## Your Library Ladies

### Make a Rainbow Fish!

### Materials:

Cone-shaped coffee filter
Paint: black, purple, blue, green, yellow, and red
Celery sticks (about 5 of them)
Glue
Glitter (or small pieces of foil cut into fish scale shape)
Pencil

### Instructions:

- 1. Explain that the smaller end of the filter is the head of the fish, the wider end will be the back.
- Dip the eraser end of the pencil I the black paint. Use this to create the eye. Dip the sharpened end of the pencil in the black paint and use this to draw a mouth.
- 3. Dip the ends of the celery sticks into the different colors of paint to create the scales on the fish. Press these ends onto your fish to create the scales. Let dry.
- 4. Spread a little glue on your fish and apply glitter. Another option is to cut foil into small scale shapes and glue them on your fish to create shiny scales.

Create an entire school of rainbow fish if you like!
