First and foremost, I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to all the taxpayers whose contributions ensure the maintenance and development of our cherished lakes. Your support allows us to preserve the natural beauty and serenity that make our District so special.

To our dedicated volunteers, your selfless commitment is the backbone of our community. I also want to highlight a District volunteer program that has not been featured in recent newsletters. For those who are new to our lake community or were not aware of the Pickerel Lake Aeration System, allow me to provide some background. About 20 years ago, the district secured a WDNR grant of approximately \$64,000 to install an aeration system near the narrows. To make this possible, we relied on the generosity of some incredible lake residents.

Thankfully, Art and Deb Smith stepped up and allowed us use over their lakefront property for the system. They have also consistently plowed access to the system and allowed us to use their driveway for entry. Their dedication to our District and community is truly inspiring. As a result of this system, Pickerel Lake has not experienced a major fish kill since its installation.

The importance of maintaining the aeration system during the winter cannot be overstated. It plays a key role in preserving water quality and supporting the delicate balance of our lakes' ecosystem.

Unfortunately, due to warm weather this year, we had to shut down the system early. This has created conditions similar to the previous year, leading to another rise in aquatic plant growth.

If this is the case, the harvester program will once again face high costs, exacerbated by rising fuel prices and repair expenses. Harvester volunteers will be asked to fill the schedule for harvesting, much like in the 2024 season. I understand this is a significant request, but what are the alternatives? Together, we can navigate these challenges to keep our lakes beautiful and thriving.

Thank you all for your continued support and dedication to the Lake District. Your efforts make all the difference, and together we will ensure our lakes remain a source of pride and joy for generations to come.

Crane Lake Volunteers

If you are interested in volunteering, we're looking for Crane Lake volunteers to help in harvesting weeds on Pickerel Lake. At a minimum, we should have volunteers to "clear-cut" a path 24' wide (8' on either side of the culvert) and 100' out from the culvert entering Crane Lake. If this area is kept clear of weeds, it will help to reduce the number of weeds carried into the channel.

Fishing Line Disposal Containers to be Installed at all Three Boat Landings

The improper disposal of fishing line is a major threat to fishing areas. It threatens marine life, damages boats, and fouls propellers. Recycling your old fishing line is one of the best actions you can take to solve these issues.

Thank you to FCAL (Forest County Association of Lakes), who has made and donated fishing line disposal containers to be installed at each of our boat landings.

Obey the Sign "Clean off Your Props" BEFORE Entering the Channel

Please take time to observe the signs posted on the Pickerel Lake side of the culvert, asking boaters to remove weeds from their props. This is done either manually or putting your boat in reverse (throttle up forcing the weeds off) before navigating through the channel. This process will help keep Eurasian Milfoil hitchhikers from entering the channel and eventually populating Crane Lake.

Run-Off Issues on Crane and Pickerel Lakes Create a shoreline buffer.

 Allow at least 3-5' of natural vegetation next to the water, to prevent any nutrients like nitrogen or phosphorus from entering the water. For more information on Shoreline Restoration ideas, visit our webpage:

Lawn Fertilization

- If you live next to a lake or stream, do not fertilize within 25 feet of the water's edge.
- Never apply fertilizer if moderate or heavy rain is forecasted for your area within the next 24-48 hours.
- Consider using a liquid fertilizer versus a granular fertilizer, as liquids are absorbed rather quickly by the lawn whereas granular fertilizer is a slow-release formula.
- All bags of fertilizers will have a label showing the nutrient analysis. It will have three numbers, such as 22-0-15, which correspond to Nitrogen-Phosphorus-Potassium or N-P-K. Nitrogen (N) is important in overall plant health. Phosphorus (P) is integral in root formation. Potassium (K) regulates water movement. Remember, most established lawns in our region do not require added phosphorus.

Simple Reminders

- Please DO NOT mow next to the water and blow clippings into the lake.
- In the fall, do not intentionally blow leaves into the water, as leaves contain phosphorus which will contribute to future algae blooms.
- In the winter, please DO NOT build fires on the lake. Ash also contains phosphorus.

Bullhead Removal

Once again, we are looking for volunteers who would be willing to help net pods of bullheads from Pickerel and Crane Lakes. Once volunteers complete a form from the DNR and receive a permission letter and a time sheet from Brad Kupfer, the Lake District will supply all volunteers with a net. These nets are property of the Lake District and are to be used solely for the purpose of netting bullhead fry. At the fall meeting, Brad will be collecting the nets and your time sheets. If a net is not returned, you will be asked to pay for the net.

Walleye Stocking

2025 is a stocking year for walleyes from the DNR and Mole Lake Fisheries. We can expect around 3,400 fingerlings to be stocked in Crane and 13,000 to be stocked in Pickerel Lake. If anyone is interested in helping with the draining of the ponds at the Mole Lake fish hatchery in early October, please contact Brad Kupfer.
