Our Common Witness - Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton

One of the distinct privileges of this call as presiding bishop is seeing the church at work at home and around the world. The Lutheran movement is alive and well, speaking the gospel in a distinctive voice. Sunday after Sunday the good news is proclaimed in accordance with Scripture and the <u>Lutheran Confessions</u>. In hundreds of languages and dialects, God's promise of grace, reconciliation and freedom is received and celebrated in places Martin Luther never knew existed. We are part of a worldwide family.

In many ways, and in the most important ways, we are alike. The cross is our center. Faith, grace and Scripture alone are our guides. A clear understanding of human brokenness and our inability to save ourselves sets us apart from societal and even some theological pressures that would try to draw us away from the source of our life and freedom. A world built on works and individualism promises salvation based on our own effort and denies salvation if we fail. The Lutheran movement points to another way. This is our common witness.

There are also glorious expressions particular to regions, countries and history: governance; organization; the role of laity, deacons, pastors and bishops; and the age for first communion, to name a few. And that's just the ELCA! Around the world the expression of Lutheranism takes on many different flavors—literally and figuratively.

In the Northern Diocese of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Southern Africa, porridge is a staple at all meals, so they pray, "Give us today our daily porridge." Spiritual healers are an important part of the life and ministry in the Lutheran church in Madagascar. Lutherans in Mexico celebrate the feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe, which falls just a day away from the Swedish celebration of Santa Lucia. Lutherans around the world hold fast to the core and adapt to make the gospel accessible.

Part of Luther's genius was to make Scripture, preaching and worship available in the language of the people. In fact, this year we celebrate the 500th anniversary of the publication of his translation of the New Testament from the ancient Greek into the German language, known as the <u>"September Testament."</u> This publication paved the way for other translations of the Bible, making it accessible for people both at church and in their homes. All these variations make the Lutheran movement richer, especially when we share across borders and cultures.

It's good to remember the events of the 16th century, but we shouldn't get stuck there. We need to ask what it means to be Lutheran in the 21st century. What it means for the Lutheran World Federation's 149 member churches, representing over 77 million members in 99 countries, that are exploring Lutheran identity. For some member churches with a state church tradition—Sweden, for example—Lutheran identity is a novel concept. The Lutheran church was "The Church," and there was no need to think about identity. Now many churches in Africa and Asia are forging an indigenous expression of what it means to be Lutheran. Yes, they still sing hymns set to German, Swedish and American hymn tunes, but they are also developing music and worship using traditional instruments and styles.

What will our Lutheran identity be in the ELCA? We still treasure our immigrant roots—and we should. But if our ethnic identities become synonymous with Lutheran identity, we are missing the mark. The gospel, and Luther's clear exposition of it, transcends human boundaries. When a single culture's vernacular becomes the established language of the people, we hinder the gospel's free course in the world. We can become an alternative face of Christianity in the culture—one that moves across divisions, is meant for all, and that is a free and liberating gift.

Dear Messiah,

Advent is upon us! We've officially begun this new church year in worship (with Thanksgiving and the First Sunday of Advent comfortably under our belts) and are opening to the anticipation of the season with hope and joy.

It's interesting to me every year just how our gospel stories in Advent contrast so sharply with that hope and joy. We heard last week how no one knows when the Son of Man will come - not even Jesus - and this week we'll hear from John the Baptist about repentance, broods of vipers, and the "chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire." So between hopeful joy, and ominous repentance I find Advent unexpectedly reflective. Even for different reasons, Is that true for you too?

It's difficult to hold that reflective space though in a culture full of commercial excitement, whipping everyone up into a consuming frenzy of Holiday cheer. Thankfully, church holds out opportunities for quietness, stillness, and space to feel whatever we're feeling - space where we can put down what we carry and experience love, belonging and feel the attention and love of God.

Wednesday at noon this week, a small group of Messiah members with Pastor Aimee and myself, did the first of four Advent Midweek worship services. These services take the shape of the Vespers service in our ELW hymnal, with singing, prayer, silence and the reading of scripture. Light is a theme that weaves through it that I hope we'll engage fully when Epiphany (the season of light) comes around after two Sundays of Christmas. But our little group found that stillness and quiet in that time together, even as we sang, prayed, and listened to readings.

