- 1. Call to order at 6:10 pm by Gail Rognerud, President.
- 2. Introduction of Board Members and CBAB Members
- 3. Approve minutes from 2018 Annual Meeting. Motion by Patti Ballan; 2nd by Bob Marquardt. Motion carried.
- 4. Nomination and election of new Board Members: The following nominees are presented for election to the Citizens for Backus/AB Board of Directors for a three year term: Incumbents: Patti Ballan, Julie Bartkowski, Bob Marquardt, Diane Maxey, Gail Rognerud. Motion by Sherrie Lessard to elect Directors as presented, 2nd by Dianne Maxey. Motion carried.
- 5. Review/discussion of Director/Treasurer/Committee reports:
- a) Executive Director: Ward Merrill: Page 9 discusses the steps we have taken so far on the Alexander Baker project. In the years I have been here, this is the best plan we've had to bring Alexander Baker building back to life. This plan involves working in a partnership with Kootasca. AB was constructed in 1912, finished in 1914 and is still standing. The boiler system in the basement of that building is still being used today, and is expected to work for another 20 years. The Alexander Baker project began in 2017 when Backus and Kootasca passed a resolution to work on the development of the building. A county wide housing study was completed, after funding was raised in the community by stakeholders. The study was completed in December 2018 and offers specific recommendations to meet housing needs in the area. It recommends that the AB building project should be pursued and would help meet the housing needs in the area. The American Institute of Architects "Search for Shelter Design Carrette" at the University of MN provided a series of suggestions and potential plans for this project. A conditions assessment is being completed by Kass Wilson Architecture to photograph and document building features. Requests for proposals were sent to developers, with a deadline date in March 2019. We appreciate the consistent support of members, donors and sponsors because that is what has made all of this possible.

Annual Meeting Minutes (continued)

Question from members: Are you going to run a financial feasibility study? Ward: Once we find a good developer, they can help connect to funding. Other methods of funding are being explored. Historic tax credits can comprise a huge share of funding for projects like this, possible up to 40%.

Is there any sense of how the building has fared over the years of disuse? Ward: Assessments have found that the building is in good shape: the integrity has held up. There was water damage from when the roof was leaking, but that has been repaired and it appears there is no structural damage from the water. The roof is in good shape as it was replaced in 2008.

- b) Finance/Treasurer: Patti Ballan: on page 10, there is a list of grants received in 2018. Ward, Hoa, Beth and others have worked superbly to bring in extra dollars to fund programming.
- c) Building Use/Volunteer Numbers: The building is currently full, there is no open rental space at this moment.
 - d) Program & Events Summary: Report as submitted.
 - e) Operations Committee: Report as submitted.
 - f) Building & Grounds Committee: Report as submitted.
- g) Arts & Programming, Fundraising: Diane Maxey: Please bring any ideas for fundraising if you have any thoughts or suggestions.
- h) Event Coordinator: Robin Bjorkquist: Thank you for the opportunity to serve here and I look forward to many more years. Report as submitted.
- i) Borealis Bards: Beth Lowthian: Due to continued community and member support that has led to program growth, the Bards developed a Program Committee in November 2018. We did 4 productions in 2018 and have 3 productions planned for 2019. Junior Bards will present their 3rd annual production on March 22-24, 2019. The 5th annual Room to Act will be Saturday April 27, 2019. Ward: Beth does a marvelous job writing grants to support the Bards.
- j) Ruby's Pantry: Report as submitted. Volunteers are needed if you are looking for volunteer opportunities. Lee Grim: people and funding are needed to continue helping people through Ruby's Pantry.
- k) Community Cafe: Report as submitted.
- I) Summer Food Service Program: This program focuses on feeding children but also serves adults. Member input: more advertising is needed for this to communicate that all children in the community are welcome.
- m) Rainy River Community College Food Pantry: Robin Bjorkquist: Thank you to Backus for being the fiscal agent for this project. One of the major stresses of college life is food insecurity. The Food Pantry is located on campus and consists of food obtained from Ruby's Pantry and purchased from Second Harvest and local grocery stores.
- n) Membership: Membership is very important to Backus and we are grateful to all of our members. Membership contribution in 2018 was increased by \$6,000 from 2017.
- o) Contributions & Donations: Report as submitted.

