

Bobby Helms & the Candy Kitchen, are the featured exhibit at the museum in December. Robert Lee Helms, born 1933, in Bloomington, IN to Hildreth Esther (Abram) and Fred Robert Helms began performing with his brother Freddie before going to Nashville, TN to sign with DECCA records. "Fraulein" and "My Special Angel" were early successes for him, but when Christmas rolls around each year the nostalgic remember best "Jingle Bell Rock". Over 2,000,000 copies of the gold disc record have sold.

Bobby Helms Jingle Bell Rock Christmas Music Spectacular will take place December 8, with live music, fun holiday characters, carriage rides and more beginning

at 5 pm, with the tree lighting up on the courthouse lawn at approximately 7 pm.

Arletta Huff Hollis' Wash Stand



Arletta Huff (1870-1963) ran a boarding house at 209 S. Wayne St., Martinsville, according to her family. She met her husband, Luther Hollis, when he was working for the Fairland & Martinsville Railroad and boarded with her. They married about 1925 according to the 1930 US Census.

Nelly Huff Haney, Arletta Huff, and Frank Stark are shown in the picture with Hannah Huff, the girls' mother on the lovely cherry wash stand. A pitcher and wash basin donated to the museum by the Sue Tutewiler take us back to the early 20th century.

The Huff family donated an oak hall tree which is on display in our meeting room where numerous clothing items and hats may be seen. Also, a Civil War era mourning dress is on display along with a late 1800's cradle used by Ennis babies from the Stansbury family.

Lucile Daily Adams (1909-2004) earned many awards for sewing. The dress in this picture is one of several she sewed. She won a Singer treadle sewing machine for her efforts in 1928. Her granddaughter, Kay Hamm Cragen, kindly donated Lucile's dress, home economics workbook, and pictures to the museum along with her State Fair first place ribbon. Lucile married Randolph Adams in 1929, turning down a scholarship to begin married life. She worked with the Extension and served as a 4-H leader who guided many Morgan County youth.



Martinsville Third Graders learn about Morgan County

Barbara Boys, Marcia Hodges, and Crystal Chandler, retired school teachers, spent October visiting the Metropolitan School District of Martinsville third grade classes. 340 students received information about Grassyfork Fisheries, Martinsville Candy Kitchen, and Old Hickory furniture. Five Indiana State Standards for social studies were covered during their presentations.

The children were treated to goldfish that appear almost real when placed in water and candy pillows from the Candy Kitchen. Next Spring the children will board buses to tour downtown Martinsville and the Morgan County History Center and Museum.