What opportunities are you finding to "feel what you're feeling" this Advent. The growing darkness of the days, if not also these Sunday gospel readings, certainly invite quietness. It's easy to get wrapped up in all that needs doing for us this time of year, but I hope you're taking time where you can to sit and listen, feel, and remember the God and the baby that sit at the center of the story we're living these days.

If you need help finding that time, I invite you to come to Calvary on Wednesday at noon and join our little midweek worship service. The service offers riches just as the simple soup lunch served immediately following does. Mexican chili and homemade bread, as well as warm fellowship in the parish hall fed our spirits as much as the service did.

It's an opportunity offered for us to be with each other, engage in the story, be fed and filled with the light of God and the gift of this community amidst darkening days. It's an opportunity offered for you to engage the season and hold again the stillness God invites us to.

Simple and profound gifts both are found in the dark and the quiet. Wherever you find it these days, a blessed Advent to you all.

Transforming lives at Montana State Prison

We are equipping our community for the Gospel with a ministry of presence. Our message is not "get right with God" and you will be saved. Rather we walk alongside others in their trials, not promising to make it better, but only that they are loved and valued. We are a grace-based ministry.

Join us because

We believe everyone deserves a second chance.

We are all broken. We are all sinners.

Just as God forgives, so should we. Liberated by our faith, we embrace you as a whole person—questions, complexities and all. Join us as we do God's work in Christ's name at Montana Sate Prison. Our arms are open and we welcome <u>all</u> into our worshipping community.

Freedom in Christ Prison Ministry is a worshiping community of the Montana Synod of the Evangelical Church in America.

We are the only ecumenical worshiping community within the Montana State Prison providing a pastor on a full-time basis. Our pastor provides worship services, Bible studies, pastoral visits, bereavement visits, and funeral services.

We invite you to help us bring hope, love, forgiveness, and faith into a place that often does not share these values.

Transforming lives at Montana State Prison through the power and presence of Jesus Christ.

Our special offering for December supports the Freedom in Christ Prison Ministry at Montana State Prison in Deer Lodge. This mission is widely supported by Montana Synod – individuals, congregations, the Synod Office, and Churchwide. Even so, funding over the past three years has dwindled placing the Ministry at risk. Due to financial concerns, Pastor Rob has been placed in a part-time status and Board members have been asked to take on some of the fund raising efforts.

Putting dollar issues aside, the Ministry remains incredibly important as a resource that inmates turn to for support, guidance, and spiritual renewal. Transforming Corrections published a study in 2017, The Impact of a Volunteer Prison Ministry Program on the Long -term Recidivism of Federal Inmates, that showed that recidivism rates dropped by 21% for inmates engaged in Prison Ministry. For women, older inmates, and low risk offenders, the rates dropped by nearly 60%. There is virtually no ELCA presence in the Women's Prison in Billings and Montana Synod has the most involvement of the mainline Protestant denominations in the Men's Prison. FIC hopes to engage with the Women's Prison in the next two years if more consistent funding is established.

The Men's Prison houses nearly 1,600 inmates and has their own issues with staffing and funding from the state. Visitor access has been dramatically curtailed leaving inmates with little or no contact with the 'outside world'. FIC tries to fill some of that void.

"We have operated in the Montana State Prison for ten years and the recidivism of our guys is low, which coincides with statistics showing that faith ministries inside prisons (and reentry programs) reduce the return to prison by 80%."

Purchase of assisted living facility in the Heights is being considered. SJU has \$6M less now in savings than in 2019. A hard decision to close a building on campus during Covid, but staff was retained.



- Include income records for the previous month for everyone not receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits.
- Include a recent bank statement for all open bank accounts.
- Include copies of Social Security cards.

HOW DO I APPLY?

To apply, you need to submit an application by April 30, 2023.

An application can be found at liheap.mt.gov or by contacting your local LIHEAP eligibility office.


