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

In a few short weeks America and the world will recall the tragic martyrdom of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., acknowledging the 50th year of his martyrdom which occurred on Thursday, evening of April 4, 1968 in Memphis, TN.

NewCORE with its many partners and collaborators is leading 80 days of MLK Legacy Conversations amongst Philadelphia congregations, neighborhoods and communities to encourage meaningful Reflection, Education and Appreciation toward valuing the life and ministry of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

These Legacy Conversations consider the historic views and perspectives of Dr. King in matters of continuing social and public significance alongside contemporary resolve to understand and address still compelling issues as injustice, poverty, moral erosion, economic and social disparity, violence and abuse, etc. The Legacy Conversations:80/80, promote new and stimulating dinner table, neighborhood, congregational, class room, board room, coffee house, tavern and contextualized conversations in the personal and social spaces enjoyed by Philadelphians and other stakeholders.

Peculiarly, many contemporary business, civic, political and even faith leaders have reduced the significance of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., to that of brief volunteerism as a custodian or janitor at an urban location in which they absolve themselves of the ideals and virtues that govern the life of Dr. King. While cleanliness is touted as next to godliness; it must never supplant our resolve to do justly, love mercy and humbly walk before God.

Dr. King recognized the moral necessity to speak truth to power on behalf of the voiceless, marginalized and oppressed. He lovingly and ethically practiced non-violent direct action against racism, materialism and militarism.

Now, 50 years since Dr. King's martyrdom, what should we be doing to promote and sustain the beloved community? To whom do you converse with on the matters that matter.
