# **MAY 12TH SPEAKER**

TODD LANDO, Battalion Chief, Wildfire Mitigation, Central Marin Fire, and a principal contributor to FireSafe Marin, will be joining us at our regular quarterly meeting on May 12th. This is a great opportunity to catch up on the latest thinking from one of the most knowledgeable fire fighters around.

It may seem like you've heard everything there is about wildfire. You know about "defensible space" and may well have made significant improvements to your ability to respond.

HOWEVER, there is a great deal that has been learned in just the past couple of years about how wildfire propagates in our area, where our main vulnerabilities are, keys to safe evacuation, better alerts, and much more. This refines and clarifies what you've learned before, fills in gaps, and provides us key details.

I thought I knew a lot about wildfire as the Firewise USA Leader for our Palm Hill neighborhood (155 homes) in Larkspur. But listening to Todd and others I've learned so much more over the last two fire seasons. Here are some highlights for me:

We've seen that most of the NorCal wildfires spread by embers being blown ahead of the fire.... sometimes miles ahead.... rather than a steadily moving fire front. So learning to protect against an "ember shower" is very important.

Houses with no flammable debris on the roof or in the rain gutters AND nothing fire prone in the 0-5 feet next to the structure have a much higher probability of surviving a fire. This plan of "start at the

house and work out" is a key refinement to defensible space.

I've heard many plans to evacuate on foot or bicycle or jump out of the car & run for it in a traffic jam. Sadly, we now have many lessons from the Paradise Camp Fire and others, that the safest place to be while evacuating is in your car, on a paved road, near the valley floor.

I hope you'll join our Zoom Meeting, Wednesday May 12th, for lots more info about these points and many others as we move further into the 2021 fire season!

# Mayor Charles Auerbach Field of Poppies of Imagination and Solace