Bylaws

Citizens for Backus/AB Bylaws sections

Article IV, Section 4.1 Board Role, Size and Compensation:

The Board is responsible for overall policy and direction of Citizens for Backus/AB, Inc. The Board shall have up to 15 and not fewer than 11 members. No Director may receive compensation for his or her service as Director. However, nothing contained shall be construed to preclude any Director from serving the corporation in any other capacity, or receiving reasonable compensation therefore.

Article IV, Section 4.3 Board Elections:

Election of new directors or re-election of current directors to a second or third term will occur as the first item of business at the annual meeting of the corporation. Directors will be nominated by a majority vote of the current Board of Directors. Directors may also be nominated from the floor at the annual meeting.

Article IV, Section 4.5 **Terms:**

All Board members shall serve three-year term, and are eligible for re-election. The initial Board of the corporation will have staggering numbers of terms to prevent an entire turnover of the board at one time.

Executive Director's Report

Writing an "end of the year" report conjures up some mixed feelings prompting me to reflect on all the things that occurred in 2019; grants awarded; great performances; community events; sad events and the passing of time. Twelve years have passed since I became director in February 2008 with those years passing all too quickly. In that time Backus has come a long way. From an organization functioning on a "survival" basis to one on a stable financial footing; experiencing wide community support; staffed by passionate dedicated employees; directed by an engaged and experienced board, and supported by hundreds of members, donors and volunteers. Our success is due to all those factors and individuals – many of whom are here this evening.

Highlights of 2019 included:

- A successful Performing Arts Series organized by our Arts & Programming Committee with one performance by comic juggler, Tuey Wilson, literally "setting the stage on fire"
- An amazing Vietnamese "Tet Dinner" organized by Hoa Sobczynski's talented family
- A grant award of \$184,130 from the Otto Bremer Trust for general operating support, county-wide 4-H and predevelopment costs for the AB Affordable Housing Project
- Gavin Wilson's Eagle Scout "Court of Honor" recognizing his Scouting accomplishments and his well done Auditorium door refinishing project
- Darcie Schulz's May Dance Recitals that filled the Auditorium to "overflowing" capacity with audiences of 981, 895 and 1,089 attending
- U.S.D.A's grant award of \$32,100 funding 55% of almost \$60,000 of Backus improvement projects
- In June a pledge of \$100,000 from a local family, over three years to start an Endowment Fund which has already grown to over \$34,000 with a goal of \$1 million
- The wedding reception for Tyler & Grace Borgen in September was cause to celebrate not only a marriage but also Tyler's long history of volunteer service to Backus
- Tuey juggles fire at the Falls High School as part of the outreach he did while visiting our community for his performance as part of the Backus Performing Arts Season
- On October 17 the Backus Kitchen served its 100,000th free meal during our Community Café. The total included meals from our Summer Food Service Program which began in 2010 and Community Café which started in December 2012
- Our Annual Halloween "Treat Street" drew a record attendance of 1,000 children and parents with 23 businesses and organizations participating.

Executive Director's Report (continued)

- November witnessed the passing of a dear friend and Backus supporter Gordy Ettestad who
 was instrumental in founding Citizens for Backus/AB; "father" of the Endowment Fund; faithful
 attendee of Backus events and Annual Meeting, and with wife Pat, were generous financial
 supporters of Backus
- By December, after over two years of meetings, planning, research, studies, capacity building and hard work, the Backus and KOOTASCA Community Action Boards passed final resolutions to move forward with the adaptive reuse of the historic Alexander Baker School as affordable housing
- December concluded with, what we hope, will be a successful grant application to the Otto Bremer Trust for \$134,200 in operating support.

2020 will begin the 19th year of Citizens for Backus/AB. The year is filled with challenge, hope, excitement and anticipation as we work to fulfill our mission and to bring the AB School back to life as much needed housing in our community.

Backus Endowment Fund



Gordy Ettestad was a an original Backus supporter and his financial knowledge was critical in the beginning of Citizens for Backus/AB.

In November 2008 Gordy Ettestad laid the foundation for an endowment fund for Backus. With three major capital improvement projects on our agenda (roof replacement, kitchen/dining room and third floor renovation), the Backus Fund lay inactive until 2019.

