Natural Resources Conservation Service: Branch Chief, Easement Programs Division

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Danielle Balduff earned a Ph.D. in Soil Science from the University of Maryland in 2007. Danielle joined USDA-NRCS in 2007 as a Soil Scientist with a focus on wetland compliance for farm bill programs. In 2011, Danielle became an Ohio NRCS Program Manager working on implementation of easement programs including enrollment, acquisition, and stewardship activities. In 2015, Danielle assisted the NRCS national office in the development of a streamlined easement acquisitions team and process for nation-wide implementation in 2017. Danielle accepted a position in NRCS national office in 2017, assisting in the development of easement policy, streamlining easement procedures, and leading development of new business tools for the Agency. Danielle is currently serving as the Implementation and Stewardship Branch Chief in the Easement Programs Division leading the easement program implementation for NRCS, including managing program funding allocations, implementation, training, and stewardship activities.

Callie DeHaven is a fifth-generation Floridian whose passion for conserving Florida's historic and natural landscapes led to her dedicating more than two decades to conservation planning, land acquisition and land stewardship. She returned to the department in 2017 to lead the Division of State Lands, Florida's team of dedicated public land stewards and real estate specialists. Most recently, she spent seven years in the private sector implementing an accelerated conservation land sales program for a timberland landowner, where she led conservation business activities across 1.8 million acres in multiple states. Prior to that, DeHaven was the public lands protection manager for The Nature Conservancy, where she served as the primary negotiator for acquisition of environmentally sensitive land in Florida's Panhandle. Earlier in her career she served the public as a planning manager in the Division of State Lands. She was the principal liaison between the department and other state agencies in the development of Conservation and Recreation Lands, Preservation 2000 and Florida Forever projects. DeHaven's experience in the public, nonprofit and private sectors and commitment to strong partnerships complements our talented Division of State Lands team as they work to acquire, protect and preserve lands that will greatly benefit outdoor recreation and our natural and water resources across the state.

Chris is the Field Supervisor for the Panama City Fish and Wildlife Conservation Office and coordinates the Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program, which provides technical and financial assistance to landowners for restoration and enhancement of wetland, longleaf pine and stream habitats. Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources: State Lands Director

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Patti McCurdy currently serves as Director of the State Lands Division of the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (ADCNR). The State Lands Division administers Alabama's Forever Wild Land Trust and manages the program's 285,000 acres for purposes of public recreation and habitat conservation. The State Lands Division manages additional state-owned jurisdictional trust lands, including submerged lands (inland and coastal), for uses including oil and gas exploration and development, timber harvesting, mineral extraction, agriculture leases, hunting leases and various other revenue generating activities.
