Four Year College Athletics

Four Year College athletics programs provide student athletes with the opportunity to continue your career while pursuing your degree.

The NAIA, page 64, discusses the programs that compete in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics.

The USCAA, page 65, discusses the programs that compete in the United States Collegiate Athletic Association.

The NCAA

The National Collegiate Athletic Association is the governing association for approximately 1,200 Four Year college programs.

The NCAA is divided into three divisions: Division I, Division II and Division III.

Division I and Division II programs offer athletics scholarships, while Division III offers academic financial aid.

The NCAA database allows you to search for programs based on a specific sport, as well as each Division.

Each institution will have program information, sports sponsored and links to their academic and athletics web pages.

The National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics is the governing association for approximately 235 Four Year college programs.

Use your search engine to review programs, the sports they sponsor and how you can contact their coaching staffs.

The United States Collegiate Athletic Association is the governing association for approximately 72 Two Year and Four Year college programs.

The USCAA provides a list of member institutions, including links to their athletics and academic web pages.

Graduate Assistantship

If you are interested in becoming a coach or administrator following your college career, earning a Graduate Assistantship can help you get started.

Graduate assistants help coaching staffs with a variety of tasks, determined by the Head Coach.

This can include helping out with recruiting, operations, practices and other game day responsibilities.

Graduate assistantships offer the opportunity to earn a Graduate degree while assisting the team and department.

It is important to understand that each institution will have their own resources that they can offer graduate assistants.

In order to earn a position, you must be accepted as a student, as you will be attending classes.

Graduate assistantships are offered with Four Year college programs.

Before you begin reaching out to coaching staffs, understand that they are looking for those who can actually help the staff, the team and be an asset to the department.

Can you help break down film?

Can you communicate with student athletes to assist them with their development?

Can you fundraise and serve as an ambassador for the program?

Review Four Year Athletics Programs on page 62 to learn how to navigate databases to contact coaching staffs.

Professional Opportunities

As you prepare your portfolio to earn professional opportunities in your career field of interest, Free Dot Edu has developed this initiative to assist you with navigating search engines to find quality organizations.

It is important to understand that each organization will have their own opportunities and resources that they can offer.

Conduct your research to determine if staff openings can help you accomplish your goals and that they are with organizations that you actually want to work with.

The Search Engine, page 68, discusses how to navigate databases and conduct quality searches.

Before you begin, map out your path so you can conduct specific searches, avoiding having to sift through data that cannot help you accomplish your goals.

The Search Engine

Search engines are available to help you find tools, programs and resources.

When using search engines, it is important to be as specific as possible.

Search engines take the characters you enter and matches them to web pages, sharing those which are as exact a match as possible, continuing with those that contain a portion of your query.

For example, if you search “healthcare jobs”, you will return pages that contain the words “healthcare” and “jobs”, together at first, then separately.

If you are not specific, you will return pages that may not have anything to do with the position that you are actually interested in.

Identify what you are actually looking for so that you do not lose time sifting through irrelevant information.

Fund

Fund is here to assist you with researching public and private financial aid to cover the costs of pursuing your education.

Add it to your toolkit to use as a reference while you continue on your journey.

Public Aid, page 70, discusses financial aid available through Federal grants and loans, as well as aid offered by Public colleges.

Private Aid, page 72, discusses financial aid available through private foundations, personal fundraisers and scholarships available with Private colleges.

Before you begin searching for financial aid resources, draw up a budget to determine exactly what you will need to accomplish your goals.

Public Aid

Public financial aid is available to assist you with the costs of completing your education.

The FAFSA, page 71, discusses the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, which helps determine your eligibility to receive financial aid from the Federal Government in the form of grants and loans.

Public colleges have their own financial aid that they are able to award students but are limited by the resources allocated to them by their home State.

The FAFSA

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid is available to help you determine your eligibility to receive Federal financial aid in the form of grants and loans.

You will need to provide the tax information of your parents if you are a dependent or your own if you are independent.

Private Aid

Private financial aid is available through private foundations, organizing your own personal fundraisers and scholarships available through Private colleges.

Private financial aid can help supplement your support if you need additional resources outside of Federal Aid, discussed on page 71.

Private foundations offer scholarships through their own selection process, based on demographics of who they choose to support.

This can be based on personal demographics or can depend on which subject you are interested in studying or which professional career path you are interested in.

Use your search engine, discussed on page 68, to research foundations that can assist you.

Private colleges accept federal student aid, but they also have their own scholarships that they are able to offer. There are various types of scholarships, including need based and academic awards.

Need based scholarships assist students who demonstrate that without additional help, they may not be able to attend.

Academic awards are used to recruit quality students to campus.

Understand that each institution will have their own aid to offer students, as well as their own selection criteria.

Remember, the admissions process can be competitive. While you may need aid to assist you with attendance, focus on demonstrating your academic abilities and how you can become an asset to the community.

Finally, organizing a personal fundraiser can assist you with the cost of attendance.

College institutions are nonprofit organizations and your assistance may qualify for a tax deduction for individuals and organizations who assist you. For example, 100 donors providing \$100 each is \$10,000.00.

Organizations may not be able to assist with your entire cost of attendance, but every bit helps.

Let the community know that you are serious about your studies and that financial aid is the only thing preventing you from earning your credential to pursue a professional path and create a career of helping others.

Communicate your goals with colleges that have the program you are interested in to develop a plan.