In June, Ivan and Marcia Stewart offered a generous gift of \$100,000 to Backus in hope their gift would generate additional funding. The gift will be received over a three year period beginning in 2019. Their initial contribution of \$33,333.33 forms the basis for the Backus Endowment Fund. On December 12, 2019 the Backus Board of Directors approved a resolution revising the fund and establishing it as a new article of the By-laws. The Board has set an initial goal of reaching \$1 million within five years.

The Fund is "established to provide effective and responsible stewardship of special gifts and to ensure the expansion of community work in International Falls and the surrounding area." The fund "can accept gifts and bequests in wills, charitable trusts, gift annuities, assignments of life insurance, and transfer of property (cash, stock, bonds, real estate, etc.)."

In honor of Gordy Ettestad's belief in the Fund, Pat Ettestad donated \$1,030 in memorial gifts to the fund which now totals \$34,363.33. We welcome your participation in this effort to ensure the continuation and expansion of the work of our Backus Community Center.





Operations Committee

- **Stage Curtain improvements**—This project has some final items to complete. Most of the improvements have been completed.
- **Signage update**—New Bathroom signage and mounting brackets are installed. Thank you Dan Benedix for his help with this project.
- **Art Gallery Lighting**—Kantor proposal for Art Gallery lighting- price quote for track lighting and installation is an amount of \$8,276.00. Ward & Patti will look into available grants that would be appropriate for funding.
- **Gym Floor Refinish**—A group of volunteers contributed hours of labor during the Christmas break to clean and resurface the gym floor once again.
- **Room 101**—Work was completed by Jed Becker to create two new rental offices, one which is rented to Thrivent Financial, the other available to rent.
- Backus Property ID—On going project to ID and value all items.
- **LED lighting in Basement**—Received USDA grant funds to replace basement lighting. Kantor to install.
- **KCC-TV**—Backus and KCC-TV have merged. KCC-TV is now a Backus program and Darcy Sullivan is the main employee for KCC-TV.
- **Trimble GPS Antenna**—Installed on roof of Backus. Sends GPS signals and Backus receives \$100/month rental fee.
- USDA Grant—Grant provided 55% of project costs and Backus provided 45%. We will complete basement lighting replacement, remove and replace tile in East Hallway, Locker room drain repair, purchased new floor scrubbing machine, boiler condensate tank replacement, replace fuel lines to Boiler. Completion of jobs is required by July 2020.



- Adaptive Reuse of AB as Affordable Housing Project—Backus and Kootasca have partnered for the housing project of AB. Three Rivers Community Action, represented by Chris Flood has served as our consultant. Conditions Assessment has been completed & we have final copy.
- Endowment Legacy Fund—Started an Endowment Fund with funds received as a donation and memorial funds. Brochures will be available soon. Endowment Committee has been formed. Revisions were made to the 2008 draft originally prepared by Gordy Ettestad.
- **Succession Planning**—Committee will start forming a plan for future Executive Director replacement. Preparations, review of job description, contact resources for search process.

Building and Grounds Committee

The boilers have been attended to two times a day. Number one takes over every morning and number two takes over every evening. The evening shift is set so that if there is a failure of one boiler the other will take over until morning. During these two daily inspections all of the special air compressors, air lines, condensate tanks and lines are checked and both boilers are blown down with a top blow down in order to check the cut off floats.

The chemicals are checked weekly, usually Friday at 8 am. At this time all of the air compressors, air lines, condensate tanks and lines are also rechecked.

John bought a new door closer for the east door and Jerry put it in service.

The boiler class met on Monday evenings at 7:30 pm in The Dungeon from January until May.

John received permission from Hoa to replace the CFL bulbs on the stage as they were getting old and becoming dimmer. He bought 140 LED dimmable bulbs for use on the stage and they were put in by two volunteers from Darcie's Dance Studio; Mark Gierszewski and his helper. They are a big improvement over the CFLs as they are brighter and they can be dimmed and they were at a reasonable price.

