


Many seniors decide to travel the road to college and a career. But the decision to enter college is only the first of many important ones yet to come.

Numerous aspects, both positive and negative, must be considered when choosing a college. For example, students must consider the cost, size, curriculum and distance from home.


Choosing the right college is certainly no easy task, nor is it one to be taken lightly. Seniors must consider many things before deciding what their own "life after high school" will be like.














One of the very first steps a senior had to take toward making college plans was usually that of taking the necessary battery of tests, mainly the PSAT/NMSQT, ACT and SAT.

Most students took the PSAT/NMSQT, which served two purposes, in their junior year. This test was generally accepted by most Minnesota colleges for admission and was also used to determine the National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists.

Many seniors also took either the ACT or the SAT, with their scores sent to three different colleges. Many scholarships required that a student take one or both of these tests.

Another facet to the ACT and SAT was that they both featured a student questionnaire, which asked questions about the student's career plans and general interests as well as his wishes pertaining to college size, cost and location.


One thing that made Tammy's job unique was the research work on pseudo-rabies that she and another assistant did for Dr. Howard Jenkin, a professor at the institute.

Basically what Tammy did was to run experiments by infecting cells with different viruses and then running tests on them.

When the project was finished, Dr. Jenkin wrote a paper on it, but Tammy was the one who presented it at a Mayo Clinic conference, where she turned out to be the only high school student attending, much less presenting a research paper.


Tammy also had the honor of having this paper, for which she did the research, published in a microbiology journal.





High school . . . many memories


