

Dear Messiah,

In a few short weeks, our sanctuary will be full of people. The lights will go down, a flame will be passed around the room for people to light their candles. The tree will be dazzling bright and all of us will sing Silent Night.

Most of these folks will not be familiar to many of us as members of the Messiah community. But many of these folks have been waiting all year for that moment on Christmas Eve. We cling to it as a moment that fills us, that assures us. It's a moment of beauty that brings us as close to a sense of the holy as many of us get year after year. The promise of that moment will fill our church with friends and strangers who need it.

"Jesus' ministry," says Walter Bruggemann in The Prophetic Imagination, "takes place between the clinging and the yearning" (CC Beechy). We are about to enter Advent - the season of anticipation, preparation (both external and internal), and reflection - that will lead us to Christmas. This word from Bruggemann caught my attention because it speaks to me about the tension that lives in Advent.

This is a culture that clings. We'd like to take that quiet moment of candle-lit bliss and stretch it out over the whole season, perhaps the whole year. If we could do this, what would it make of the Silent Night moment? It would lose something, wouldn't it? But experiencing it one night of the year, for the briefest of moments during that service, our yearning for that moment grows, drawing us to that night, to that light. So when it happens, we can receive its gifts that hopefully sustain us again for another year. Rather than cling, Advent asks "for what do you yearn?" As we did last year, we will not be celebrating the Eucharist (Holy Communion) during our Sunday Advent services. This is one way we will be leaning into that yearning. The Advent hymns we'll be singing will teach us this yearning too. We could certainly sing our way through the Christmas carols each of these four Advent Sundays, clinging to the familiar feelings and our sense of nostalgia for years and circumstances past. But would they not lose some of their power?

Advent is the season in which we can look honestly at the distance between what has been promised, and the darkness in which we find ourselves. "Already but not yet": Already it has been promised, but it's not yet here. In this way, Advent is the season in which we can shed our illusory hopes - hopes that are illusions - and wait with anticipation and yearning for the real thing: The light of Christ coming into the world, of which our Silent Night candle light is a beautiful reflection.



ST JOHN'S UNITED

St John's United is a ministry organization owned by 23 Lutheran congregations in Montana. St John's is a not-for-profit 501 (C) (3) organizations that provides living opportunities within a nurturing environment of hope, dignity and love.

St John's United provides a variety of living arrangements to meet the needs of their residents. They have both independent living and assisted-living communities. Residences differ in value and services. Aries, a 12 story building currently being built in downtown Billings will have 101 low cost apartments and a large community area on the main floor called Centrum that will provide recreational services, conference facilities, and a store and market for the public. Chapel Court provides medium income residences and when completed will have 20-24 apartments. Mission Ridge provides more expensive housing and social community services.

St John's provides outpatient rehabilitation, inpatient transitional care, and hospice services at the end of life. A new program, called Older Adult Caregiving Project, initiated by St John's involves training family members to be caregivers for their elderly parents. In rural areas this training can be done virtually. The family member would have a monthly stipend and support given to them by St John's trained staff. A three year grant was achieved for this project.

St John's United also provides high-quality early child care and education to promote children's development and learning. They promote parental employment and family self-sufficiency. The Center for Generations (CFG) provides affordable childcare for it's staff and community. It helps bridge the gap between low access to child care while providing meaningful intergenerational opportunities for residents and children.

Currently the Center for Generations is remodeling it's facility and playground to provide the best services for childcare. The program has raised \$90,000 and will need an additional \$30,000 before completion.

St John's provides a program called C.A.R.E.S. This program works with Wendy's Wonderful Kids providing adoption and guardianship placement. Family Services

has contracted adoption services with international partners. In 2023 there were 7 infants adopted. In 2024 there has been only 1 so far.

The C.A.R.E.S. program began in 2021 and can support people for 1 ½ years. It is team and community based. The program had 232 referrals, has enrolled 87 families of which 78 families connected. Counseling and mental health services were provided.

