A second exemption period will begin Saturday, August 24th and extend through Friday, September 6th.

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

INDIAN TRAILS MIDDLE SCHOOL SCIENCE TEACHER, VITA HOLGUIN, NAMED SCPS "TEACHER OF THE YEAR"

Seminole County Public Schools has announced that Vita Holguin, a dedicated middle school science teacher at Indian Trails Middle School, is the esteemed Teacher of the Year for her unwavering commitment to academic excellence and student success. The announcement described Mrs. Holguin as having a deep passion for fostering a love of science and instilling curiosity in her students while making learning engaging and fun. Mrs. Holguin has become a pillar within her campus educational community, inspiring both her colleagues and students alike.

"Vita Holguin embodies the spirit of excellence that we strive for in Seminole County Public Schools," according to Superintendent Serita Beamon. "Her innovative teaching methods, genuine care for her students, and relentless pursuit of academic excellence make her a truly deserving recipient of this prestigious award." Mrs. Holguin's classroom has been described as a hub of creativity and exploration, where students are encouraged to question, experiment, and learn through hands-on activities. Her dynamic teaching style promotes critical thinking skills and empowers her students to become lifelong learners.

During an interview with Mrs. Holguin at Indian Trails Middle School, her passion for teaching was confirmed. She clearly represents the type of teacher that every parent would want for their children. Good teachers frequently explain that their desire to work in this challenging profession is a "calling" from the heart and Vita Holguin is no exception. In fact, Vita shared that she had considered becoming a doctor before deciding on a career in education and explained that the teaching profession has proven to be much more rewarding. She is absolutely within her comfort zone when working with middle school age children, arguably the most interesting of all grade levels.

Vita Holguin is a seasoned professional with experience in both private and public-school settings. She began her career at Lockhart Middle School in Orange County as a science teacher. Her next teaching experience was working with children with learning disabilities at Pace Brantley Preparatory School in Longwood where she enjoyed her role as their high school science teacher and participated in numerous educational field trip excursions to a variety of different countries. Vita remained at Pace Brantley for 14 years before taking time off for her most significant role: motherhood.

The next teaching assignment was a science position with Proximity Learning, Inc. This company utilizes live-streaming virtual classroom settings that Vita enjoyed. Her experience with virtual instruction proved to be beneficial

when she accepted her current position at Indian Trails Middle School during the pandemic. Her experience with virtual learning was beneficial at a time when schools were required to utilize this method of instructional delivery.

When asked how being named Seminole County Public Schools "Teacher of the Year" has impacted her professional and personal life, Mrs. Holguin paused to reflect upon her response. She then focused upon her teaching style and skills. Vita shared that she has become more aware of her teaching style and techniques because she knows that others are observing her. She stressed that the title has made her more aware of everything she does but wants to continue being "me" while meeting the expectations that others have for an SCPS Teacher of the Year. Mrs. Holguin shared a recent example for incorporating black light activities to enhance a lab experiment that focused on the layers of the atmosphere and a semester exam review. This included "glowing" hats for all the students. Vita went on to explain: "I want to be the teacher that I always wished I had (when growing up)."

On a personal level, Mr. Holguin and their 7-year-old son have been incredibly supportive. They were present during the announcement of her being named Middle School "Teacher of the Year" and once again during the surprise announcement of Vita being named as SCPS "Teacher of the Year." Vita related that her son is too young to understand the importance of his mother's accomplishments but did have fun while attending a Magic Basketball Game where Vita was recognized along with teachers from other school districts. Vita's parents were elated with joy and her father shares her photo from the FOX News interview with everyone he encounters.


Regarding the school culture at Indian Trails Middle School, Mrs. Holguin praised the PTSA for supporting the teachers and students. The school administrators have been working extremely hard to instill a collaborative environment that has enhanced student behavior expectations, promoted professional development, and infused several interventions that allow time for teachers to establish a positive, interpersonal rapport with their students. Vita explained that "Circle Time," for example, has been beneficial for promoting dialogue between teachers and students on a variety of different topics. The teachers are working together to make sure that the students are learning to become good citizens. All these interventions help to create a positive learning environment at the school.

The interview with Vita Holguin was a most rewarding experience. She is genuinely devoted to her profession



















and demonstrates an infectious energy level that translates to making the classroom learning experience fun and interesting. Vita shared that she frequently becomes animated while presenting lessons. These behaviors include singing, dancing, and exaggerated body movements that keep the students focused while making learning a most enjoyable experience. She emphasized that teaching is fun and never boring! Vita summed it up by stating "Teaching is such a rewarding field because you become a part of other people's lives forever."

As Teacher of the Year, Mrs. Holguin will serve as an ambassador for Seminole County Public Schools, representing the district at various events and conferences throughout the year. She is currently in contention for being named the State of Florida "Teacher of the Year" and she is waiting for the list of finalists to be announced sometime later this month. The winner at the state level will be announced in July. Congratulations to Vita Holguin and please know that you are appreciated for all your hard work in making learning fun and impactful for the children in our community.