The boilers were taken apart as was the refractory. All was inspected by our crew and was repaired as needed. The boiler inspector passed both boilers and air compressor

Twenty five valves were installed last summer and were put in operation last fall

The boilers were up, running and put on line on September 23rd. It took several days to get the new valves to operate without any leaks. They have been operating flawlessly since then. Here's what the group has done to get the boiler up and running:

- A. Cleaned and refurbished most of the radiator steam top pneumatic valves in Backus.
- B. Cleaned, tested and replaced all of the thermostatic steam traps in Backus.
- C. Cleaned and refurbished most of the bucket steam traps in Backus.
- D. Replaced and are still testing a new thermostat in the dining room.
- E. The entire boiler system is functioning well.
- F. All of the newly installed valves have been tested under maximum pressure, adjusted and are working at this time.
- G. Took down weighted steam unit in fan room and plugged open holes

We sanded, scrubbed and refinished the gym over the Holidays. Jerry sanded and scrubbed the floors on the 23rd and 24th. John Faith organized a second crew on December 26th as the products were mistakenly sent to the Senior High School and we had to track them down and go get them. The refinishing crew was: John, Ward, Jeremy Faith, Kaden and Kylan Bjorkquist, Mark Thorpe and Harry Batdorf. We then sealed off the gym from the general public until January 2nd.

A special thanks should go out to Harry Batdorf for spending 18 hours physically digging out all of the excess sand and clay from the hole in the boys locker room in preparation for a large storage tank that will be placed by Shannon's to help catch the overflow drainage water until it can be sent to the storm sewer.

Event Coordinator Report

Jaime Sjoblom worked as Event Coordinator from November 2018 to September 2019. Kathryn O'Connor worked as Event Coordinator from October 2019 to January 2020.

The Event Coordinator has been responsible for catering and rental services. They work with clients from start to finish on all types of events including baby showers, wedding receptions, private birthday parties, meetings, workshops, luncheons and all other usage of our building. They are responsible for preparing contracts for client rentals.

Event Coordinators recruit volunteers for the front office, Summer Food Service Program, Summer Arts, Community Café, cash bar and concessions, performances and all other events where volunteers are needed to work. They record volunteer hours for each event so at the end of the year data can be shared with Backus stockholders.

The Event Coordinator plans, stocks and manages both the cash bar and the concession stand that are operated during junior high basketball games, shows and performances. They electronically keep track of inventory for financial purposes and recordkeeping.

Backus Event Coordinators work each event, overseeing the event to ensure a positive experience for all—artists, guests and volunteers.

KCC-TV: Koochiching County Community Television

In December 2019 the Backus Board of Directors voted to assume ownership and management of Koochiching County Community Television, KCC-TV.

In 2012 a local group formed KCC-TV, taking over the television feed that had been airing from Rainy River Community College.



Over the past seven years, KCC-TV purchased digital broadcasting equipment and upgraded camera equipment. Hiring staff allowed the station to better serve the community by consistently recording government meetings and local events.

Current Program Director, Darcy Sullivan, at left, has spent the past two years recording and programming what is seen on Midco cable channel 7.

Recent improvements include live streaming of Bronco sporting events.

Backus is excited to announce this acquisition as it allows Citizens for Backus/AB to be a more integral part of International Falls and the surrounding communities.

Arts, Programming, Fundraising, Bards Committee

The Arts & Programming Committee consisted of Co-Chairs Beth Lowthian, Diane Maxey, Tracy Lunser and committee members Kay Arnold, Julie Bartkowski, Carol Bryant-Bushinger, Ariana Daniel, Donna Frederickson, Georgia Growette, Sherrie Lessard, Joyce Rasmussen, Gail Rognerud.

Business discussed throughout the year included the following:

