

Volcano's Schools

It hasn't been that long ago when I first heard the name Volcano, West Virginia. I had an image of a one-horse sleepy town. Since then I have learned that Volcano was a vibrant town and lots of things were going on. The people were tough hard-working men and women who cared about their town and the families who resided there. When it came to education in Volcano, I was guilty of assuming that the town had one school at any given time and that the adults didn't think education was important. After all, weren't the boys going to follow their fathers into the oil fields and the girls marry and raise a family? Was I ever wrong!

Steve Parker sent me a copy of the act to provide Free Schools for the town of Volcano

that was passed by the West Virginia Legislature on February 18, 1871. I was surprised to learn that the board of education had the power to establish an adequate number of primary schools, and a central high school in which they could teach all the subjects of education usually taught in colleges. In addition, students not residents of Volcano could attend the schools if their parents were willing to pay the tuition fee.

According to James Sutton McCandless in his book *Artesian Water in Hawaii*, the first students were taught in the old Volcano Hotel.

By August in 1871, a two-story school accommodating 150 students was completed. Another building was under way at Sand Hill,

which could accommodate 50 students.

Male teachers were allowed to take one evening each week for courting purposes; if they went to church regularly, two evenings.

Teacher's School Room Responsibilities

To keep the school room neat and clean, teachers were responsible for:

- **Cleaning the floor and blackboards at least once a day.**
- **Scrubbing the floor, with hot, soapy water, at least once a week.**
- **Starting the fire at 7 am so the room will be warm at 8 am.**

Rules of Conduct for Teachers

YOU WILL NOT marry during the term of your contract.

YOU WILL NOT keep company with men.

YOU MUST be home between the hours of 9 pm and 6 am unless attending a school function.

YOU MAY NOT loiter downtown in ice cream store.

YOU MAY NOT travel beyond the city limits unless you have the permission of the chairman of the board.

YOU MAY NOT ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother.

YOU MAY NOT smoke cigarettes.

YOU MAY NOT dress in bright colors.

YOU MAY UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES color your hair.

YOU MUST wear at least two petticoats.

YOUR DRESSES MUST NOT be any shorter than 2 inches above the ankle.
