The Starter Home Project is designed to help people with a simple home that will remain affordable for decades to come.

| 0 | Create a timeline and action plan. |
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| 0 | Identify funding resources. Local banks may be able to qualify for Community Reinvestment Act credits. Consider a construction loan that rolls into the mortgage to help structure financing. Work with local municipalities to identify ways to reduce permit/impact/other fees. Some communities may have built an affordable housing fund to help with costs. |
| 0 | Aquire Land: ¼ acre suggested. Donated or reduced price will impact overall project total. Work with municipalities for in-fill lots, or developers who may have land opportunities. A key consideration is to build this home in a mixed income neighborhood to strengthen generational wealth and grow shared community engagement. |
| 0 | Identify buyer whose income is between 60-80% of Area Median Income set by HUD. Realtors are asked to reduce fees to help reduce overall cost. The selected AMI will be used in future sales/purchases of this home to determine future candidates. |
| 0 | Select a modular home model/manufacturer. Consider working with a Habitat affiliate or nonprofit partner who may be able to access a model at a better price. Goal is smaller footprint. Determine if modular home will be build on a crawl space or unfinished basement. Select design choices candidates will have such as cabinet color, flooring, exterior color, etc. |
| 0 | Implement Lasting Affordability Model into mortgage. Deed Restrictions allow for home to be sold affordably for set length of time. *Home will not be sold at Fair Market Value. Cost of project determines sales price. Note: this home would not be used in comps when neighboring home values are determined so that other homes on the block would be used for determining their market value. |