- An Arts Education Program featuring classes on costume design, lighting design for theatre, theatre makeup techniques, introduction to puppeteering, children's theatre camp during summer art week and an introduction to play writing by playwright Forrest Musselman was held in 2019.
- There was much discussion and concern throughout the year regarding the Borealis Bards availability to space to build scenes for future plays. Backus assured the Bards that accommodations would be made to be sure they have a scene shop for the fall 2019 production.
- The Backus Performing Arts Season kicked off Friday, August 30 with a performance by a group of artists who attended a week-long retreat at Mallard Island. Performers included Kevin Kling and Dan Chouinard as well as others.
- The TET Vietnamese New Year Dinner was another huge success with 145 guests.
- In March the City of International Falls held a town hall meeting to discuss the Park and Rec
 Department. The city council chambers were full of people to discuss the pros and cons of
 facilities and programs in town, focusing on sports, but including anything recreational. Julie
 Bartkowski reported back to Backus administration. Backus provides gym space for the junior
 high rec basketball program at no charge to anyone. There was much discussion about the
 need for community-wide calendar.
- Andrea Gohl and Georgia Growette worked all year to inventory and display art that is currently
 in Backus storage areas. Jerry and Jean Hilfer brought over a collection years ago, which was
 intended for display, then was to be returned to them. It has been an on-going process to catalog and discuss what should happen with all the art pieces in the building. Sale of Mary Graves
 art collection continued throughout the year.
- Ariana Daniel coordinated another successful Summer Art Week June 17 through 21 with 67 students participating in classes.
- Tracy Lunser and Beth Lowthian stepped down as co-chairs with Tracy remaining on the committee, Beth resigned from the Backus Board. Julie Bartkowski and Sherrie Lessard were removed due to other committee commitments, Carol Bryant-Bushinger resigned from the Backus Board and Joyce Rassmussen has been inactive. New members welcomed in November were Carol Bass, Carol Belanger, Lynnea Dahlgren, Anne Nordstrom and Dori Pullar.
- Ward would like to see decorative covers for the basketball hoops. Discussion continued throughout the year on how we could make the gym space look less institutional for major events.
- Fundraising events were discussed throughout the year, including the return of the Ethnic Food Festival, a formal dinner with art auction, donut-making machine at games and events (didn't work out well, not enough people purchased), as well as other various ideas.

Artists and performers are continually researched and discussed for future performance seasons.

Borealis Bards

Borealis Bards finished its 6th year of creating performances in International Falls that bring together people in our community. We could not do the community-building work we do without the support of the Backus Community Center staff and resources.

In January we continued the tradition of weekly recreational script reading meetings for adults. This is a program we have done since our founding. It typically attracts 6 to 12 people a week to read scripts, long and short, simply for the enjoyment of hearing them read aloud.

The Junior Bards spent January through March preparing a night of two One Act plays. The cast and crew for these were all under age 18 except for the directors. This production involved over 35 children, and attracted an audience of over 600 attendees at the three performances.

In April, the adults in the Borealis Bards performed in our annual Room to Act production. This dinner theater experience involved more than 20 people to produce shows on three stages during the evening.

In Spring, we also committed to producing our Fall production. Doug Skrief and Doug Lowthian codirected The Little Prince. Work began in early summer to design sets, costumes, special effects, and plan the overall tone of the show. One exciting aspect of this show was the casting of newcomer, 13-year-old Mitchell Erickson, as the Prince, opposite veteran actor, Tim Weaver, as the Aviator. The intergenerational interplay and mentorship that was evident throughout this production exemplified one of the main goals of the Borealis Bards. The show was presented in October with rave reviews from the attending audience. The Falls Journal also attended many rehearsals to document the making of the show.

This year also saw the presentation of several skill-building workshops. Local talent, Anne Holen and Rick Holen, presented separate workshops on stage make-up and costuming. Early fall brought playwright, Forrest Musselman, to Backus for a 2-day play writing workshop. Eleven people, both adults and youth, attended this workshop. All found it very helpful. Some mentioned that understanding how a play is written will help them become a better actor. Others used it as an opportunity to jump start their own writing practice, with aims of eventually producing a script. Discussion was held about one day having a performance based on all local original scripts. Once again, as the participants ranged in age from 15 to, well above 15 (!), the intergenerational aspect of the Bards was in full view.

The Borealis Bards spent the year building its organizational structure as well. While much work fell on one or two people, the Bards now operate a Program Committee, which is a sub-committee of the Backus Arts, Programming, Fundraising, Bards Committee. We have been meeting regularly and have made decisions regarding the 2020 productions.

March will see a Junior Bards production of Pinocchio, directed by David Griffith, who has been in many Bards productions. A decision was made to forego the annual Room to Act program as there was a downturn in the number of adult actors responding. However, a director and title was chosen for the Fall 2020 production which will be Charlotte's Web, directed by Keri Norton.

The Alexander Baker School

Recently two gentlemen stopped in the office and inquired about the AB Project or the "apartments" and "how they're coming." I had interesting conversations with both. They were amazed at how much work has been accomplished to date in spite of the fact of haveing no funding in hand and haven't begun any construction.

