time educating homeowners, landscapers, utilities, and local governments about how to reduce water use. While more than half of all residential water use is outdoors for lawn and landscape irrigation, it is important that homeowners don't forget to check their indoor usage. Minor water leaks account for nearly 1 trillion gallons of water wasted each year in U.S. homes, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The leaks in an average household can add up to 10,000 gallons of water wasted every year. That's the amount of water needed to wash

270 loads of laundry.

Helping residents understand the value of saving water is just one focus of the district. Every day, District staff promote water conservation through water supply planning work, permitting, District cost-share programs, and communication and outreach programs.

in December. What better way to shake off the Post-Tax Day Blues than by shredding some outdated documents!

Did you know that modern shredding trucks are designed to be more efficient in the shredding process than business office crosscut machines? Strict laws and regulations are in place to assure the security and disposal of shredded documents. You will have peace of mind

knowing that this shredding process is secure. Additionally, the shredded material is recycled to make consumer products that include paper towels, tissue, and toilet paper.

APRIL IS WATER CONSERVATION MONTH: HOW CAN I CONSERVE IRRIGATION WATER?

Depending on the size of your yard, the majority of your water use could go to irrigation. Being able to program your irrigation clock is important. New homeowners may never change the settings that were established when they moved in and since many systems irrigate in the late night or early morning hours, it is likely that residents don't know how many days a week their irrigation is running or how long each zone runs. Irrigation timers may not have a back-up battery installed so if the power goes out, the timer will be reset and will need to be reprogrammed. Most irrigation timers have a manual available for download online if the original has been misplaced.

Check to make sure all the sprinkler heads are in proper working order by turning on your irrigation system. Heads can be damaged, lines can be ruptured by roots, etc. and should be repaired immediately. It is advised that the same brand of heads be used throughout the irrigation system for optimal performance in terms of pressure and coverage.

Consider using micro irrigation whenever possible. Micro irrigation consists of sprayers, drip hoses, bubblers, misters, etc. that apply water directly to the root zone of the plant

rather than broadcasting water over a wide area. Micro irrigation is ideal for planted beds, shrubs, and newly planted trees.

Consider reducing the amount of grass in your yard by installing Florida friendly/native plants. Planted beds of this type are attractive, require little to no water once established, and can attract a variety of wildlife. If you go to a home improvement store's garden center, the label will typically tell you the water requirements of the plant. If you would like to have a native garden, you may want to go to a local native plant nursery. A Florida native plant is defined by the Department of Environmental Protection as "a species that occurred in Florida at the time of European contact or 1500s".

Florida natives are adapted to the conditions in Florida and are less likely to require irrigation, pesticides, and fertilizers. You could also consider replacing your current grass with a more drought tolerant species such as Bahia. Species that are drought tolerant will tend to look healthier during periods of drought with less irrigation.



If you observe a resident or business watering on an incorrect day, watering between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., a broken irrigation line or sprinkler head, or other violations of the current watering restrictions, please contact Winter Springs Utility Billing at 407-327-5996 or ubcs@winterspringsfl.org.

WINTER SPRINGS, Fla. --The Winter Springs Police Department is proud to announce it has received accreditation from the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (CFA).

Following a rigorous, top-to-bottom review of agency policy and operations by a team of law enforcement practitioners from around Florida, the Winter Springs Police Department was recommended for re-accreditation by the board.

The final report was presented to the Accreditation Commission at its annual meeting in St. Augustine February 22, 2024.
