- Do you have any existing connections with the population participating in the project? If so, in what ways?

- What places have you called home?
- What life events have greatly affected you?
- How would you describe your academic background?
- Do you have any history or personal interaction with the topic of the project? Does anything you have lived through influence your interest in or approach to this topic?
- Do you have any history/interaction with the population participating in the project? Do any of your lived experiences influence your interest in or approach to this population?
- Has your positionality changed over time? If so, how, and why?
- In what ways has your positionality remained static over time? Why?
- In what ways has your positionality been dynamic or emerging?

Where are you now?

 What is your biological sex and gender identity? What is your age group? What is your social class? • What is your vocation? • What are your beliefs, values, and religious and political orientations? What stereotypes do you hold? Which factors about this project are significant to you? • What do you see as appropriate resources to use in this project? • What are your ways of knowing? being? doing? • What are your beliefs about the topic of this project?



Where are you now? (continued)

- What are your beliefs about the population participating in this project?
- Does your identity, context, lived experience, and worldview align with or conflict with the project's design and process in any way? If so, in what ways?
- What are your understandings of systems of oppression and their influence on you and this project?
- If you are working with human subjects, what is your connection to the project participants? Do you share any commonalities, identities, or experiences with the project participants?

- What are your goals related to your vocation/s?
- What results do you think you will find in this project?
- How do you envision the project going?
- What potential opportunities, challenges, or conflicts do you think may arise in this project?
- What is your vision of equity in relation to this project?
- What are your hopes for this project?
- What are your hopes for the population participating in this project?
- What would you like to contribute to the field through this project?
- How would you like this work to influence your career?