A 2019 Study by the U of M Extension Service on "The Adaptive Reuse of Historic Buildings in Rural Minnesota" focused on 12 projects in rural Minnesota and why they were successful. The report also acknowledged that adaptive reuse projects are especially challenging in rural Minnesota. Barriers include: complicated funding structures, the lack of local expertise in historic preservation and planning processes that must address strict standards for adaptive reuse. The current effort for the reuse of the Alexander Baker School is our third attempt and one that we feel has the best chance for success. The process has been long, difficult, but highly rewarding. Our partnership with KOOTASCA Community Action and the MN Housing Partnership significantly increase our opportunity to succeed. Our milestones to success include:

2017:


• Partnering with KOOTASCA and MN Housing Partnership (MHP) to form the Koochiching County Housing Collaborative – monthly meetings of stakeholders to explore housing issues and seek solutions. The need for a current "Housing Study" becomes apparent.

2018:

- Stakeholders raise \$25,000 and with a \$10,000 grant from MHP commission a county-wide housing study.
- MHP provides further training and capacity building assistance
- Backus/KOOTASCA form an AB Core Team to plan development

2019:

- In January Community Partners Research presents the Housing Study to the public. The study reveals a dire need for all types of housing and endorses the AB Adaptive Reuse Project.
- Backus is awarded a \$54,130
 Otto Bremer Trust grant for predevelopment costs



Adaptive Reuse Project 2019

- The AB Project is selected to participate in an AIA "Search for Shelter Design Charrette at the University of MN.
- Kaas Wilson Architects begin work on a Condition Assessment of the AB School funded by a \$10,000 grant from the MN Historical Society and a \$5,000 grant from Henry & Virginia Sweatt
- Bi-weekly conference calls with MHP on AB Project (KOOTASCA/Backus)
- RFPs are sent to twenty prospective developers. Follow-up calls are made
- · County stakeholders continue to meet
- A proposal is received from one developer
- Two developers conduct site visits to AB: Three Rivers Community Action and Commonwealth Development
- Three Rivers is contracted to provide consulting and training services.
- A "Feasibility Study" is completed concluding the project can be successful
- · A "Market Demand Analysis" is completed indicated sufficient demand for AB housing
- Backus and KOOTASCA Boards give final approval to the AB Project
- KOOTASCA agrees to serve as "developer" of the project

2020:

- MN Historical Society approves the "Condition Assessment" by Kaas Wilson Architects
- Community Housing Development Corporation (CDHC) agrees to serve as "co-developer" with KOOTASCA
- · Tentative agreement reached with Urban Works Architects to serve as project architect
- Tentative agreement with Hess Roise to serve as Historic Consultants
- Preparation of MN Housing Application for Low Income Housing Tax Credits begins
- June: Application to MN Housing (formerly MHFA) for Low Income Housing Tax Credits
- November: Notification by MH Housing of LIHTC project awards. (Comprises 70-80% of funding for the project. 20-30% from State/Federal Historic Tax Credits)

Ruby's "Pop-Up" Pantry

If you get hungry or put food on the table – you qualify for Ruby's Pop-Up Pantry

The idea for Ruby's Pantry was first presented to the Community Café Steering Committee during the winter of 2015 by Mary DeNeffe who was driving clients 70 miles to Cook, MN to participate in their Ruby's Pantry. Mary passed away last August after a courageous battle with cancer. Without Mary's caring heart and her concern for others, Ruby's might never have come to International Falls. Her legacy of caring lives on each second Monday of the month when over 300 guests participate in our distribution of surplus food. We estimate that 1,000 to 1,200 family members benefit from Ruby's each month.

Our Ruby's Pantry began in July 2015 after a community organizing effort that brought together members of the faith community in our area. Virtually all of Ruby's 60+ sites in Minnesota and Wisconsin are sponsored by churches. The Falls is unique in having Backus as the sponsor and the site. The Backus Gym and Auditorium provide a unique site for this program that has served almost 10,000 guests since opening. Each month an average of 90 volunteers make this event happen for our guests who drive from as far as Baudette to participate. During 2019 a total of 1,009 people served as Ruby's volunteers devoting a total of 3,284 hours over the year.

