Labor Day

Carl Cherland, my dad, died this week; July 12 th - my half birthday. He had developed a brain tumor (Glioblastoma) last fall. And after surgery and radiation in the new year, he was given a prognosis of 10 months. He fell asleep on Monday and died on Saturday.

After my mom, sister and I had time with his body, the funeral home took him to Swift Current, Saskatchewan, where he would undergo Aquamation. The only thing that would remain from that process would be his bones, ground up and placed in an urn.

This might not have been our first choice for what to do with his remains, but this is what he wanted. He chose it for its negligible carbon footprint, but it had the added benefit of easing a necessary border crossing. He and Mom own plots at the Flower Fields Cemetery in Hills, MN and that was where he wanted to be interred. Bodies don't cross borders easily but his fine ground bones wouldn't even need to be declared.

We shared a lot of stories before and after his death. At one point, I asked my mother Meredith why she agreed to be interred in Hills. Having grown up in Connecticut, her parents were buried in Stratford, a long way from Hills (in more ways than one). She told me this story.

Summer 1973 came just a few months after she and Dad had met. He spent that summer, like many before, working on the farm in Hills that his grandparents Henrik and Othilda had started. It was Labor Day weekend and some of the family were gathering. Dad had called Mom, who was working in Colorado Springs, and asked her to come.

She flew to Sioux Falls, picked up her bags and walked out of the airport to find Dad waiting. There he was, leaning against the farm truck in blue jeans, a T-shirt and denim jacket. He was tan from working outside, with bleached blond hair and only just 24. Mom was struck: he was gorgeous.

At the farm she met Dad's parents, his brother and sisters, along with Othilda - Dad's beloved grandmother. Uncle Rik and Joleen surprised everyone by driving all the way down from Saskatchewan. They were just so curious about this exotic, east-coast woman Dad had brought to the farm.

At one point, Othilda handed a bowl to Mom and told her to go out and pick some green beans from the garden for lunch. Mom had never seen green beans still "on the vine" before. But out she went, one of the family, ready to work.

It was a beautiful weekend on the farm in late summer, the place where she met Dad's family and became part of it. A perfect moment in time that would age well.

She told me another story soon after this one. It was Dad's last night at home before being taken into Hospice.

The palliative care nurse had come over for a check-in and found that, as a side effect of one of his medications, both his feet had swollen dramatically, and one was red, weeping and infected. He was no longer able to get around the house. It was time for him to be admitted. She told Mom, his primary care giver for the past six months, that it was time for her to be his wife again.

During the course of his illness, there were moments when, on his best behavior, he was childlike. He would get a look in his eyes that was soft, curious and grateful with a touch of wonder - maybe at the care he was receiving, the taste of a ripe cherry he was eating, or something else. I had seen it a few weeks before when I'd come home, but hearing how he greeted the EMT's and joked as they put him on a stretcher, I imagine that childlike spirit emerging.

It was on the way to the hospital that he seemed to get anxious. Mom was sitting beside him and brought him back to that summer weekend in Hills, recalling the time - the farm, the relatives and relationships, Othilda and the beans. He helped some and remembered with her, calming as he did.

That was Friday. Then Monday, and Saturday.

I've been thinking about what lived between these two stories. In 51 years of marriage there was joy. Music. Food and meals and parties with friends and loved ones. A lot of Church. Children, work, experiences of loss, distance, pain and regret. Seasons as students, adventuring in far away places, the peace and ease of making a home with someone, in someone, somewhere. And love - spoken, heard and given, again and again.

We work at life. The day to day, the grind of effort, and the weight of responsibility, all for the sake of accomplishing something significant in the hope that it matters and lasts. We work at life but we live for moments. The moments of connection, beauty, and ease that blooms. Moments where we make contact with the timeless. These moments might last a day, a weekend or more, and even though they might shift, shaped over time in the remembering and telling, they become something more than they are. The food we need along the way, sign posts showing us that way.

These are the moments I'm collecting now, to remember Dad and keep some connection-with him - moments that last, that lay out the way and the long path home.


Dear Messiah Lutheran Church Members and Friends!


Messiah Charity Quilters would love your help

The lettering for the outside of the church building is ready and will be installed mid-September.


More volunteers have been helping in the Tech Booth.

Member Spotlight

Mary Ames is in our Member Spotlight this month.

Where to start with this amazing lady? She is our eldest elder having just celebrated her 99th birthday although you would never guess that because she is spry and sharp as a tack, always upbeat and positive, certainly an inspiration for all of us!

Mary is absolutely the most accomplished knitter I have ever known. I made sure when my great grandchildren were born that I was able to purchase her baby socks and caps for my little ones. She also quilts and plays bridge.

Mary has been a faithful church member, prayer warrior, and supporter of this congregation for many years. Mary and Vince were instrumental in acquiring the property where our church now sits. She is the person I go to when I need special prayers. That's what I know of Mary, but here is her story in her own words.

The Life and Times of Mary Ames

I was born July 24, 1926. My parents were Howard and Mabel Heinbach. I was the middle child of five with two older brothers, a younger brother, and a sister.

I was raised in the Mennonite Church. It was New Conference Mennonite—no buggies or special garb. I never heard anyone say "are we going to church today?" - it was a given.

There were twenty two cousins, most of them living within a 5 mile radius. What fun we had together!

When I was four I found out where babies came from. Doctor Meyer came to the house with his black satchel and went up the back stairway to my mother's room. Later, when he left, I had a baby sister. He had to have brought her in the satchel!

We had two living rooms in our house and often there was a quilt in the frame in one of them. We kids liked to play under the frame until we got too rowdy and were sent to play somewhere else.

I started to quilt at age twelve and learned to knit from one of my cousins when I was fifteen.

One Sunday there was a new young man in the choir, his name was Woody Roth. He was good looking, too. Sometime later I sat beside him on the youth hayride. He asked me out and two years later we married.

Woody had been to auctioneers school and was developing his business as well as becoming a realtor.

Our children were Cynthia, Claudia and Wylie. We had a very happy marriage until it all came to an end. We were on our way to a beach cottage for a weeks vacation when our car was hit by a drunk driver and Woody was killed instantly. I was forty years old.

At that time there were very few women who sold real estate, but I got my license and went to work for Woody's partner. In the Allentown Board of Realtors there were four women to fifty men.

Two years later I married Bob Krall. He had spent time as a teenager on a Montana ranch and really wanted to live here, a tough move for me! We bought a small sheep ranch and I also went back to work for C Mor Real Estate. When the owner was ready to retire, I bought the company.

My marriage to Bob ended for reasons I will not go into. I was devastated.

I was sixty nine years old by then and certainly not looking for another man in my life, but one day Vince Ames, who was widowed, came into my office inquiring about some lots I had for sale. He Invited me to have lunch with him at Bogarts. We found out we both liked to hike and also kept a birdwatching list. Our first hike was in Clarks Fork Canyon. About a year later we married.

Early in our marriage we were able to travel sight seeing throughout the U.S. and visiting relatives in Pennsylvania, Colorado, and Wisconsin. We took two Amtrack trips to Pennsylvania and a two week bus tour in Mexico. It has been a happy 28 years of marriage.

Daughter Cynthia is married to a fine Christian man, Mark Schiller. Daughter Claudia died of a brain tumor at age fifty two. Son Wylie lives in Livingston. I have three grandchildren, Marje, Lori, and Robby. Robby and Paran gave me a pretty little great grandchild, Minoo.

In spite of some set-backs, I feel truly blessed. Thanks be to God!
