The Belle Vernon Area Rotary Club has been an active supporter of the Youghiogheny River Trail section of the Great American Passage almost from its inception.

This support is ongoing and manifests itself in a variety of ways from volunteering for the Over The Hill Gang maintenance projects, trail events and club-sponsored projects.

Most visible of these projects are the shelter at Smithton Beach and restoration of the rail car at the West Newton Trail Office, which was undertaken with the help of many people, several busineses and the West Newton Rotary Club.

Other club-sponsored projects are markers designating points of interest along the YRT and a special marker noting the 1907 Darr Mine Disaster, in which 239 men and boys were killed in an explosion at the Van Meter mine.

The enthusiasm of club members is also exemplified by their recreational use of the trail with family and friends.




Renovation of the Pittsburgh & Lake Erie combination baggage and passenger car began in 2015.