A team of volunteer "coordinators" supervise each aspect of the project from promotion to truck unloading, parking and carry-out, finance, registration, volunteers and distribution line coordination. Guests are asked to contribute a \$20 cash donation and in return receive one "share" of food which usually overflows two totes or laundry baskets. Two dollars from each \$20 donation stays in our community and is donated to local charities and non-profits through an application process. From August 2015 to <u>December 2019, \$27,425</u> has been donated to community organizations by Ruby's Benevolence Committee.

Everyone is welcome to take part in Ruby's Pantry regardless of economic status. This program is for anyone who might be concerned about food waste. Studies show we waste about 40% of the food produced in North America each year. Ruby's believes the best place to store surplus food is in people's stomachs. If you're concerned about food waste – take part in Ruby's as a volunteer or as a guest.



Dedicated to reducing hunger & building a stronger community

2019 marked the seventh full year that the Café has been operating since Backus and the Falls Hunger Coalition began the Café in December 2012. Support for the Café's \$30,000 - \$35,000

annual budget comes from a variety of sources including: the Otto Bremer Trust, Northland Foundation, Marshall N. Knudson Family Community Fund, PCA/Boise, the Diocese of Duluth, the Koochiching County Board, area congregations and individual donors. The Falls Hunger Coalition has been a consistent and generous supporter.

The largest volunteer support comes from four area congregations with First Lutheran, St. Thomas Catholic Parish, Zion Lutheran and Evangelical Covenant Church staffing four weeks each month. Other organizations providing volunteers include: Falls Hunger Coalition, Holy Trinity Episcopal, Falls Rotary Club, Kootasca and other social service providers. Each meal requires six volunteers with an average of 12 total hours worked each evening. The Café could not operate without the support of our volunteers who contributed 1,159 hours in 2019!

Although dinner at the Café is served from 5:30-6:00pm each Tuesday and Thursday, doors open at 5pm and guests begin to gather as early as 4:30pm. They may enjoy visiting with friends, meeting new ones or having a cup of coffee while they wait. Guest surveys indicate that people look forward to the socialization almost as much as the

food. Staff and volunteers welcome people, visit a bit while serving and treat each person with respect and politeness. Everyone is welcome regardless of economic or social status; there are no income guidelines and we don't expect a donation. Each evening an average of 61 meals are served and guests are welcome to return for second helpings. One fourth of the meals go to children.

A Café Steering Committee meets quarterly to oversee operations, budget, fundraising, promotion and discuss input from guest surveys. Members include: Pat Bjorum, Tammy Linder, Karina McLellan, Jenell Feller, Hoa Sobczynski and Ward Merrill.

The strong support from area congregations is exemplified by an early comment made by a member of First Lutheran who said, "If we can't come together on feeding people, what can we ever come together on?" The Café is certainly a great example of a community coming together to feed people. Thank you!



Summer Food Service Program

The Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) begun in 2010 provides a free "school" type lunch to children ages 1-18. The program is sponsored, certified and inspected by the MN Department of Education (MDE) and has specific guidelines for nutrition, portions and components of meals. To date the program has served 59,343 meals. A two-hour supervised "open gym" during the lunch period provides physical activities.

The program completed its 10th year in 2019. A free, nutritious meal was served Monday-Friday, 11:30am – 1:30pm from June 3 to August 30. A supervised "open gym was offered during the lunch time. Parents were encouraged to eat with their children and donate \$4.00 if possible. Adult meals not paid for were reimbursed by the Falls Hunger Coalition (FHC) who also provided nutritional weekend "snack packs" to children each Friday. The population served included children age 1-18, their parents, grandparents . Servants of Shelter , and FHC clients.



Parent surveys in the Summer Food Service Program indicated a very high degree of satisfaction with the summer lunch program. Parent's reasons for participating included: nutrition, food budgets, not enough money for food, socialization, large families and connecting with others. Several family members indicated they were unemployed. People "liked:" friendly staff, delicious food, variety, quick, kids being able to play with friends and balanced meals. Although the summer lunch program is successful according to participants and helping to meet needs for nutritional summer meals - our concern continues to be the decreasing number of participants each summer since reaching a high of 6,694 children's summer meals in 2014.

The Summer Food Service Program served a total of 4053 meals to children while 1,560 were served to adults in 2019 bringing the number of summer lunches served to over 59,000