St John's Luther Lodge provides provisional housing for individuals who have hospitalized family members. The cost is based on ability to pay and is a great service preventing the high cost of hotels or long drives from the hospital to home and back.

Finally it should be noted that St John's United has provided a summer concert series for 27 years. Closer to the summer months, information regarding specifics will be available.



This is the proposed Sabbatical Policy for Messiah Lutheran Church.

MESSIAH LUTHERAN CHURCH SABBATICAL GUIDELINES

PURPOSE OF A SABBATICAL

Wholeness and wellness are important principles in the life of the church and in the practice of its ministry. Congregations and agencies will be served best by pastors and deacons who are healthy--both spiritually and physically--and who are committed to grow both in their understanding of the faith and in enhancing their skills in ministry. A sabbatical provides an opportunity for the pastor to take an intentional, extended period of time away from regular parish demands to experience renewal, study, spiritual growth, travel, or skill development. After the sabbatical the pastor returns to the parish with new energy and resources for ministry.

LENGTH OF SABBATICAL

A sabbatical may be granted for twelve weeks (three months). The sabbatical takes the place of any continuing education time for that year. Vacation time is not included as sabbatical time.

ELIGIBILITY

A pastor may take a sabbatical after every sixth full year of service with approval by the church council.

FINANCING A SABBATICAL

The congregation will pay full salary and benefits during the sabbatical. Expenses incurred during the sabbatical – e.g. Tuition, books, supplies, travel and living expenses outside of the parsonage – will be borne by the pastor. These expenses may be covered by allotted continuing education funds.

PLANNING

Planning for a sabbatical should begin the calendar year before the sabbatical. A written proposal for a sabbatical should be submitted for approval no later than six months before the sabbatical. The timing and proposed plans for a sabbatical must be approved by the church council.

COMMITMENTS FOLLOWING A SABBATICAL

The pastor is normally expected to serve Messiah for at least twelve months following the sabbatical. The pastor will present the results/impact of his/her sabbatical to the congregation within a mutually agreed upon period of time following the completion of the sabbatical.

Our special offering for December supports the Freedom in Christ Prison Ministry at Montana State Prison in Deer Lodge. This mission is widely supported by Montana Synod – individuals, congregations, the Synod Office, and Churchwide.

The Ministry remains incredibly important as a resource that inmates turn to for support, guidance, and spiritual renewal. Transforming Corrections published a study in 2017, The Impact of a Volunteer Prison Ministry Program on the Long-term Recidivism of Federal Inmates, that showed that recidivism rates dropped by 21% for inmates engaged in Prison Ministry. For women, older inmates, and low risk offenders, the rates dropped by nearly 60%. There is virtually no ELCA presence in the Women's Prison in Billings and Montana Synod has the most involvement of the mainline Protestant denominations in the Men's Prison. FIC hopes to engage with the Women's Prison in the next two years if more consistent funding is established.

The Men's Prison houses nearly 1,600 inmates and has their own issues with staffing and funding from the state. Visitor access has been dramatically curtailed leaving inmates with little or no contact with the 'outside world'. FIC tries to fill some of that void.

"We have operated in the Montana State Prison for ten years and the recidivism of our guys is low, which coincides with statistics showing that faith ministries inside prisons (and re-entry programs) reduce the return to prison by 80%."

That's good news! That's why we do what we do!

PRIOR TO THE EVENT

Bakers - Bake cookies to be served at the event.

Thursday, December 5 (6:00-8:00 p.m.) - Load up the things that are not at the church and bring them to the church. Set up tables.

Friday, December 6 (9:00 a.m.) - Arrange gifts on tables in the sanctuary. Arrange the wrapping area and chairs. Arrange chairs for children and adults in the gathering area.

on December 7 (8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.)

Kitchen Staff - Arrange and serve cookies and beverages to the adults.


