

John R. Wooden Middle School History Students Visit Museum

October 10 & 12, 2023, 260 John R. Wooden Middle School history students and seven educators visited the museum. Students participated in a scavenger hunt and learned more about the history of the Morgan County Hoosier Homesteads, WCBK radio, our award winning golf coach Sharon Most, Fall Foliage Festival, and when the Blackstone house was built. A few students were able to identify family members in pictures that were displayed. This is the second year that JRW Middle School has visited.



The museum has added to our collection framed 1875 and 1950 maps of Morgan County from the Morgan County Community Foundation. We now have four large Morgan County maps. Come peruse the maps for your ancestors and see if you can locate several of our Hoosier Homestead Farms. The homestead farm genealogy reference books will aid you with the township and section and original owner names.

Fall Foliage Festival

The Fall Foliage Festival display will come down soon. We look forward each year to displaying Joyce Hamilton's Fall Foliage director's jacket and sweater. She was such a dynamic part of the festival activities. The 1960 scrapbook picturing the first festival was a hit with our patrons. Pictures of the Queens and Hostesses, several of the old Reporter-Times festival newspaper inserts, the bicycle, diaper derby, and bed race pictures, a banner, a barrel and a baton from early festivals will go into our archives to be resurrected next year.





The Indiana Flag by David B. Reddick, one of our Morgan County History Partnership members, is available at the museum. Who was Lizzie Callis and what is her connection to Morgan County? Was the current flag the original proposed state flag? What did the Daughters of the American Revolution and the Grand Old Army have to do with Indiana's flag? This well researched and documented book is sure to give you new insight into the history of Indiana's flag.

Inquiries

Who built your house or owned your farm? Does it have historic significance? Several people have visited the museum inquiring about their homes. We do not have many pictures of old homes in the county nor a lot of information. If you are researching your house or property start with GIS Elevate/Morgan County. This website is free to search as a guest and will give you the names of the owners back to 1988. (The file will say 01-01-1900, but the actual date is 1988). The property transfer books are held in the Morgan County Auditor's Office, while the deed books are in the Clerk's Office, both of which are located in the County Administration Building, 180 S. Main St., Martinsville, IN. The auditor's office is in the process of digitizing their records so that they will eventually be available on your computer. For large properties or farms the Indiana State Map site https://www.in.gov/library/collections-and-services/indiana/ *map-collection* is an excellent source of historic information. The number of maps is limited, but many contain the property owners' names and can afford a clue as to when property changed hands. This will help narrow down the search of deeds. If you have access to old county plat maps they are helpful. Old Reporter-Times newspapers contained lists of property transfers. US Census reports occasionally would list the street name in the margin of the pages. The museum has several years worth of Robinson's Martinsville City Directory, which can be used to verify that a family lived at an address. If your family was one of our Hoosier Homesteads, the Homestead applications with deed information is on file at the museum.