ENTRANCE FOUNTAIN UPDATE!

The challenges for making the structural repairs to the south side fountain have led to delays in the rebuilding of the lower basin. Soil core samples were taken at both the north and south fountain sites to determine the stability of both monuments and discern the necessary repairs for stabilizing the land around the fixtures. The good news is that the north fountain is stable and in good condition. The bad news is that the soil underneath the lower basin for the south fountain is not stable and this has led to a concrete structural failure.

The repairs needed require engineering designs that include pumping stabilizing concrete reinforcement below the old existing basin structure. Finding and hiring a reputable engineering company willing to design the necessary structural interventions proved to be time consuming. Geotechnical engineering designs for these types of problems are specialized and only a limited number of firms are interested in bidding on these types of projects. Of note is that stabilizing the ground underneath the fountain basin and using the old structure as a foundation for constructing the new lower basin is significantly more cost effective than full demolition and replacement.

To date, the engineering design work has been completed. The construction bidding process will begin within the next couple of weeks and must remain advertised for a period of 30 days. Once the contract has been awarded, construction work to make the necessary repairs should begin sometime after June 17th with a completion date goal set for the end of July or beginning of August. This project has proven to be a frustrating and complex challenge, but progress is being made based upon using reliable methods for identifying the problems, designing appropriate structural repairs, and keeping costs as low as possible.



BALD EAGLES CONTINUE TO CALL TUSCAWILLA "HOME"

THOA member, Linda Rogers, shared her pictures of a pair of Bald Eagles that visit a pond near her house daily. According to Animal Triangle, eagles are carnivorous and eat a wide range of foods that include fish (their favorite), crab, other birds, amphibians, and reptiles like snakes. Bald Eagles can fly at a normal speed of 30 mph with a diving

speed of 100 mph. They are monogamous and mate for life. However, either the male or female finds a new partner if their old partner undergoes death, accident or sometimes does not return to their nest. Interestingly, eagles kept in captivity tend to live longer than those in the wild. As a result, some eagles can live as long as 70 years.



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WHAT IS CINCO DE MAYO?

Cinco de Mayo has long been misunderstood by many Americans, partly because it's easy to say and American classrooms often include little celebrating the history of people of color.

Cinco de Mayo marks Mexico's against-all-odds victory against invading French troops in 1862.

But to some Americans, it's simply Cinco de Drinko, an excuse to party with little to no understanding of what the Mexican holiday celebrates. Many who think they know what Cinco de Mayo is about wrongly assume it's Mexico's Independence Day. (It's not.)

"Everyone thinks that it's just party time, it's Corona time," said Mario García, a Chicanx historian from the University of California at Santa Barbara.

"It's OK for people to go out and have a good time on a holiday like Cinco de Mayo -- at least they have some sense that it's some kind of a Mexican holiday," García said. "But we should go beyond that. We should have Cinco de Mayo events that go beyond partying and drinking, where we call attention to what the history is."

So, what does Cinco de Mayo celebrate?

Mexican Independence Day, or Día de la Independencia, came on Sept. 16, 1810, when the country broke free of Spanish rule.

Cinco de Mayo came more than 50 years later when French Emperor Napoleon III wanted to claim Mexico for himself.

The French sent troops to force Mexico's President Benito Juárez and the government out of Veracruz. On May 5, 1862, in a small town in east-central Mexico called <u>Puebla, 2,000 Mexican soldiers faced 6,000 French troops</u> at daybreak. Incredibly, Mexico claimed victory by the evening, and Juárez declared May 5th a national holiday.

So why are so many Americans still confused?

Part of the confusion among many Americans about what Cinco de Mayo celebrates is likely because it's much catchier-sounding and easier for English speakers to say than the day of Mexico's independence (Diez y seis de Septiembre), García said.

But also, a huge problem is that not enough American classrooms teach the importance of Chicanx history and its people's contributions to the U.S.

"When you study the history of Chicanos and Latinos, of course, they've been history makers," García said. "They've been involved in all aspects of American history, not to mention the wars ... In World War II alone, almost half a million Latinos – mostly Mexican Americans – fought in the war. And they won a disproportionate number of congressional Medals of Honor."

The battle also played a role in the American Civil War. With the French defeated and leaving North America, the Confederacy wasn't able to use them as an ally to win the war.

Why is Cinco de Mayo more popular in the U.S. than Mexico?

While there are Cinco De Mayo celebrations throughout Mexico, notably in the city of Puebla, the event doesn't compare to the celebrations of Día de la Independencia, García said.

Meanwhile in the U.S., Cinco de Mayo has become an annual celebration of Mexican American culture.

The celebration of Cinco de Mayo began as a form of resistance to the effects of the Mexican American War in the late 19th century. The holiday gained popularity during the <u>Chicano Movement</u> of the 1960s and 1970s.
